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ELECTION BULLETINS.

Fine Weather in Eastern States

FAVORABLE TO REPUBLICANS.

Exceptionally Heavy Vote Polled in Ohio.

IOWA REPUBLICAN, 15,000 TO 30,000.

Democrats Claiming the Re-Election of Governor Boies— Election Returns.

Crowds gathered early at THE JOURNAL bulletin boards to hear the election returns received by the associated press dispatches. Following dispatches are received up to the hour of going to press, and are a fair index of the result. The completed returns will be printed tomorrow.

FROM ALL THE STATES.

DES MOINES, Iowa, Nov. 7.—Day opened clear and warm. Indications of heavy vote. Seems no doubt of election of entire Republican ticket, with possible exception of Jackson.

Democrats concede as much but claim election of Boies by ten thousand. Republicans claim election of Jackson by 15,000 and rest of ticket by thirty thousand.

JERSEY CITY, Nov. 7.—Weather fine, full vote being polled. Fight against race track element causes unusual interest. Both parties claim legislative. Democrats claim 36 to 24. Nearly a thousand deputies and special police, men sworn in at Patterson and half as many at Newark.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—Weather clear, cool, bracing. Indications are a heavy vote will be polled. Interest centers in candidacy of Judge Joseph Gary. Laboring men voting independently regardless of resolutions of labor party opposing Gary.

OMAHA, Nov. 7.—Weather warm, cloudy, indications of rain. Voting slow.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Weather clear, cold, just right for election. Everything quiet and a heavy vote being polled. Same conditions throughout State.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 7.—Weather cool, clear; vote coming out slowly.

TOLEDO, Nov. 7.—Weather all over Ohio sunshiny, warm; vote exceptionally heavy. In many precincts here half the vote is polled by 9 a. m.

CLEVELAND, Nov. 7.—By 9 o'clock a large vote was polled; everything quiet.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 7.—Election day opened with a fine misty rain; voting heavy.

RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 7.—Weather cloudy, cold, disagreeable, but good vote being polled.

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 7.—Weather cool, cloudy, colored voters came out early, indications of a heavy vote.

TOPEKA, Kan., Nov. 7.—Weather mild, but overcast. In southern and southwestern Kansas, weather fine.

ST. PAUL, Nov. 7.—Weather in South Dakota cloudy, mild; little interest is taken in the election. A light vote is expected.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa, Nov. 6.—The morning opened heavy, gradually clearing. Intense interest is manifested by both parties. Indications of a heavy vote. Plenty of Republican money offered on State ticket with few takers.

BOSTON, Nov. 7.—The weather fine throughout the state. The principal interest is in the fight for governorship; both parties claim election.

Philadelphia, noon: Election proceeding very quietly. It is not thought over 75 per cent. of registration will be polled.

Buffalo: Weather delightful, voting

heavy, home rule Democrats out in force to vote against Maynard.

Des Moines: Republicans claim sixty members of lower house out of one hundred, and thirty out of fifty Democrats are not claiming legislature but say majority will be small.

Danville, Va.: Weather bad, vote light.

Detroit: Fine weather. Good deal of suppressed excitement and a heavy vote are features at today's election.

Louisville, Ky.: Election progressing quietly; prospects for an average vote.

Columbus: Republicans estimate McKinley's plurality not less than 25,000.

Springfield, Mass.: Entire state ticket except governor conceded to Republicans.

Rochester, N. Y.: Maynard is scratching freely.

Salt Lake, Utah: Average vote is being cast. Liberals and Independents each claim majority.

New York: From present outlook Conservative members of both parties admit Maynard's election is very doubtful. Democratic papers which opposed him claim his defeat.

Topeka, Kas.: Secretary of state Osborne does not look for a large Populist plurality if any. He is satisfied with an even standoff against Republicans. Says there are more Democrats in the state than the Populists are willing to admit.

Omaha: Chief interest here is in city ticket. Bemis, Republican for mayor, and Bedford, Democrat are running neck and neck.

Cincinnati: Great crush early at polls. Two thirds vote cast by 10 a. m. at many precincts. Republicans probably carry county by increased majority. Voting through the state is very heavy.

Albany, N. Y.: Republicans claim Judge Maynard is being knifed.

Cleveland Not Shot.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 7.—The report circulated by certain news agencies today that President Cleveland had been shot has no foundation for it.

