MASSACRED.

Samalis Attacks Italians. Fourteen Killed. Attack Was Made in the Darkness.

ZANZIBAR, Dec. 4.—The massacre of Senior Cecchi, the Italian consul here, the captians of the Italian warships Volturro and Stuffed, and about six other Italian officers by Samalis, at Magadox, on the coast of Somaliland, East Africa, occurred on November 26. The party was accompanied by 70 Askaris on a trip into the country outside of Magadox, when Samalis attacked them, killing all the whites and 30 of the Askaris.

ROME, Dec. 4.—Additional details of the massacre of Senior Cecchi, the Italian consul and the Italian officers who were with him at Magadox, Somaliland, state that 14 Italians were killed. The caravan was attacked in the night by Samalis. They were repulsed, but killed and continually attacked the retreating caravan. The Italians and their escort of Askaris fought desperately, but were eventually overcome.

As soon as the news of the fighting reached Magadox a detachment of sailors and a force of Askaris were sent to the caravan, but arrived too late to save the Italians. The rescue party recovered 27 bodies and arrested many Somali tribesmen, who were punished in an exemplary manner.

Strychnine in the Gravy. HARVARD, Ill., Dec. 3.—William and Patrick Barry, in the absence of their mother decided to cook flour gravy. They found a saucer that contained flour and used it, not knowing that it contained strychnine. All are ill and three will probably die.

CHIPPEWA

Is Still in Great Danger. Attempts to Blow Out the Gorge Prove Futile.

CHIPPEWA FALLS, Wis., Dec. 4.—With the water again climbing, the outlook for this threatened valley is still rather uncomfortable. For 15 miles between Chippewa Falls and Eau Claire, and nearly the same distance at Durand, the river is matted with packed ice and timber and is hourly becoming worse. The water has been backed up, flooding part of Durand, and the lower levels of this city. Lumber mills are surrounded and partially engulfed by the water, which has frozen. Nearby business houses and dwellings are in the same predicament, although being a little farther away from the river channel, their situation is not so serious.

The railroads are not suffering as much as might be expected. The Onaha runs along high bluffs, and has not been in the least hampered. The Wisconsin Central tracks are covered with water and its trains use the Onaha tracks. The river branch of the Milwaukee & St. Paul has stopped business for the present.

Colonel W. A. Jones, of the United States army, of St. Paul, in charge of the government works in this section, will confer with the authorities in regard to another attempt to break the ice dam here. It is feared that a break in the Little Falls dam, 30 miles above here, will carry nearly everything away here. The people of Eau Claire, fear the result if the ice gorge here breaks too suddenly, while those below Durand are entertaining fears of the outcome here.

Yesterday the water touched 24 feet 8 inches, the highest yet, and later dropped a foot, but at 8:30 o'clock this morning again had risen to the highest figure, and was still rising slowly at 9 o'clock. Mayor Iriline drove down the river to Gravel, six miles from here, where an attempt will be made to break the gorge. The people are still moving from their houses today. Many offers of relief have been received from various quarters and relief will be necessary before the end of the trouble comes.

Pursue an Oregon Desperado.

ANGELS CAMP, Cal., Dec. 4.—A pitched battle was fought on the streets of Angels camp last evening between two officers and Robt. Hinman, the desperado who is wanted at Roseburg, Or., for breaking jail and shooting a deputy sheriff. Before the constable had an opportunity to prepare for Hinman's arrest he broke away and ran up the street, which was full of people. The officers followed him, firing at every step. Hinman turned and took a shot at each of his pursuers but without effect. The officers' ammunition was finally exhausted and they were obliged to give up the pursuit, while their man disappeared in the darkness. A posse was organized and sent in pursuit, but up to a late hour he had not been found. It is thought by the officers that he was hit by one of the shots.
