FULL ACCOUNT OF THE ATTACK ON THE BALTIMORE MEN.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—The president in his message says: "But the most serious accident disclosed by the correspondence is that by the attack of the sailors of the Baltimore in the port of Valparaiso on October 16th. In my annual message, speaking upon information then in my possession, I said as follows: 'I had been able to learn no other explanation of this bloody work had been suggested than that it had its origin in hostility to these men as sailors of the United States wearing the uniforms of their government, and not in any individual act or personal animosity.'"
