STATE NEWS. Willis Gaines, an aged Oregon pioneer, died on Sunday at his home near Selo. His wife died last Friday at Sodalville, where she had gone for her health. Coquille City Herald: A few silver salmon have made their way up the river as far as this place. The run of this fish will commence, it is thought, about the 15th. Eugene City Guard: Rev. Humphreys will shortly commence the publication of a journal in Eugene City, devoted to the interests of the Christian church. O. C. Brown, a school teacher at Elkton, accidentally shot himself on Sunday while handling a pistol. The bullet passed through his right side inflicting a painful flesh wound. The Dallas Itemizer says that scores of letters of inquiry from Iowa, Kansas and other states are received there, many of the writers of which will be likely to visit Oregon in the fall or spring. In Ashland last week Blanche Logan five years old, jumped from a truck and the heavy vehicle ran over her hips as she lay face downwards. No bones were broken, and her injuries are not considered serious. West Side: The brick yard belonging to J. R. Choper has completed burning the last kiln of this year. Something over 400,000 has been burned and buildings here have consumed all but about 125,000 which he now has for sale. Pioneer: Port Townsend has thirty-two licensed bar rooms, to say nothing of side issues. The business of the place comes mostly from sailors, who, because they live on water, adopt as a principle, total abstinence from it while on land. Sundry a 3-year-old daughter of Joseph Meyer of Lebanon was playing with matches, when they became ignited and her clothes caught on fire. Members of the household were near and the flames were extinguished, but not until the little girl's face and arms had been badly burned. She will recover. Corvallis Gazette: Jacobs & Neugrass, J. R. Myers and W. C. Durand have been awarded the contract of grading ten and one-half miles of the Oregon Pacific extension from Brightenbush eastward and are advertising for 500 men to begin work immediately. They expect to complete their work this winter. Pendleton Tribune: Last night while Mr. Beck and his son Freddie were crossing the railroad trestle bridge above town, the little fellow slipped and fell to the ground, a distance of about 15 feet. He was picked up in an unconscious condition, but it is thought no serious injuries are sustained and was probably only bruised and stunned.

MARKET REPORT. SALEM, Sept. 6. The wheat market is still firmer. Though but little is changing hands 72 cents is offered and probably 75 could be obtained. The French Prairie Gazette takes the JOURNAL to task for suggesting that the 75 cents per bushel, reported at this office as being offered last week at Gervais might not be in cash but in store goods. It affirms that that was and is the market price "in big American dollars." We meant no slight. It came only as hearsay, and was so much higher than quoted at other places that it was thought the information might not be correct. The JOURNAL aims to do justice to all and rejoices in the prosperity of Gervais or any other place. Oats remain dull, at 25 cents. Nothing doing in barley or potatoes. A car load of the latter are being shipped by Albert Davis at 25 cents per bushel, he furnishing his own sacks. Hops are firm at from 12 to 14 cents.

TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY. Drafted into the Service. ERIE, Pa., Sept. 5.—The democratic congressional convention of this district, against the repeated protest of Congressman Wm. L. Scott, renominated him again to-day by acclamation. A committee was appointed to urge the acceptance of the nomination. Another Mail Pouch Lost. NEW YORK, Sept. 5.—Another mail pouch has been lost. This one contained \$15,000, and was mailed by Blake Bros. & Co. of this city to their agents in Chicago last Friday. It is reported also that a large number of other letters mailed on the same day at the New York postoffice are missing. Frenzied With Fever. INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 5.—Near Columbus, Ind., to-night, James Ford, a farmer, while suffering from delirium caused by fever, sprang from his bed and made an attack upon his wife and two children. He seized a chair and killed the youngest child, and fatally injured his wife, and his 10-year-old son was so badly injured that he will die. The Senate Tariff Bill. WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—The sub-committee of the senate committee on finance engaged on the preparation of a tariff bill this morning received the second print of the new tariff bill. It contains, interlarded with the text of the bill, tables prepared for the convenience of the members of the sub-committee, showing in parallel columns the rates by the present law, those by the Mills bill and those provided in the new bill. It is the last print to be made before the measure is laid before the full committee next week. The members of the sub-committee and experts are now preparing the matter for the report to accompany the bill. Testimony and statements made to the sub-committee, making about 1500 pages in print, will be formally submitted to the full committee with the bill and report.

TELEGRAPHIC SPLINTS. In Tulare, Cal., last evening Thomas Bogan was instantly killed by the bursting of a cannon fired at a democratic meeting. The town of Cattaraugus, N. Y., was destroyed by fire yesterday. There was no injury to life or limb, though the loss is heavy. Mrs. Pierrepont Morgan, of New York, was capsize in a boat yesterday. She lost \$15,000 worth of jewelry which divers are trying to recover. A cyclone struck Havana yesterday, blowing down trees, and unroofing houses. It is believed further mischief was inflicted on the island. At Winnipeg a mother dashed into the flames to save her children from burning in an adjoining room. She died of her injuries and her children were saved by outsiders. Arthur White, aged 19 years, a Denver bank messenger, forged a check for \$10,000 and had it cashed. He was apprehended in Victoria, B. C., yesterday and \$8,500 of the stolen money recovered. Capt. Baxter, a saloonkeeper in Napa, Cal., was fatally stabbed yesterday by Theodore Medina, who accused Baxter of giving whisky and opium to his (Medina's) wife.