CHICAGO'S MAYORALTY.

Swift, the Republican, Almost Unanimously Chosen.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—The wrangle over the election of a mayor pro tem was settled last night by the choice of Alderman George B. Swift, he receiving sixty-two votes to five for Alderman McGillin, and one blank being cast. The democratic aldermen who met early in the day but were unable to get a quorum owing to the absence of the republicans, remained in the council chambers until the time of the regular meeting this evening, in order to keep McGillin, their man, in the chair on a plea that the original meeting of which he had been chairman had not adjourned. The republicans who had been sequestered in a room a square from the city hall to keep out of the clutches of the sergeant-at-arms, marched over at 7:30 this evening. The leaders of both factions quickly got together and was decided to avoid any repetition of Saturday's scenes. Every thing was wiped off of the slate and a new vote was taken. McGillin who was chosen chairman on motion of a republican alderman appointed the same tellers as Saturday and the ballot was taken. When the count was completed it was found that some factious aldermen had cast two votes, so the ballot was thrown out and another taken with the result as above. Swift was then sworn in. A special election for the election to fill out the unexpired portion of Carter Harrison's term will be held next month.

Indian Office.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—The president has appointed W. H. Moss, of Bloomfield, Ind., supervisor of Indian schools.

A Fatal Error.

RENO, Nev., Nov. 7.—It is reported that Mollen, the train dispatcher, whose fatal error caused the collision on the Central Pacific Sunday morning and the death of six men, is almost insane. He has been taken to Pyramid lake to avoid the excitement, as it is feared his life will be endangered by the knowledge of the full details of the disaster. The names of the four troops killed were ascertained to be LeRoy Norris, Eldorado, Utah; Frank B. Small, Waterville, Me.; J. A. Williams, Portland, Or., and G. A. Trumbo. The coroner's inquest will be held Wednesday. In Williams' pocket was a paper bearing the address of J. J. Gorman, Fourth and Washington streets, Portland.

FIRING ON OUR FLAG.

Honduras Authorities Demand a Refugee.

HIS SURRENDER WAS REFUSED

And the American Flag Was Fired Upon.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Secretary of State Gresham this morning received a dispatch from the United States Minister Baker, who was on board the steamer Costa Rica, at Amapala, when fired on by Honduras authorities, because the captain of the vessel refused to surrender a refugee from Honduras, on board as a passenger. The dispatch fully confirms the press reports of the firing on the United States flag.

SOME DETAILS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—The Herald's La Libertad, Salvador, dispatch says: Honduras fired upon the American flag this morning. By the alleged orders of President Vasquez and by the express command of the commissioner of the port of Amapala several shots were fired after the Pacific Mail steamship Costa Rica, flying the stars and stripes, as she steamed away, because she refused to surrender one of her passengers to the Honduras government. United States Minister Baker was on board the Costa Rica at the time. The passenger about whom the trouble arose is P. Bonilla, who recently led the revolution in Honduras, but was defeated by General Vasquez. He fled to Nicaragua, and decided to leave there in order to relieve the government from all responsibility. He therefore sailed from Nicaragua to Guatemala. Minister Baker and 100 other passengers were fellow-passengers. They arrived yesterday at Amapala, port of entry of Honduras, on the Pacific coast. In the afternoon Commander of the Port Villa demanded that Captain Dow should surrender Bonilla. When the request was refused a threat was made to sink the ship and it asserted President Vasquez had given orders to that effect. Villa incensed at the refusal to surrender Bonilla, gave orders to fire on the ship after nightfall, when it was too dark to leave safely. The government officer came on board at 3:30 this morning, saying new orders have been received from the president insisting on the delivery of Bonilla or the bombardment of the ship. Captain Dow replied that the commander of the port would receive an answer in half an hour, but before the time expired he sailed away.

Several shots were fired after the Costa Rica, although carrying the American flag. One of the shots struck her, doing no damage, but it is feared the steamship Callao, of the same line, which is lying in port, may have been injured for the firing continued some time after the vessel was out of range.

PORTLAND DOUBLE MURDER.

Theodore H. Liebe Shot—Suicide of Chris Hess.

