**BRADFORD, Pa., March 6.**—A masked stranger entered the national bank in this city about 11 o'clock this morning, and as Cashier Tomlinson stepped up to the counter, the stranger drew a revolver and shot him in the groin, turned and made his escape out the door. A crowd was attracted by the noise and several started in pursuit. As they gained on the fleeing murderer, he turned and shot a butcher named Blisch in the left side, then shot himself dead instantly. The stranger's name is said to be Kimball. Tomlinson's condition is very critical. Blisch is not seriously hurt.

**South American Gold Finds.**

**Senator Sherman Strikes Out on his Canvass.**

**THE NEW CHINESE TREATY.**  
Its Signers—Its Contents—Artful Dodges of Chang Yen Hoon.  
**WASHINGTON, D. C. March 5.**—It is understood that the new Chinese treaty intends to prohibit absolutely the coming to this country of any Chinese laborers in the future, but a representative of the Chinese empire in Washington has brought to the attention of Secretary Bayard the fact that there are Chinese in this country who have accumulated sums of money and have made investments in real estate in California and elsewhere.  
Chang Yen Hoon, the Chinese minister, says his government is not only willing but anxious to prevent the coming of Chinese to this country. He artfully declares, however, that it would be unjust to deprive any Chinaman in the United States owning property here who, under the present law is entitled to retain as long as he chooses, of the right to go to China and return at his pleasure, under proper limitations.  
It is understood that the treaty will give Chinese owning real or personal property of the value of \$1,000 or upward certain privileges in respect to travel that are not enjoyed by their more impetuous Mongolian brethren. The coming of Chinese laborers in the future will be prohibited unless the Six Companies can find a \$1,000 plant for every Chinaman who is willing to sweat that he has lived in this country before and has accumulated property of that value.

**Attempted to Break Jail.**  
**RALEIGH, N. C., March 5.**—Another sensational feature has been developed in the case of Dave Brinkley and Charles Lawrence, the young white men who were arrested and tried preliminary, at Newton day before yesterday for burglary. They were proved to have blackened their faces and to have forcibly entered the residence of old man Dave Smith where presenting pistols at him and his family, they went through the house and robbed it. Night before last rumors of a projected lynching of both men began to circulate. Both men had made desperate attempts to break jail. Yesterday evening they were taken to Charlotte, and are now in a strong jail.
