

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

Both Captains Censured.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 12.—The United States inspector of steam vessels upon the recent collision between the steamers Oceanic and City of Chester holds that the captains of both vessels were at fault.

Blaine in Indiana.

MITCHELL, Ind., Oct. 12.—Gov. Hill, of New York, inaugurated his canvass of Indiana at this place to-day. He was met at the depot by Gov. Gray and others, and escorted to an adjacent grove, where a large audience had assembled.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 12.—Blaine was driven to the union station at noon to-day and left for Evansville. The station was thronged with people, who loudly cheered as he stood on the platform, and waved his hand and bade them farewell.

William at Rome.

ROME, Oct. 12.—Emperor William will visit the Vatican at 1 o'clock this afternoon. He will be received by the pope in Throne hall. His reception will be marked by most impressive ceremonies. The visit of the emperor to the pope does not meet with favor in nationalists circles.

A Romantic Career.

John Boyle O'Reilly, poet, author and editor of the Boston Pilot, has had some thrilling experiences in his life. At twenty-one he was sentenced to be shot for disseminating Fenian ideas in the ranks of the Fourth Hussars, of which regiment he was a member. The sentence was commuted to twenty years' penal servitude in Western Australia. He escaped at the end of the first year and secured a berth on a whaler, which after a six months' cruise again landed him in Australia. After a number of romantic escapes from capture he finally succeeded in embarking for America.

The Chicago Strike.

CHICAGO, Oct. 12.—The street car companies, city authorities and general public are beginning to realize that the farce of running two cars daily over their lines guarded by a hundred or two police, and followed by a howling, surging mob, is something far removed from resumption of street car traffic, besides being expensive to the company and city. How long this will continue no one knows. There is less prospect of a settlement now than at any time since the strike began. In the meantime the public is paying double fare for transportation and taking the situation philosophically.

Killed by Strikers.

BEVIER, Mo., Oct. 12.—Thomas Wardell, a wealthy coal mine operator, was killed here this afternoon by striking miners during a riot. Nearly all of the mine operators have engaged new men, and these have been coming from abroad for several days past. The action of the operators greatly incensed the strikers, who have been bitter in their expressions against their former employers, especially Wardell. To-day the new men were set upon by the strikers, and a general battle followed. There is intense excitement at Bevier, and fears are entertained of further bloodshed. The sheriff and a posse have gone to Bevier.

The Oregon City people want a road to Bald mountain to bring out the rich minerals which exist there. It is said that the road can be built for \$10,000.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

There are still some hopes for the recovery of Millionaire Flood who is in Europe.

The great republican rally at Portland was a gigantic affair. There were 4000 in line.

It develops that Smith disguised himself at Corvallis and sent the telegram to Salem himself. The barber is not as dead as he would have it believed.

The first locomotive that ever steamed up in Bellingham bay was put in motion on Cornwall's railroad at Whatcom yesterday. It is called the D. O. Mills and is now hauling iron to the railroad front for construction.

Olympia was visited by an unusually heavy rain and wind storm accompanied by lightning, at two o'clock yesterday morning. During the storm, notwithstanding the darkness, Mount Rainier, sixty miles distant, was distinctly visible, being almost a mass of electricity.

Inspector Walter Bowen, assisted by Inspector Mrs. Creed, seized 50 pounds of smoking opium on the steamer Potter upon the steamer's arrival from Victoria yesterday. The opium was concealed under the skirts of two women, giving the name of Kate Lellicore and Nellie Jalefs. The women were taken into custody.

OCCIDENTAL JOTTINGS.

News And Notes of a General Interest to the Westerner.

Bears are reported more numerous than common on Rogue river and other mountain sections.

A Lakeview man says he can gather 1000 onions from his ranch that will weigh 1000 pounds.

Every day adds fresh proofs of the truth of the often repeated statement that plenty of good grapes can be raised in Oregon.

The enterprising Tillamookers are soliciting subscriptions to build a telephone line from Tillamook to Astoria, by way of the Seaside and the Fort.

Harding Grange, Clackamas county, will hold a fair on October 16th and 17th, at Viola. There is a noticeable awakening among the Granges of Oregon.

Many are planting extensively of various fruit trees. The fruit crop this year was simply immense, and people are beginning to realize the advantages of this section for fruit-growing.

The Union Labor party of Oregon has now a state organization and three nominees for Presidential Electors, as follows: E. P. Hammond, Medford, Jackson county; H. R. Wilson, Albina, Multnomah county; J. F. Hendricks, Harrisburg, Linn county.

The surveyors on the Astoria & South Coast railroad expect to complete the survey to Seaside by the last of next week. As soon as this is done the engineer will make an estimate of the cost of the road, and contracts will be let, provided there is no opposition to the right of way.

P. F. Brady, a railroad contractor, of Colorado Springs, is at Albany. He has accepted a sub-contract on the Oregon Pacific eastward extension. He expects to take a big contract on the road in the spring. He owns an extensive railroad plant in Colorado, which he proposes to bring there next spring.

The peaks in the Cascade range are nearly stripped of their perpetual snow. Especially is this fact noticeable on the north Sister, whose eastern and northern sides are free of snow all the way up, excepting two or three small patches, which have the appearance of small glaciers as viewed from Prineville.

Work was begun Wednesday by the Pacific Bridge Company on the suspension bridge which is to span the river at Oregon City. Some five of the wire cables were stretched across the river. It will take about a month to finish the bridge. The bridge is being built by Clackamas county and no toll will be charged for crossing it.