PORTLAND, Nov. 7.—Theodore H. Liebe, president of the Oregon German Baking Co., was shot today at noon and seriously wounded by Christian Hess, who after shooting Liebe shot and killed himself. Liebe's wounds are regarded as fatal. The bullet entered the back of the head and following the skull around came out near the right eye. Hess shot himself through the heart, death ensuing instantly. The shooting occurred at intersection of East Park and C streets, Liebe being on his way home. From what can be learned it is supposed the trouble was brought about by the arrest of Hess some time since on charge of embezzlement preferred by Liebe.

Steamers Collide.

SAND BEACH, Mich., Nov. 7.—The propellers Albany and Philadelphia collided in a fog off Port Au Barques and sunk this morning. A boat containing 55 men sank and all perished; 11 bodies recovered.

Whistling Fireworks.

The people of London are very much interested in the whistling fireworks, which have long ceased to be regarded over here as a pyrotechnic marvel. The popular notion among the Britons is that gas generated by the combustion of the fiery composition actually blows a whistle, but this supposition is erroneous. So far as can be determined by the pyrotechnists themselves, the screaming noise is due to the violent combustion of the picrate of potash with which the little tubes of the fireworks are stuffed. Experiments have been made with other materials, but picrate of potash is the only combustible substance discoverable that will give anything more than a faint imitation of a whistle.—New York World.

Modest Boston.

A well known professor of English at Harvard, who had just returned from a two weeks' trip to Chicago, was asked what he thought of the place as compared with the big eastern cities. "In Chicago," was the answer, "the men you meet are not gentlemen, and they don't pretend to be. In New York you meet the same sort of people, with the single difference that they do pretend to be gentlemen. In Boston you meet gentlemen."—Boston Herald.

FIGHTING AT THE POLLS.

Election Riots in New York and New Jersey.

DEMOCRATS ARE IN POSSESSION.

A Number of Voters Shot, Cut and Beaten.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Nov. 7.—There was a fierce fight at the polls at Gravesend this morning. The Republican general committee appointed a number of poll watchers for the county island district. Boss McKane and his backers set upon the watchers, using them very roughly, finally arresting some of them. Rev. Kent was knocked down, trampled on, and with Peter Rosenbeck is missing. More trouble is feared.

CAMDEN, Nov. 7.—The city appears to be in the hands of a desperate gang of thugs and repeaters. Riots have occurred at several precincts. Democratic policemen and ward workers have taken possession of many of the polls, and Republicans appealed to Sheriff West to place military at the polls. Many deputy sheriffs have been stopped on the streets and had weapons taken from them. A number have been beaten, shot and cut. Following have been admitted to the hospital: Samuel Fullman, shot in the head; George Banks, shot in the leg; Frank Severin, shot in the head; Edward Doer, badly cut in the head; Nathan Vanduyke, throat cut; Julia Chambers, throat cut with razor while standing near polls; Michael Kelly, a Democratic ward worker, was stabbed in the neck. The sheriff cannot be found. Five hundred special Democratic policemen are at the polls.

The sheriff refused to interfere, and a number of prominent citizens sent a telegram to Governor Flower, asking him to call out the militia to suppress McKane.

The National guard are waiting for Bell to summon them to action.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Nov. 7.—A factional fight here has caused very bitter feeling and every inch is being contested, resulting so far in several collisions and closing of poll in one district for the time. More trouble is expected before polls close.

Duel to Death.

SPOKANE, Nov. 7.—A duel was fought Sunday evening in the Selkirk saloon at Colville. Two miners, McDonald, formerly barkeeper, and Harrington, who had started the feud while at work in the Bonanza mine, fought out their differences. Eight shots were exchanged. McDonald was shot in the abdomen and will probably die. Harrington got a ball in the right thigh. Both of the wounded were brought to the hospital here. (McDonald is said to be a brother of J. A. McDonald of Salem.)

Smuggler Shot.

WHATCOM, Wash., Nov. 7.—Harry Hall, the smuggler, who was arrested here about two weeks ago with eighteen five ton cans of opium in his possession, was shot while attempting to make his escape from Deputy United States Marshal McGinnis, who had started to take him and Chiu Kee Hong to Seattle for examination before the United States grand jury. Hall, as he calls himself, though admitting it is not his real name, was shot in the leg and taken back to jail. The wound is not dangerous but it will prevent his removal for a few days. The man seems to be well educated and is said to belong to a good family.
