WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—Major General Guy V. Henry has been assigned to the command of the department of the Missouri with headquarters at Omaha.

GREENVILLE, O., Oct. 19.—Wm. J. Bryan and party arrived in Ohio for a three-day's tour of the state. His first speech was made in this city and listened to by an immense crowd.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—President McKinley and party reached Washington today. McKinley's health was improved by the trip.

MANILA, Oct. 19.—Lawton and Young are at Arayat with a force of nearly 5000 men. The gunboats Florida and Oots are preparing to move along the river to Isulor, which will be held as a base for operations to the north.

Extensive preparations have been progressing several days and the expedition whose objective is Tarlac, is expected to start today. Supplies will be taken on caissons.

London, Oct. 19.—According to private information from Bloemfontein, President Kruger telegraphed an account to Natal, where the Boers derailed and burned a British armored train, carrying Captain Nesbitt's party. Kruger said Nesbitt and seven men were wounded. No one was killed and all the prisoners were well.

Natal again claims a share of attention. The combined advance of the Boer forces, on the positions held by Sir George Stewart White, has already occasioned a sharp attack on the outpost, which possibly has since developed into a pitched battle. The Boers, according to latest information, do not appear to have been driven.

Perhaps, however, their movements are only a part of a general plan to isolate Ladysmith and Glencoe from the South. Military experts are inclined to the opinion that the troops at Glencoe are only there to form the rear guard, left to attract the concentrated force of General Joubert, while General White's full strength concentrated at Ladysmith with a view to attacking the Orange-Free State.

Stories of British successes in Mafeking district are so persistent that in absence of contradiction from Boer sources, they may be accepted as true in the main, although the alleged killing of 300 Boers is discredited.

General Craje's troops are regarded as the flower of the Transvaal forces, and the decisive fighting must be on the western border. The object of the Boers in massing in Bechuanaland is doubtless due to the fact that this is a splendid stock country, is full of cattle and would give the Transvaal a route to importations and ammunition by way of Walfish bay and Damalar on the west African coast. Portugal, according to a dispatch from Berlin, has given distinct assurance of neutrality. The continuance of commerce with the Transvaal by way of Delagoa is therefore secured.

NOT SUBSTANTIATED. Reports Look Genuine, But Are Not Yet Officially Confirmed. A dispatch to the New York Tribune from London says: The great heartiness of temper in parliament was unmistakable. The time had passed for controversial polemics. War had come, and no retreat was possible. The war office must have all the money requisite and the least said about negotiations the better all around for everybody was the prevailing sentiment. The common sense seemed intensely earnest.

Censorship over press dispatches is already so rigorous that little news comes through. This seems necessary, since it is suspected that Mr. Lays has arranged for a system of secret dispatches by which the British military movements may be telegraphed back to South Africa for the benefit of the Transvaal government.

This silence respecting the British maneuvers contrast oddly with the frankness with which the details of the Boer advance through the various passes into Natal have been blurted out. All special dispatches of the London press are delayed and bear marks of a rough-shod revision. The war correspondents evidently will be bottled up until there is a big battle to describe with a flourish of trumpets. Sir Belvers Buller is reported to have advised the closest possible revision of the press dispatches before he sailed. A vagueness oscillating between utter vacancy and min-
