THE SILVER ISSUE.
THE JOURNAL would make one last plea with the Republicans assembled in county convention to not strike a blow at silver. Do not be driven by the Oregonian's cracking the Cleveland-Carlisle-Wall-street whip, to abandon the cause of the poor and the true interest of the laborer and producer.

The politician drawing a comfortable salary may sneer at the cry of the laborer and the distress of the poorer classes, and be indifferent thereto. But no true Republican, acting for the welfare of seventy million people, can afford to take the view of these goldite newspapers, that is all Populism. To do so were un-American and un-Republican.

The Republican party is not a single gold or silver standard party and it will never be made so. It has always stood for bimetalism. The very doctrine of protection to all American industries pledges the Republican party to protect the silver mining interest on equal terms with the gold mining property but no more. That doctrine pledges the Republican party against the dangerous class legislation of discriminating in either gold or silver as standard money. For the Republican party of Oregon to strike a blow at the industry of nearly one-half million miners in the great northwest intermountain mining region would be a fatal political blunder from which it would not recover in this state for many years and which would alienate thousands of laborers and farmers all over the nation.

The silver issue is the issue of protection. Let us say to the European importers pay your duties in gold only as that is what you demand for interest on bonds. Let us declare against free trade in silver or silver ores. Let us be brave enough and honest enough to say in addition that we will give the silver miner the same legislation that we give to the gold miner.

The low grade ores on the Pacific coast can only be mined under favorable conditions. They pay from 50 cents to \$1 a ton. The entire cost of production is for labor. The capitalist must operate on a large scale and on a small margin. The whole proposition is a question of encouraging labor and protecting an American industry.

What is the first duty of a Christian government? To see that every child has an education. What next? That every laboring man has at least a decent opportunity to make a living for himself and his family. Compared with the right to support his family and educate his children, all talk about ratios and political theories

and speculations vanish like mist before his mind. We must shut out vicious foreign immigration. We must protect American industries. We must stand up for true bimetalism. Place the Republican party in the attitude of hostility to silver and its life goes out, because you place it in opposition to its vital principles of protection. Lawyers from the South frequently argue in congress that bimetalism is only another form of protection. They are right. Gold monometalism and free trade are one.

NO RING TICKET WANTED.
The benches of the Portland ring, that proposes to down every man who stands for anything dear to the masses of the people, are determined to put up a legislative ticket in Marion county that will do their bidding. They want independent representatives of the people in the legislature, who will help unload the 20 years accumulation of corruption and officialism. The task was partly begun in the last legislature. That work will go on even if the ringsters in Marion county throw themselves against the people.

Jo Simon's gang must be struck down in the convention or the people will strike them down at the polls.

CALL FOR CONVENTION.

A Republican convention for the state of Oregon is called to meet in the city of Portland, on Thursday, April 9, 1896, at 11 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the presidential electors and state and district offices, except congressmen, and of electing four delegates-at-large to the Republican national convention, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention. The convention will consist of 237 delegates chosen by the several counties as follows:

PLATFORM OF 1894.

Reforms Advocated by the Republicans.

SOME WHICH WERE KEPT THEIR ADVISORY BOARD

And Some Opposed by Marion County Legislators.

Following was the platform adopted by the Marion county Republican county convention which met at Salem in the spring of 1894:

MARION COUNTY PLATFORM.

"The Republicans of Marion county, in convention assembled, hereby declare their allegiance to the national Republican party as the only political organization that can give to our country permanency in its institutions, stability in financial and commercial conditions and prosperity to the laborer and producer.

"In the face of the Democratic depression, with farm products selling at ruinous prices, or with no market whatever, with more unemployed labor than ever before in the history of our country, with values of all property still shrinking with a steadily prevailing financial stringency, with three years more of the Cleveland incubus upon the country's neck, we favor the greatest possible economy in the state and local governments and to that end, that the taxpayers may be relieved as much as possible, we demand that our state officials be placed upon salaries as low as is consistent with an efficient and safe administration of public affairs, and that all fees be converted into the treasury. The hope of our country today is in the defeat of the Wilson bill in the United States senate. If that abnormal patchwork of free trade and trusts were killed today our country would at once resume that prosperity to which the people are so well accustomed under the American protective policy, upheld only by the Republican party and so ably championed by Wm. McKinley.

