News And Notes of a General Interest to the Westerner.

The students of the agricultural college at Corvallis now wear uniform.

The real estate sales in Marion county during 1888 amounted to \$937,355.

Wm. Darrow, a young man aged about 18 years, died of smallpox on Long Tom on the 24th ult.

The hull of the stranded Yaquina Bay appears to be as perfect as it was the day she went ashore.

A recent event of Tangent was the celebration of the golden wedding of John Beard and wife of that place.

A petition is being circulated at Astoria asking the legislature to pass a law to prohibit salmon catching with seines and with traps.

At the government quarry, two miles above Toledo, 32 men are employed getting out rock and loading it on the barges. The steam tug Favorite takes down a load every day.

It is now thought by sanguine timber men that large lumber interests will spring up in the upper Rogue river country in a short time, necessitating the building of a town at or about the falls of Mill creek.

Grant county has the most horses and mules of any other county in Oregon, 16,825. It also leads in cattle, with 47,118. Crook county is ahead in sheep, with 221,736. Lane county is in the lead for porkers, having 7025.

TELEGRAPHIC TIDINGS.

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

THE GREAT BALLOONATIC.

Van Tassel Makes a Perilous Parachute Leap at Seattle.

SEATTLE, W. T., Jan. 3.—Prof. Van Tassel, the celebrated aeronaut, made a parachute jump of seven thousand feet yesterday. His object was to drive his balloon above and leap into the harbor, but he could get no further than the water's edge. The first five hundred feet were made with terrible velocity, but the umbrella opened, and the remainder of the descent was made easily. A sudden stoppage caused Van Tassel to lose his hold, and he was fastened to the parachute only by a small strap around the waist. He finally regained his grasp and made the remainder of the descent in safety. He alighted in water waist deep comparatively unharmed.

Americans' Lives in Danger.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—A special from Port au Prince says: "An article in the Hayti newspapers contains a furious threat against Thompson, minister of the United States to Hayti. Many Americans have been arrested, both men and women. The American consulate is filled with refugees. Hippolytes' army is marching on this city (Port au Prince.) In an interview with Legitime today, he said he would show no clemency to foreigners who interfered with Haytian politics. Legitime stated also that he would shoot all if necessary. The excitement here is intense. Americans in Port au Prince are in danger of their lives."

Cleveland's Future Residence.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—A Washington special to the Herald says: "It seems at last to be definitely determined where President and Mrs. Cleveland will live after the 4th of March. Mrs. Cleveland, in conversation with a friend a few days ago, said that Mr. Cleveland and she intended to go to Buffalo for a visit of a few weeks immediately after the close of the President's term, and then would take a house in Georgetown, a suburb in Washington, from whose heights one has a fine view of the Potomac."

Utah and Statehood.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Among the petitions and the memorials presented and referred to-day was one by Edmunds from the branch of the women's relief board of Salt Lake City remonstrating against any action of congress looking to the admission of Utah as a state. Edmunds said he was happy to think that there was not much danger of any such action at this session. Another by Hewitt proposed is enfranchisement on account of sex.

Montana to be Admitted.

CHICAGO, Jan. 2.—Col. Broder, of Montana, is in the city. He has received a letter from Senator Mitchell, of Oregon, stating that Montana and other territories, except Utah and New Mexico, are likely to be admitted during this session.

Hotel Burned.

SPOKANE FALLS, Jan. 2.—A fire totally destroyed the new hotel at the "Reds" on the stage line from Osborne to Murray, in the Coeur d'Alene mountains. The fire was accidental. The occupants escaped with their clothes only. Loss, \$3,000.

One Cent Postage.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—John Hennicker Henlon, M. P., will visit the United States this year. He expects to appear before congress in advocacy of ocean penny postage. He has figures to show that it would be a profitable venture.
