THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION.

STATE OF OREGON, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, SALEM, NOVEMBER 7, 1888. This year now drawing to a close has been one of unexampled peace, plenty and prosperity within the borders of the state.

AN EXTRA SESSION.

It has become almost evident that unless the democrats of the House of Representatives change their tactics during the coming session President Harrison, soon after his inauguration, will call an extra session of congress.

This, says the San Francisco Chronicle, is not so much a political matter as it is a matter of equity, Dakota and Washington certainly, and Montana probably, are entitled to admission as states by virtue of possessing every necessary qualification, and it is not right that their admission should be postponed until the end of the year 1890 or the beginning of 1891, when the matter can be so easily and quickly settled at an extra session.

If there is any one thing more indefensible in the present democratic administration than another, it is the conduct of the House of Representatives with regard to Washington and Dakota. A mere handful of men, without any personal interest in the question, but controlled solely by notions of political expediency, have kept nearly a million American citizens in a condition of disfranchisement.

expressing their political sentiments at the ballot box, and his party either openly applauds him or tacitly acquiesces in what he does. Let the incoming president signalize the restoration of the republican party to power by an act of justice. Let him call the Fifty-first Congress together and recommend to that body immediate action on the subject of disfranchised territories, and he will perform an act which all good American citizens, all who believe in equal rights for all our people, will approve.

BRICK POMEROY'S SCHEME.

Most people who have learned to regard "Brick" Pomerooy as dead now learn that if he ever died he has been resurrected and has gained a notriety that many of his kind, perhaps, would give worlds to enjoy. "Brick," it seems, has abandoned the field of journalism forever. He is now in London, posing as a projector of American mining enterprises, and if the Pall Mall Budget is to be believed the redoubtable ex-journalist has struck a rich school of gudgeons. From the Budget some account of Mr. Pomerooy's stupendous mining schemes is had, and if one-half that presumably venacious journal says of them is true Mr. Pomerooy is going to supply England with money enough to pay the national debt.

But now the business of tunneling and exploring has been taken in hand by a firm of London contractors, Messrs. Vernon, who are showing their faith in the enterprise by taking £50,000 in shares in lieu of £50,000 in cash. Five miles of tunneling now lie before them, but they hope to get through their task in the course of the next four years. Mr. Pomerooy has not gone to London in search of further capital; he has simply come to take up \$2,000,000 that certain London adventurers, confident in the success of his scheme, have placed at his disposal.

The first newspaper published in America of which there is record was edited by a woman—the editor's widow—upon his death. It was called the "Massachusetts Gazette and News-Letter," and under the management of Mrs. Margaret Craper was the only Boston publication which did not temporarily suspend when that city was besieged by the British.

It is a matter of history that the first daily newspaper printed in the world was edited and established by a woman, Elizabeth Mallet, in London, nearly two hundred years ago, it being of a reformatory character.


