ALONG THE WATER FRONT.
Flood Notes--Steamers--Stats of Docks and Flooded Districts.
If there are more rains to the south look out for a repetition of the flood of 1890.

The Salem mills wharf is floating but no damage done. Water is coming into the basement of the mills. Some belting has been taken off, but no loss has ensued. The mills will be shut down until eleven feet above low water is reached by the subsiding torrent.

The Altona is tied up at Independence. She went up Friday at 8 o'clock from Salem and had not returned at noon. The Elwood started down for Lincoln Friday for a load of wheat but could not get a load, as the shutes were under water and the boat returned empty, having barely space to come through under the bridge.

The Elwood will lie here until the flood subsides.
The U. P. dock is nearly under water and the river is up to the boiler house of the Capital Lumbering mills. The Boise dock is in deep water but is well anchored. Both are now in the eddy and cannot be moved unless struck by a mass of drift and that is not likely.

There is undoubtedly much distress among people living on the islands and low lands in the river bottoms, also from stock in flooded districts. The captain of the Elwood said he was ready to relieve any such distress properly reported to him. Several families on the river front had to move out.
