### TELEGRAPHIC TIDINGS.

**Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.**

**Fire the Chinese—Smallpox and Yellow Fever—News, Etc.**

**The Yellow Fever in Florida.**  
JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 7.—Edwin Martin, editor of the Times-Union, died this morning. Dr. Neil Mitchell reports as follows: New cases, 33; deaths, 9; all whites. Total new cases to date (corrected), 3151; deaths, 291.

**Indians on the Warpath.**  
SPOKANE FALLS, Oct. 6. Some drunken Indians who were camped near town attacked the chief of police yesterday, who tried to arrest them. A party of police and citizens went to his assistance, when the Indians fired on the party, who returned the fire, killing one Indian and wounding another.

**Battling With Smallpox.**  
TORONTO, Oct. 6.—Smallpox is spreading here. Last night another case was discovered in Sherburne street, one of the finest streets in the city. The local health board has become alarmed at the spread of the disease, and has begun compulsory vaccination. Ten physicians started out this morning, each taking separate districts, with instructions to visit every house, and vaccinate every inmate who has not been vaccinated within five days.

**The Chinese Must Go.**  
TRUCKEE, Oct. 6.—Eight Chinamen were still in town yesterday notwithstanding the request of the citizens that they leave. Each Mongolian wanted pay for his property. The citizens subscribed money enough to buy five frame buildings at the price asked by the Chinamen, and this afternoon a large concourse of people marched to Chinatown and proceeded to tear down the buildings that were purchased. No other property was harmed, and no Chinamen were injured or even insulted.

**A Band of Anarchists.**  
ST. LOUIS, Oct. 7.—A special from Winfield, Kansas, states that there is great excitement in that vicinity over the discovery of a secret military order of anarchists, known as the "National Order of Videttes." It exists in Cowley and Sumner counties. A man named Price, formerly of St. Louis, is given as the leader of the band. The agitation is increased by the discovery that several well known citizens are members of it. The discovery was made by a detective who was initiated in the order.

**The Game of Tan.**  
The fascinating game of "tan," the favorite Chinese method of gambling is thus explained by a San Francisco policeman:  
A mat is spread on a table; the tacks are put in to form a square. The sides of the square are numbered from one to four. The dealer takes a handful of buttons from his sack, puts them on the table and places the cup over them. He then tells the gamblers to place their money. Some bet on one, some on two, and others on three or four. The dealer takes off the cup, takes his stick and draws down from the pile four buttons at a time. The number of buttons that remain on the table decides who wins. If two are left the man betting on the side of the square bearing that number rakes in the chips, which are beads and strips of paper. Large sums of money are bet this way, and many of these Chinese spend every cent they make at "tan."

There is considerable gravel land in Oregon which has generally been considered inferior in quality, probably on account of its not having proved so valuable for growing vegetables and grains as that which is clear of gravel. But such land has been found to be of the very best for fruit raising, especially for the culture of plums and prunes.

Three Chinamen were permitted to land at San Francisco Saturday, on the ground of being American born.

A man and woman have made \$5,000 in Chicago by selling cleverly forged tickets on the Illinois Central railroad.

Moody, the great evangelist is in San Francisco, and will engage in evangelistic work on this coast the coming winter.

In view of the influx of Chinese into Siberia, it is urged that measures be taken to regulate Mongolian immigration to that country.

W. F. Daly, the actor and sporting man, is dying of blood poisoning from a wound in the hand received by striking a man in the teeth.

General Adam Badeau's suit against the heirs of General U. S. Grant to recover \$10,000 for the services that he is said to have rendered upon "Grant's Memoirs" is now in court.

Hattie Flack, the St. Louis belle who eloped with her negro coachman, has returned home. She was living with her paramour in a hut in Kentucky, and would leave him only when told he had another wife.

**Is He the Texas Fiend?**

A large amount of gossip and speculation is going on in police circles over the identity of the perpetrator of the horrible crimes committed by the Whitechapel fiend, and which have up to the present time baffled the Hawkshaws of Scotland Yard. No end of theories have been freely advanced.

The women killed were all fallen and degraded creatures, and were murdered in the same horrible manner, at about the same hour, on different days and in the same locality. These who have followed these remarkable crimes will remember that the brutal assassin always pounced upon his victims in the street at daybreak. After killing them he mutilated their bodies in the most inhuman manner, plucking their hearts from their bodies and laying them upon his victims' breasts. He hacked other portions of their bodies, with a seeming desire to get revenge for the transmission of disease. The victims were not robbed, and they were not known to have an enemy in the world. The theory is advanced that the man who committed these crimes is a sufferer from a mania, brought about by indiscretion, and his crimes are due to the morbid desire for revenge on those who, in his mad judgment, have been the cause of his condition.

The vicinity of Austin, Texas, was thrown into just such a state of alarm about five years ago when six women were brutally murdered and butchered by just such a maniac as is described. Vigilance committees were organized and lynching parties sent out, but the perpetrator had covered his tracks well. In this case two of the murdered women were supposed to be respectable mothers of families, but the explanation of this is only too clear. The murderer mistook them for members of that class who had caused his frightful condition. Whether the London murderer is the same one who did the butchery in Texas, is not known, but that it is possible, not probable. There is nothing wonderful in two men being afflicted with the same disease, or that two men being sufficiently incensed at their enamouratus to cause them to spill their blood.
