MOODY AND HIS REVIVAL.

The Churches Filled To Their Utmost Capacity—Much Interest.

Beginning with their meeting at the M. E. church yesterday afternoon the revival meetings conducted by Messrs. Moody, Studd and Burke have drawn such large congregations that the churches have been pressed to their fullest capacity.

In this discourse he took for his text that passage from the gospel by St. John which avers that "As a man soweth that shall he also reap." His subject was considered under the four heads, viz: Receive Him, Believe Him, Trust Him and Take Him.

The following pertinent resolutions have been passed by the Lane county Pomona grange:

Resolved That we respectfully ask the Oregon legislature at its coming session to memorialize congress to create a department of agriculture, the commissioner to be a member of the president's cabinet.

That until such amendment had been made, that we urge the legislature to elect some reliable and practical agriculturist to represent Oregon in the United States senate.