We declare as the sense of the taxpayers of Marion county that all appropriations made by the state legislature be limited to the actual necessities of the present state institutions. While not ignoring the just demands of our growing commonwealth, we demand an administration of our state and national affairs so adjusted to the present universally prevailing economic distress that the burdens of taxation become as light as possible.

Resolved: That the senators and representatives nominated by this convention be instructed to vote for the repeal of the railroad commission law and to enact a maximum rate law. Also that they be instructed to vote for a law reducing passenger fare to three cents per mile and abolish all free passes, other than for employes or for charitable purposes, and when issued upon request of proper municipal authorities duly authorized by law.

"Whereas, the last legislature created a second judgeship in the third judicial district, and whereas, it has been found unnecessary for the speedy transaction of the business of the district, one judge being amply sufficient, and whereas, the additional judgeship will entail a continued heavy expense, it is

"Resolved, That it is the sense of this convention that the act creating said judgeship should be repealed by the incoming legislature, thereby abolishing the office."

If THE JOURNAL had a word to suggest to the Republican county convention it would be to this effect: Put up a ticket composed of men whose personal character is a guaranty of economy to the people. Men whose hands are clean and who will not stoop to take grabs out of the treasury for themselves and will not readily consent to others doing so.

A ticket of that kind of men would prevent the possibility of fusion in roads at the coming election, for which the Populist and Democratic managers have made ample preparations. The ticket throughout should be so good and so strong, so clean and so able, and so well rounded as to require no defensive campaign, and that the taxpayer would not instinctively clutch at his pocket-book.

PLATFORM OF 1894. IN NATIONAL POLITICS

A. P. A. to Take Part in the Presidential Campaign.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—The American Protective Association, that has been a factor in the state and municipal politics of several states for a number of years, has announced its intention to enter the field of politics in the coming presidential campaign.

Its first movement toward this crusade will be taken at a meeting of the supreme advisory board of the organization, called to meet in Washington, Tuesday, March 24. This meeting is preliminary to the sessions of the supreme council, which will be held here in May. Prominent members from every congressional district in the country will take part in the sessions of the supreme council and will determine the part the organization will take in the campaign.

It is a part of the programme to insist upon the re-enactment in party platforms this year of the planks of the Democratic and Republican platforms of 1876, in which both parties declared against sectarian appropriations and emoluments from public money or property. In that year Mr. Blaine proposed in congress an amendment to the constitution as follows: "Article 10—Neither congress nor any state shall pass any law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, or use the property or credit of the United States, or of any state, or any money raised by taxation, or authorize either to be used for the purpose of founding, maintaining or aiding by appropriation, payment for services, expenses or otherwise, any church, religious denomination or religious society, or any institution, society or undertaking which is wholly or in part under sectarian or ecclesiastical control."

During this congress Linton, of Michigan, introduced the same amendment, and the A. P. A. will endeavor to have the amendment made a part of the constitution. Another feature of the program with which the advisory board will deal is what the political leaders of the A. P. A. call a campaign of education. They declare their literature shall reach every postoffice and every voter before election day.

Senators and representatives have heard from the A. P. A. organizations of their states during the past month. The following is a copy of a letter which has come to nearly all of them: "At a recent meeting of the state council of the A. P. A. a resolution was unanimously adopted that we request our senators and representatives in congress to work and vote for the following bills, now pending:

"A bill to secure a just distribution of federal offices, known in the last congress as house bill 8984; a bill to establish a national university, known in the last session as house bill 8949; a bill to restrict immigration and regulate naturalization, known as Linton's bill, house bill 8774; Linton's joint resolution, No. 111, amending the constitution and prohibiting for all time sectarian appropriations; a bill to prohibit advertisers and others from using the national emblem as an advertising device.

"We hope this expression of the representatives of so many of your constituents will meet your indorsement, as being in the interest of our country and in line with the ideas of the founders of our government.

"We also desire to respectfully call your attention to the fact that it is the design to place in statutory form a statue of Pere Marquette. We regard this as a dangerous innovation. The Jesuits have been banished from almost every Catholic country, and yet, here in Protestant America, they are not only to remain and plot against the liberties of our people, but it is even now proposed to further violate the principles of church and state by the addition of the statue of one of these traitors to all governments among the statues of those patriots who have given their lives that the government by the people should be preserved; and we appeal to you to use your endeavors so that this idea shall not be carried out."
