AN UNTENABLE POSITION.

The Pacific Insurance Union has taken a position it cannot possibly maintain. It is, in short, that it can say to the people of Oregon what insurance companies they may do business with, in addition to a right they have long exercised of saying what they shall pay for insurance.

Oregon people have a special interest in resenting this attempted dictation of a gigantic trust. The blow is aimed at a home company—the State of Salem. The Insurance Union has added a slip to all its policies forbidding the insured party from taking any additional insurance in any but "Trust" companies, belonging to the Union.

Oregon people are sure to resent this and will be heard from in no uncertain way in reply to the dictations of the trust. The sooner the Pacific Insurance Union retreats from its arrogant assumption to own this state, the better for the common people it represents.

It may be of interest to note that the "State of Salem" is standing the fight well. Investigation shows that it is financially stronger than ever. It has the ablest legal talent in the state among its stockholders, men like ex-Supreme Justice Thayer, and Richard Williams of Portland. It has never borrowed a dollar to do business with and has never paid a cent of interest. It has paid over a thousand losses in Oregon alone and is better able to meet its obligations today than any company doing business in the state.

F. Tennyson Neely, publisher, Chicago, has presented in an attractive volume Col. Richard Henry Savage's "The Passing Show." The sketches are graphic sketches from many strange lands, and reveals the graceful story teller. The library form preserves many a meritorious piece of literary work that could never possibly get into print in the old expensive book form.

BOOKS OF CHILDLIFE.

Besides being a readable novel "Sweetheart Given" is an original study in the literature of child life. No bappler panorama of Welsh country life could pass before the eyes than that unfolded in his life on the farm in the Vale of Clwyd, North Wales.

"The child-soldier is born to live in every man." These are the words in which Margaret Sydney of "Little Peppers" fame begins her tribute of love entitled "Whittier With the Children," published on plate paper in handsomely engraved octavo by the D. Lothrop Co., Boston. The chapters present in agreeable realism the sweetest incidents of the good gray Quaker poet's life—his child-life and his associations with children.

"An Adventure in Photography" by Octave Thanet, illustrated by photographs by the adventures, deserves to be studied by all would-be artists with the camera rather than reviewed in a newspaper. However, if we attract the attention of several hundred amateurs to the record of valuable experiences here detailed by a skilled hand and trained brain we shall save such persons making thousands of errors, that may cost them much in time, dollars, irritation, humiliation, and vexation of spirit.
