

Wiped Out.

President Cleveland Orders the
Cherokee Strip Opened.

Riot in Pennsylvania.
MAHONEY CITY, Aug. 22.—Last night the citizens of Gilberton tore up the track of the Schuylkill Traction Company because the company failed to comply with an ordinance. The attempt of the company to relay tracks with an armed force this morning brought on the conflict with citizens, resulting in the death of James Tarritt and Wm. Hughes, citizens, and injury of Eyan Davis and Richard Amour, assistant superintendent of the company. Will Connor was also shot in the hand and foot and others are reported injured. The wildest excitement prevails.

Yellow Fever.
BRUNSWICK, Ga., Aug. 22.—S. B. Harris is ill with yellow fever. The place has been quarantined and the authorities are urging the people to leave the city. Three thousand people are expected to get away.

Cherokee Strip.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—The president has issued his proclamation opening the Cherokee strip to settlement, at the hour of 12 o'clock at noon, central standard time, Saturday, the 16th of September.

The Winlock Fire.
WINLOCK, Aug. 22.—Fire broke out last night in the back room of the reception saloon, and before it was checked destroyed the Traders' bank. Whistler & Phillips' jewelry store and cigars, Whistler's barber shop, Dr. Whiteside's office, J. F. Fowler's general merchandise store and residence, Winlock hotel, Reception saloon, Eddy's drug store, Central hotel, Hadley & Griffith, general merchandise, H. C. Griffith's meat market, Dr. Wood's office.
No hotel is left in town. There was but very little insurance. The fire is supposed to be of incendiary origin.

THE LOSS.
The total loss is estimated at \$25,000. Insurance \$5000. Heaviest losers are Hadley and Griffith hotel and grocery. Their loss is \$8000, covered by \$2000 in advance.

Clothing House.
NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—S. Sykes & Co., wholesale clothiers, failed. Liabilities \$320,000. Assets 1430,000.

Highwaymen.
HEPPNER, Or., Aug. 22.—Frank Sloan, a very prominent stockman, accompanied by J. A. Thompson, his assistant, left Heppner for Butter creek, about 25 miles from Heppner, to pay for and receive cattle. When about three miles out two masked men held them up and relieved them of \$185 and a gold watch. The sheriff and posse are out after them now.

Bread and Work.
MILWAUKEE, Aug. 22.—A mob of unemployed laborers marched to the city hall this morning, and called out the mayor, who was greeted with cries of "bread" and "work." The mayor advised them to return home, assured them the city would soon have money to prosecute public improvements and give many men work. Then the mob dispersed.

In the Senate.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—The premium on currency today is lower, with quotations at 1 1/2 and 2 per cent. Spot gold is 1 1/2.

In the House.
The house passed senate bill, admitting free of duty all articles intended for exhibition at California Mid-Winter Fair. Johnson's bill to permit exchange of United States bonds for treasury notes was introduced and referred to committee on banking and currency. The silver debate was resumed and Buckner, (Dem.) addressed the house in favor of repeal of purchasing clause.

Some Silver Facts.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—In response to a resolution of inquiry on subject of silver purchase, under act of 1890, Secretary Carlisle sent to House of Representatives today a letter setting forth following facts: From Aug. 15 1890 to Aug. 16 1893 the department has purchased 161,522,000 fine ounces costing \$150,669,450. Treasury notes to amount of \$150,115,985 have been issued in payment of silver bullion, of which \$714,636 have been redeemed in standard silver dollars and retired.

Since August 31, 1892, up to August 1, 1893, \$49,194,100 treasury notes been redeemed in gold. 38,067,185 standard dollars have been coined from bullion purchased under the act of 1890. On the 14th instant the government owned of silver purchased under act of 1890 183,161,375 ounces.

Portland Savings.
PORTLAND, Aug. 22. On petition of Receiver Thompson, in the circuit court today an order was issued making the Western National and Chemical National banks of New York, preferred creditors of Portland Savings bank. The banks are reported to the amount of \$25,000 each.

In Love With a White.
NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—Ah Bow, a Chinaman, committed suicide at No. 6 Chatham square by hanging. He was a clerk in a Chinese grocery store at that address. He killed himself because a white girl, known as Nellie Lee had deserted him for another Chinaman. The Chinaman who discovered the body did not report the matter to the police and it was merely by chance that they learned of the case. The body was removed to an undertaking establishment. It rests next to the corpse of Chong Poy Sing, who died four weeks ago. Sing's body will be shipped to China.

