LATER ON ELECTIONS.

New York Votes Money for Canals.

KENTUCKY SOLIDLY REPUBLICAN.

Brooklyn Democrats Say They Will Not Contest.

HOW THE PRESIDENT TAKES IT.
CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—A Daily News Washington special says:

"President Cleveland is charging none of the results of yesterday's election to his administration. On the contrary he is taking a quiet smile over certain features of the returns. Senator Gorman declares that President Cleveland's personal followers contribute to the success of Governor Administration Democrats appear to be willing to assume the responsibility, as another achievement for reform. There seems to be no doubt that they expected and desired the defeat of Gorman's ticket. The president and every member of his cabinet took a deep interest in the cause of Campbell, of Ohio and express regret at his defeat. The helpless condition presented by Kentucky Democrats is regarded as a rebuke to the free silver Democrats.

A TAMMANY BOW.
NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—John B. McGoldrick, clerk of the supreme court, and secretary of Tammany hall, is lying in a dangerous state at his home, the result of a stab wound received in an election wrangle. Although the affair is said to have occurred at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, no report was made of it. The first intimation of it was had when William Dowling, a bar tender, was arraigned in the Jefferson Market police court today, charged with having stabbed McGoldrick. The patrolman who had Dowling in charge would say but little about the case and even tried to belittle it to the magistrate.

NEW YORK'S TOTAL.
NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Total unofficial vote for secretary of state is: King, dem., 505,590; Palmer, rep., 572,525, Palmer's plurality, 66,935.

BROOKLYN, Nov. 7.—It looks now as if the majority contest would be transferred to the courts. Grant refuses to concede the election of Wurstler and the regular campaign democratic committee has retained counsel to look after Groat's interest.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 7.—"If W. C. Bradley is elected governor of Kentucky," said John C. New, proprietor of the Indianapolis Journal, this afternoon, "it will probably make him the republican candidate for vice-president next year."

RESULT IN KENTUCKY.
LOUISVILLE, Nov. 7.—Republican claims and Democratic concessions show tonight that not only has Kentucky elected the full Republican state ticket, but that the complexion of the legislature insures a Republican successor to Senator Blackburn. State Auditor Norman, the Democratic campaign chairman, in a statement to the commercial, and that Blackburn's defeat is assured.

"The Republicans, with the help of the Populists, will control the legislature," said he, "and Blackburn is sure to be defeated. Kentucky is now a Republican state. The people wanted a change and they took it. Republicans being aided by both the Populists and the A. P. A., no Democrat could have carried Kentucky at this election, not even Carlisle."

HE CARRIED KENTUCKY.
LOUISVILLE, Nov. 7.—Colonel W. O. Bradley, who carried Kentucky for the republicans in the gubernatorial election, will be the choice of his state for the presidency, and his friends claim that he will have the support of southern republicans. It is significant

that the friends of Governor Morton as well as the political champions of Governor McKinley have all been in consent correspondence with the friends of Colonel Bradley, and have urged them to push his claims for second place on the ticket. Colonel Bradley has heretofore refused to discuss the matter but tonight it is announced by Walter Foster, secretary of Colonel Bradley's campaign committee, and managing editor of the Commercial, the republican organ of the state, that Colonel Bradley's claims for national recognition will be urged in the national convention. Friends of Gov. Morton are urging the Bradley people to support a New York man, on the ground that the geographic positions of New York and Kentucky would render Gov. Morton's nomination for president almost decisively in favor of Bradley's nomination for vice-president. On the other hand, McKinley men are arguing that McKinley and Bradley would make the strongest ticket that could be put up, because of the personal magnetism of the men, and the prestige they enjoy of having won many gallant victories.

NEBRASKA.
OMAHA, Nov. 7.—Returns show the election of Norval, rep., by a safe plurality for supreme judge. The vote of the administration sound money wing of the democratic party is four fifths of the entire party vote of the state, probably 25,000, and is a very surprising feature of the election. The silver element of the democratic party is urging that the entire machinery of the federal government in the state, was used to secure votes for Mahoney, the sound money candidate. Mahoney's personal popularity contributed largely to his success. The great fight in the party was for the avowed purpose of establishing the relative strength of the two factions, with a view of sending a delegation to the next national convention.

UTAH REPUBLICAN.
SALT LAKE, Nov. 7.—Election returns from 215 precincts out of 320 give Wells, rep., for governor, a plurality of 2,482 and Allen, rep., for congress, a plurality of 1,072. The republicans have elected ten senators, the democrats five, with three in doubt. The republicans elect 20 representatives; democrats seven, with nine in doubt.

ILLINOIS.
CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—The Torrens land bill has been carried by a majority in the county of 77,257. The vote of the city for it was 75,319, and against, only 4687. The country towns were fully as strong for the measure.

Louis A. Seberger, of the real estate board commission, which was charged with the campaign for the enactment of the law and its submission to the people, was enthusiastic over the victory.

"It was the greatest fight the board ever made and we think it has accomplished a result which will be of the greatest benefit to the whole county. In effect this law puts reality in the category of quick assets where it has been an exceedingly poor asset in the past.

