Excellent Crop Prospects.

Supt. of Schools Geo. A. Peebles returned from a trip over the valley yesterday evening, and he says he never saw better crop prospects. He says he has failed to notice any signs of rust, and to this he paid particular attention. The rains are keeping back the hay harvest considerably, but it is thought that the crop will be very large. It is damaging tender oats some, by knocking it down; but not much.

INCREASE OF THE VOTE.

Fifty per centum is the Growth of the Past Eight Years. 200,000 Population.

Croakers may say what they please, but the population of Oregon is increasing. This is evidenced in no better way than by comparing the vote of the present year with that of former years. In 1880 there were 40,816 votes cast in this state for presidential nominees. In 1884, there were 52,682 votes cast in Oregon for presidential electors. In 1886 the vote for congressman aggregated 45,954; in 1888, however, the climax is capped with a grand total vote of 69,207.

This shows an increase of just fifty per centum since the vote of 1880 was cast—a little less than eight years. According to this, considering that the population of the state has increased in the same ratio as this vote, Oregon's present population is something over two hundred and sixty thousand souls. This would show an increase in the population since 1880 of 87,384 persons.

The number of votes cast has increased most rapidly, probably, during the past two years, since when it has grown 5298 votes. The JOURNAL feels rather well satisfied with this showing, and hopes to see another increase of fifty per centum in our vote and population in the next decade. Oregon will, more than likely, be entitled to two representatives in Congress after the next decennial census which will be taken in 1890. Speed the day.

A FARMER SWINDLED.

A Des Moines (Iowa) Dispatch Shows how a Couple of Sharpers Played it on a Greeny.

Sheriff Moody of Crawford County, who left late last night with the prisoners arrested by the Des Moines police yesterday, made the following interesting statement: The smaller of the two men, giving his name as W. C. Greene, appeared in Des Moines several days ago and talked of buying a farm. He approached an old man named Eastman, who lives in Des Moines, and proposed buying a farm of him. He told the old man he would be around the next morning with a carriage, to look at the farm which they did. A few miles out of town, in a woody, secluded place, they met a heavy, rough-looking fellow on foot, who pretended to be an extensive stock buyer. They entered into conversation, and the stock buyer finally proposed a little three-card game. The old man wouldn't bet, but the stock buyer produced a roll of \$1,500 and offered to give it to Eastman if he could pick the right card which Eastman did.

The stock buyer said he would keep his word, and handed the money to Greene, whom he termed a friend of Eastman, to count, and asked to see if Eastman had as much money to make good the bet if he had lost. The old man innocently handed over a roll of money to Greene to count. There was \$1,500 in the roll, and when he had counted it Greene coolly handed both rolls to his partner, the stock buyer, who quickly got behind his big gun and backed off with the booty. Greene warned Eastman not to follow, as the man was dangerous, and promised to make good the amount, saying that he thoughtlessly gave both rolls of money to the bold footman. They then went back to town, and Greene went to Eastman's house and took dinner, excusing himself in time to join his confederate in getting out of town on the 12:50 A. M. train, and then Farmer Eastman began to be alarmed and notified the Sheriff, who forthwith telegraphed to Carroll, but failed to catch the men there, but overtook them at Dedham. They escaped him in the dark there and the Sheriff then wired the Des Moines police with the above results.
