**TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.**  
**Maine Crops Damaged \$1,000,000.**  
NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—Advices  
covering the state of Maine estimate  
the damage to sweet corn and crops  
at \$1,000,000.  
**Nurses to Fight Yellow Jack.**  
NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 9.—Thirty  
trained nurses have been sent to  
Jacksonville, Fla., to aid in the  
care of the yellow fever patients.  
**Enterprising Hunt.**  
WALLA WALLA, Sept. 8.—G. W.  
Hunt proposes to form a stock com-  
pany with a capital of \$600,000, and  
build a fine hotel on Main street,  
near the new depot.  
Part of the machinery for the elec-  
tric light plant has arrived.  
Pendleton people have accepted  
Hunt's proposition to build a line to  
that city for a bonus of \$30,000, and  
have gone to work to raise the money.

**American Murdered in Mexico.**  
NOGALES, A. T., Sept. 8.—The  
dead body of an American, found  
near Santa Ana, Sonora, a few days  
ago, turns out to be that of C. H.  
Jones, a wealthy stock dealer of  
Coehise county, Arizona, who had  
gone to Sonora with a large amount  
of money to purchase cattle. The  
appearance of the remains indicated  
murder and robbery, and several  
parties have been arrested on sus-  
picion.  
**More Foreign Laborers.**  
NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—Twenty-  
five English cotton weavers have  
just landed through Castle Garden.  
It is said their coming is due to a  
strike of cotton weavers in England.  
They have come here to get better  
wages offered in this country.  
Eleven were detained upon the  
ground that they were paupers, but  
upon showing sufficient passage  
money to reach Fall River and  
Boston they were allowed to go on.

**Mine Trouble Unsettled.**  
ELLENSBURG, Sept. 8.—To-day  
the mines at Roslyn were closed  
down, to remain so indefinitely, by  
the company, the miners refusing to  
work on the terms proposed, all  
trains being discontinued on the  
branch except what is necessary to  
carry the mails.  
The company will now probably  
import some more of the negroes em-  
ployed under the contract system.  
This is a hard blow to miners, as a  
large number of them own homes.  
It is not yet known what action  
will be taken.

**Big Reward.**  
LONGVIEW, Tex., Sep. 9.—Gov-  
ernor Ross has offered \$500 reward  
for the arrest and convicting of the  
murderers of Harrison Spencer. The  
commissioners' court of this county  
has offered \$500, and the citizens'  
reward amounts to \$600. A price of  
\$1700 is placed on the heads of  
Spencer's murderers. Subscriptions  
from the citizens of the country  
have not been reported yet. There  
is no doubt that the reward will  
reach \$2000. Harrison Spencer was  
kidnapped Saturday night, August  
25th, and his decomposed body  
found three days later hanging from  
a limb. There are no clues yet.

**Murderers Convicted.**  
PEACHTREEVILLE, Sept. 9.—The jury  
in the cases of I. H. Myers, John  
Olsen and Wm. Drager, on trial for  
the murder of Lowell near Sacra-  
mento last winter, this morning re-  
turned a verdict finding all three  
guilty of murder in the first degree.  
The district attorney closed the  
arguments in the Lowell murder  
case last night and the case was sub-  
mitted to the jury at 10:20. At 2  
o'clock this morning it returned with  
a verdict finding each of the defend-  
ants, I. H. Myers, John Olsen and  
Wm. Drager, guilty of murder in  
the first degree. All the prisoners  
bowed their heads. Olsen for a  
short time was affected to tears.  
After their return to prison Myers'  
cries and sobs could be heard on the  
street. This afternoon Myers stated  
to the officers that he intended the  
crime when he left Sacramento, and  
he got Olsen and Drager to accom-  
pany him on a hunting expedition,  
not letting them know his purpose,  
until he himself committed the  
crime.

San Francisco had a \$1,000,000 fire  
on Saturday.  
Wire fence swindlers have been

Murat Halstead was interviewed,

John Ingalls and Perry Brown,  
two wealthy stockmen of Cheyenne,  
settled their dispute with shooting  
irons—Brown was killed.  
Five masked men held up a train  
near Belmont, A. T., Saturday night,  
but in their haste they allowed the  
express car to escape. Finding their  
mistake, they took to their horses  
and rode away.

**The O. P. Pushing Along.**  
J. C. Caywood called at the office  
to-day and reports everything in his  
locality, near Turner and on beyond  
Stayton, in a flourishing condition  
and the farmers happy. He also  
said that Lee Morgan, his stepson,  
who is freighting for the railroad  
from Stayton to the front, reported  
that the contractors had blasted  
through the "point" and were busy  
laying track and will soon be 10 or  
12 miles beyond Don Smith's.  
Powder was going to the front for  
further operations. The "mungs-  
nesian milkiness" of the Santiam,  
learnedly referred to by the States-  
man's geological and mineralogical  
editor is probably accounted for by  
the contents of a chalk hill through  
which the railroad grade passes be-  
ing thrown into the river.

**Portland Railroad Improvements.**  
The city council reports reads  
thus:  
The ordinance granting the North-  
ern Pacific Terminal Company the  
right to close up certain streets was  
read twice by title and put upon its  
final passage. The vote was unani-  
mous in favor of its adoption.

This indicates the filling up of  
low places about Couch Lake, the  
contracts being already let, a corres-  
pondent informs us, and material  
improvements such as a fine depot.  
Salem passengers will soon be able  
to avoid the ferrage across the river  
as the cars will take them right into  
Portland, over the new bridge.
