Senator Carter is not sick, has not been sick and does not intend to be sick. He is not on the sick side of the question.

Mitchell is out of the way. The legislature should now proceed to attend to the people's interests, as they find it impossible to advance the interests of federal office seekers.

The men who were elected Mitchell Republicans last spring sacrificed all in devotion to a principle only to find their leader abandoning the only principle which entitled him to their support.

The Statesman could not be hired to print a cartoon of Hon. Sol Hirsch. His profile is equal to that of Nathan Rothschild, himself. Elder Barkley and Jo Simon look like genuine Yankees beside the patriarchal and Mosaic profile of old Sol.

Hon. H. L. Barkley says, with a few slight amendments, the present charter of Woodburn suits the people of that town. The chances of passing a new charter are so thin that the present one will probably stand.

The following in a handwriting of legislative style was laid on THE JOURNAL reporter's desk.

"Resolved, That the legislature of Oregon, now assembled, is a damned farce, and that the members thereof should be fined \$500 each, deprived of right of suffrage and sent home."

We thought Senator Mitchell was opposed to a secret caucus? He always said so. He asked members to sign up a call or a pledge that only open viva voce methods of voting would be employed. But then he was also opposed to the single gold standard. He used to advocate election of senators by direct vote of the people. But time changes all things. If time can't something else can.

There is talk among members about voting for Harrison R. Kincaid for United States senator, and some believe he can be elected. How would the vacancy be filled in the office of secretary of state? By appointment of Governor Lord. There are those who desire to vote for Governor Lord, and some believe he could be elected. In that case Secretary Kincaid would discharge the duties of both secretary and governor.

What is more un-American than to bid an entire legislature of ninety freeborn Americans by a secret caucus of twelve senators? Yet, that is what he proposed Tuesday night and does yet. Twelve senators, majority of the Republicans in that body, were to bid the whole senate to sit with the rump Benson house and elect him senator. The senators did well to refuse.

Refusal of the Mitchell senators to sit with the Benson rump house would seem to dispose effectually of the senator's candidacy for re-election, as well as the necessity for any more sessions of the Benson faction, as the entire purpose of their sittings is to give Mitchell a certificate. They will not have developed the sublime assurance that they can both make laws and senators without the senate. No one can tell what conclusions such intellects as Benson, Bridges and Brown will incubate.

The disposition is growing strong to pass a half dozen reform bills, enact no new legislation, pass the appropriation bill and adjourn. The bills that are spoken of as essential are the following:

General appropriation bill.

Repeat railroad commission.

Reduce county salaries.

A mortgage tax law.

A new wing to the asylum and state prison.

A constitutional convention.

"This legislature beats 'em all," said an old hayseed as he came down the state house steps.

"In what respect," asked a bystander.

"Commonly," said the old man, "we find a sprinkling of farmers, business men and newspaper men in such a body. I've visited every legislator that ever assembled in Oregon, but this is the first legislator I ever saw where every darn member of the house is a constitutional lawyer."

If members of a legislature could only clearly grasp the essential idea of the representative principle, they would realize that a legislature before it is organized is nearer the true democracy of the people than ever afterwards. As soon as organization takes place it assumes the republican form of government and individuals surrender some of their rights. Hence, gentlemen, strain your intellect to the point of comprehending that more members are required under all properly drawn democratic constitutions to organize a legislature than to do business under the organization after it is organized! See?

Some of the members of the house are earning their salary. Representatives Gill and Munkers spend their time regularly in a committee room reading and considering bills introduced. They make amendments, adopt or reject the measures, and keep a record of their deliberations. A good deal of the time they are joined by the other People's members and grind out not a little good legislation, which is just as legal and as carefully considered in the interest of the people, as the proceedings of the Benson house. Sometimes Gill sends out and has the members brought in who are disposed to be laggards, and gives them a good talking to and then all go to work.

King in name but not in nature! The People's Senator from Baker has the honor of being the patriot of the Senate! His resolution for the independence of Cuba has the true American ring, and in printed form is being widely read. If left to the American people for a vote on this matter they would liberate Cuba tomorrow. Two hundred and fifty men with a firm determination and backed by public sentiment could liberate Cuba in ninety days. But monarchical influences at Washington are immense; the senate has backed down and the aristocracy overrules the administration.

The Mitchell egg is added and will never hatch. A new hen must now be got on, or an incubator set to work to hatch a senator for Oregon at the windup. While the legitimate work of the people can be proceeded with at no distant day, it is in order to name men who may be considered in the senatorial class. We assume that no mere Mark Hanna's will "go down" in Oregon. Wealth alone won't count. Men must be found clearly on one side or the other of the money question. So we take the liberty to enumerate persons spoken of as gold standard possibilities: H. W. Corbett, Wm. P. Lord, Geo. H. Williams, Henry Felling, H. W. Scott and Jos. Simon. As bi-statellists: H. R. Kincaid, H. L. Barkley, J. H. Waldo, Binger Hermon, Jonathan Bourne, Sylvester Peatoyer, Lark Bilyeu and Wm. H. Holmes.
