Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

A Bold Bad Man.

ALBANY, Or., Dec. 26.-Lewis Taylor was arrested to-day and incarcerated in jail to answer a charge of threatening to shoot several people. He was intoxicated and had been parading up and down the street armed with a revolver. About dusk he began firing into houses and crowds on the streets promiscuously, but fortunately hit no one. When arrested he refused to be taken and tried to kill the officer, who knocked him down with his club, and with the assistance of bystanders he was taken off to jail. He presented a very bloody appearance and when placed behind the bars still swore vengeance on his captors, and said when he was released he would annihilate them.

The Inaugural Ceremonies.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 25.-Quarrels have been engaged at the Arlington hotel for Gen. Harrison and party here to witness the inaugural ceremonies next March. In accordance with the precedent established by Andrew Jackson and observed by every president but two since that time, President Cleveland will call for President-Elect Harrison at Willard's and escort him to the capitol.

A Polygamist Pardoned.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 25.-The president has granted a pardon to Bishop A. A. Kimball, convicted in the first district court of Utah of adultery and sentenced to eight months imprisonment. The president's action is based upon the representation that the prisoner is in advanced stages of consumption and would not survive in his present surroundings.

Canadian Cheap Labor.

DETROIT, Dec. 25.-Congressman Ford, chairman of the special committee on immigration and labor, began an investigation. The evidence showed that large numbers of Canadians worked in this city during the day, retaining the alien character. This amounted in the printer's trade to 40 per cent, and among street car men to 25 per cent.

Fired by Natural Gas.

NEW CUMBERLAND, W. Va., Dec. 25.-Fire originating from a natural gas jet destroyed Wascott's drug and jewelry store together with Prosser's jewelry store and barber shop, four dwellings and several other buildings. The river cut off the fire from the rest of the town, and was its only salvation.

That Train Robbery.

TRUCKEE, Dec. 25.-No traces of the train robbers is reported, although the country is being scoured in all directions. It is believed the robbers boarded some train and are safely out of reach. Wells, Fargo & Co.'s representatives here report the loss at \$55,000.

Election Contest.

BALTIMORE, Dec. 25.-Sidney E. Mudd, republican candidate for congressman in the fifth Maryland district, has notified the committee that he will contest his seat in congress on the grounds of intimidation and other irregularities.

On a Strike.

LONDON, Dec. 25.-At Bolton a part of the common operatives are on a strike. The masters threaten a general lockout. A prolonged struggle is expected, as the operatives are well supplied with money.

Attempted Assassination. MADRID, Dec. 25.-A bomb exploded last evening in front of the residence of Silvela, a conservative member of the chamber of deputies. No damage was done.

The Mississippi Race War. ST. LOUIS, Dec. 25.-The latest advice from Wabakak, Miss., the scene of the race troubles, are to the effect that three more negroes have been captured, but their names are withheld.

Destructive Snow Storm. TRUCKEE, Dec. 25.-The heavy snow storm raging on the mountains is particularly disastrous to the ice crop. Men are engaged in scraping the ponds, trying to keep the snow from destroying the ice.

A Watery Grave.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 25.-The steamboat John H. Hanna, from Ouachita river, with a large number of passengers, was burned last night at Plaquemine, La. It is stated that of 100 persons on board, only 14 are known to have been saved. The J. H. Hanna was built in Madison, Ky.; she was of 377 tonnage, and was owned by the Ouachita River Consolidated Line. She was valued at \$18,000, and was insured for \$12,000 in local and foreign companies.

Oregon Weather.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Dec. 25.-This has proved the most remarkable winter day in Minnesota history. Before sunrise on the 23rd, the thermometer registered fifty degrees above zero, and at noon fifty-eight. The signal-service observer reports this as showing the warmest December day ever known here. There is not a particle of snow on the ground, and the ice is running in the river.

The Ice Carnival directors are in the dumps.

Buried Alive.

KALAMAZOO, Mich., Dec. 25.-At Comstock, Monday, Dennis Carmichael, a well-known citizen, dropped dead and his body was interred. It was noticed that his countenance wore a lifelike expression, and after the funeral the fact became the gossip of the street. The rumors reached the mother and brother of Carmichael and aroused their fears that he had been buried alive. They caused the body to be exhumed and efforts were made to resuscitate him. The work was continued several days without success. The same lifelike expression of the face which led to the disinterment of the body remained, however, though the doctors pronounced the man dead. The relatives will not yet consent to his reburial.

OCCIDENTAL JOTTINGS.

News And Notes of a General Interest to the Westerner.

The people of Corvallis are afraid there will be a riot there over the non-payment of railroad laborers who were working for Jacobs & Neugass who failed.

Messrs. O'Connor & Barr have completed their contract on the Oregon Pacific. They have received their full payment from the Oregon Pacific and have paid off all their men.

The granting by congress of the right of way to the Astoria and South Coast railway company to build a bridge over Young's river, was another big step in the preliminary work of the road.

Albina seems disposed to resist the efforts that will be made at the meeting of the legislature to annex the city to Portland. Last summer several meetings were held to obtain the views of the people on the matter and the annexation proposition was rejected by a pretty large vote.

Stock Inspector Gray of Crook county reports 295,000 sheep in that county, and of which number 48,000 were diseased with "scab." A large number have been treated since reported, and it is believed, cured. Mr. Gray reports the sheep throughout the county generally in good condition otherwise, and the owners fairly well supplied with feed for the winter, except in the neighborhood of Bridge creek, where if hard weather prevails there will be considerable loss.
