"The above amounts, where the claim was interest-bearing, includes interest up to, and including, the 14th day of November, 1895, on which day the property of the defendant was placed in my hands as receiver.

"Of the claim of R. Williams for \$24,699.65 only \$319.65 is a just and legal claim against the assets of the defendant in my hands. The remainder of said claim, viz: \$24,380, is the same claim heretofore litigated in this court on petition of said R. Williams and decided adversely to his contentions.

"Omitting said \$24,380 of the claim of R. Williams, the total valid claims filed against the defendant amounts to \$101,437.92."

The report is made to Judge Hewitt of Part 2, Marion county circuit court, as a part of the case of "J. A. Baker vs. Williams & England company, a corporation."