"Another benefit of it is that an indemnity fund is created out of a tax of one-tenth of one per cent on the value of property certified for the first time. This fund is held for the protection of innocent persons who suffer loss under the operation of the law.

CANALS CARRIED.
NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—The returns from Tuesday's election show the proposition to spend \$9,000 on canals carried by a large majority.

DEMOCRATS.
BROOKLYN, Nov. 7.—The Democratic campaign committee today admitted the defeat of their local ticket, and will take no steps looking to a recount.

CARAVAN PLUNDERED

Kurds Join in the Anti-Armenian Riots.

SEVENTEEN SEALERS CAPTURED.

A Russian Warship Runs Down the Pirates With Plunder.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 7.—Advices from Aleppo say that the Kurds belonging to the Malidsh cavalry regiment plundered a caravan near that place. It is further stated that the Kurds in the eastern province joined in the anti-Armenian movement and American missionaries are being advised not to expose themselves to dangers while the excitement lasts. At the instance of Mr. Herbert, British charge d'affaires in the disturbed districts will be provided with guards.

Pirate Sealers Captured.
ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 7.—A dispatch to Novoe Vremya from Vladavistock says the Russian warship Yakut has captured 17 foreign sealers in the sea of Okhotsk, all having slaughtered seals on board. One schooner, chased by the wayside, escaped.

DURRANT WRITES A BOOK.
Tells How It Feels to Be Tried for Murder.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—Durrant has written a sketch of his life and ambitions, and has gone into the matter of how it feels to be on trial for murder. He has some flings at the curious people who stared at him; takes the churches to task for what he thinks is their lack of Christianity, and says that his self-possession, nerve and fortitude, during the trial, were due to the love and comfort given him by his mother. He stoutly proclaims his innocence and satirizes some of his critics.

"But, after all," he says, "this world is only a temporary trial, to prepare us for another and better world. This existence consists of only a few troubles and painful years at best, but there we will enjoy eternal happiness in the company of the angels of God. We have the assurance of the holy Scriptures that riches and prosperity here are impediments to happiness hereafter. The beggar Lazarus is shown to us in the midst of everlasting bliss, while the rich man Dives, who had supported him for years by the crumbs from his table, and was clothed in purple and fine linen, is represented to us as burning in everlasting hell.

Another thing we might remember is that it is less difficult for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for the rich man to enter the kingdom of heaven; so we may, therefore, I think, rejoice in our difficulties and afflictions, for we are told that 'those whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth,' and, therefore, we can see that the more wretched we are here upon this earth in the love and trust in our Lord, the more assured we are of the delights of an everlasting heaven.

"I gave my testimony willingly. I gave the whole truth, whether it was for or against me. On the stand I substantiated many points the prosecution endeavored to prove, which were used against me in the argument, which was twisted and turned into all shapes, and which helped to convict me on circumstantial evidence."

Admiral Dead.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Rear Admiral Robert W. Shufeld, retired, died today after a long illness, following an attack of grippe and an accident while driving a year ago.

He had a most notable record, having opened Corea to the world by treaty, surveyed the Tehantepec canal route, and he also played an important part in the civil war.

THE DECREE GOES FORTH.

Portland Bosses Send Out Their Orders.
From the OREGONIAN, Nov. 7.
Boss Scott: It is not the purpose or business of the Oregonian to try to elect anybody in particular, or to defeat anybody in particular. But it must insist on sound principles as to money, and on reduction of taxation. This is its platform, and it is the platform of the people of Oregon.

Ross Jo. Sizoo: It is not unlikely, however, that the currency question will cut some figure. The Republicans will certainly declare for sound money. I am myself unalterably opposed to the free coinage proposition, and I know that the substantial element among our citizens is of the same mind. The Democrats, on the other hand, are hopelessly divided on the question. It is not impossible that the free silver element will get control of their organization. If so, the currency question will be a live issue in the state campaign. The Republicans will come out squarely for the position of the last national platform, and they will gain more strength by so doing than the Democrats can gain from disaffected free silver Republicans.

A Fatal Explosion.
DETROIT, Nov. 7.—Twenty-five bodies have already been taken from the ruins of the Journal building and the search still goes on. There are yet twenty missing, swelling the probable list to 40 or 45, besides the nineteen persons who were injured, two fatally. The cause of the boiler explosion still remains a mystery.

THE NORTHERN STRIKE

Broken By a Crew of Trainmen From Chicago

MADE UP BY LOCAL DETECTIVES.

Judge Hanford Issues an Injunction.

WALLA WALLA, Nov. 7.—Judge Hanford has issued a temporary injunction, restraining the Great Northern strikers from interfering with the operation of the road. He also cited them to appear before him in Seattle, November 23, to cause why they not be permanently restrained.

A DETECTIVE CREW.
DEVIL'S LAKE, N. D., Nov. 7.—The backbone of the Great Northern strike was broken this morning by the arrival of a train with 70 special policemen, 18 new conductors, 25 brakemen and 3 firemen. Deputies are patrolling the yards and the trains have all been started out. The recruits were enlisted at Chicago by a detective agency and are a sorry looking lot, but there has been no disturbance, and none is expected.