WILL VETO THE SILVER BILL

If Any Passes Congress At All Silvery.

IT WILL MEET THE VETO BLUDGEON.

Details of Debate and Other Washington News.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—The impression is growing about the capital the present extraordinary session of congress may come to an end about the middle of September. This appears to be based upon confidence in the possibilities of a compromise being entered into within that period upon the financial question. Nearly all the important legislation accomplished in recent years has been the result of compromise, and the outcome of a conference of committees. Those persons who hold to the opinion that an adjournment is possible next month say that Mr. Vest's proposition to provide for free coinage of silver at a ratio of 20 to 1 will be passed by the senate, and ultimately will become part of the bill for unconditional repeal, which, it is expected, will be passed by the house. The likelihood of a veto by President Cleveland of such a measure has been scouted by believers in the reported early adjournment. They argue it would be impossible to rally a two-thirds vote in either house to pass it over his veto, and that nothing could be accomplished so far as the financial situation is concerned by congress remaining in session after such a veto had been received. More experienced watchers of political events place no confidence in these early adjournment theories.

In the house interest in the financial discussion was dwarfed today in the greater interest everyone felt in the announcement of standing committees by Speaker Crisp. No one was prepared for the radical changes made in the personnel of some of the important committees. Springer of Illinois gave way to Wilson of West Virginia as chairman of the ways and means committee and Illinois is given the chairmanship of the committee on banking and currency. Holman of Indiana, the venerable "watchdog" of the treasury, was deposed from the committee on appropriations in favor of Bayers of Texas and given the head of the committee on Indian affairs.

Bland of Missouri was retained as the head of the committee on coinage, but the free coinage people were disappointed in the committee being changed so as to leave much doubt whether the free coinage people are in the minority and whether the financial policy of the administration may not find a majority in the committee. Congressman Tracy of New York, who was an administration man and second on the committee, claims the speaker deferred to the repealing element to such an extent as to make the committee "mildly free coinage" instead of "radically free coinage," and insists upon counting Kilgore of Texas a free coinage man. The committee will stand nine to eight for free coinage. The committee on banking and currency is said to be opposed to free coinage eleven to six. The removal of Holman from the head of the appropriations committee is interpreted by some to mean that the speaker favors more liberal appropriations in the 53d congress. The removal of Springer from the ways and means committee gives this most important chairmanship of the house to the South, but it is said that aside from this the make-up of the committee on ways and means does not indicate any essential change from the policy of the last congress.

When asked for a statement as to the reasons which impelled the speaker to depose him from the chairmanship of the ways and means committee Congressman Springer said:
"To say I am surprised at my deposition from the chairmanship of the ways and means committee and appointment as chairman of the committee on banking and currency, is only a feeble expression of the truth. I had no reservation whatever, from the speaker as to his failure to reappoint or as to his intention to make me chairman of another committee. I go from work which I have given the best study of my life to a committee to the business of which I have given but little attention heretofore. I know nothing of the motives of the speaker or of the object he had in view. He has assured me he desired to do that which he thought was best for the country and the Democratic party. I hope he is not mistaken, but opinions may differ."

It has been practically decided by the leaders of the silver forces in the house to ask the house to amend the terms of the order under which the pending debate is being conducted. Owing to the demand upon the speaker for time to speak under the rule for general debate, it was suggested that the five-minute debates to which the last three days of the week had been assigned should be curtailed one day, and that the time be added to the periods set for the general discussion. Should the house agree to the change agreed upon by the leaders, Thursday and Friday will be devoted to talk under the five-minute rule, and on Saturday the debate will be closed under the general rule. This will give the leading speakers an opportunity to speak at length when interest in the debate will be at the climax, and add thereby to the favoring circumstances so eagerly sought and thoroughly appreciated by the average public speaker.

Orders have been issued by the treasury department to all sub-treasury to pay out gold over the counters the same as other classes of money. The effect of this is practically to place the gold reserve among the available treasury cash assets. As a result the gold balance is somewhat reduced being slightly below \$100,000,000. The net treasury balance is \$11,750,000.


They May Never Marry.
