SCHOOL DIRECTORS MEET.

Routine Business Transacted—A Resolution Adopted. All members of the board of directors for school District No. 24, were in attendance at a regular meeting of the board last evening as were also Clerk E. H. Flagg and City Supt. Geo. A. Peebles.

The board duly approved the minutes of the previous meeting and ordered the following bills paid by warrant:

After a thorough discussion the following resolution was passed: "Whereas, The board of directors of school district No. 24 are at this time sorely pressed with applications for teachers, nearly all of such teachers having large experience and strong recommendation; and

"Whereas, Some of these applicants are relatives or friends of citizens of said district largely represented on the list of taxpayers of said district; therefore be it

Resolved, That this board deem it best for all the interests of the district to refuse to employ more than one person in any family as teacher for this district for the coming school year."

The payment of interest and indebtedness and certain partial payments due by the board, as submitted in writing by Chairman E. M. Waite was approved.

City Superintendent Geo. A. Peebles submitted a report giving the names and ages of the forty four graduates from the public schools and also a copy of the program to be rendered at the opera house Friday evening.

Supt. Peebles was instructed to make all necessary arrangements for the graduating exercises.

Clerk Flagg was instructed to fill out the diplomas for the graduating class.

The clerk, upon motion, was ordered to issue warrants to teachers and janitors upon the filing of the monthly payroll by City Supt. Peebles.

A petition from North Salem residents asking that Prof. A. J. Garland be re-engaged as principal of the North school, was presented and filed.

The board will meet on Saturday evening the 12th inst when teachers for the ensuing year will be selected.


