IN THE BUSINESS CENTER.

Bawdy Houses Forcing Their Way Towards Commercial Street.

No action has been taken so far to remove the house of ill fame from opposite the Hotel Willamette. It is an injury to that property and an injury to the entire business interests of the city.

The city authorities should consider this matter at once. The city police should be ordered by the mayor or by the city council to raid the house that has recently been opened in the same block with the Ladd & Bush bank and other prominent business houses of the Capital City of Oregon.

THE JOURNAL wishes to sound a warning against this encroachment by houses of prostitution upon the best business block in the city. Such things cannot be tolerated across the street from our only first-class hotel, and in the block with our principal bank and leading business house.

It is not necessary to call names in this matter. A newspaper is not a public prosecutor, nor defamer of individuals. It is not necessary to state that a Salem business man in good society pays the rent for these women. The facts are not hard to get at. But the city government should act.
