THE NATIONAL NEWS.

Bell Breaking the Back of the Insurrection.

Admiral Dewey Believes the Bottom Has Dropped out of Aguinaldo's War--He Hpholds Permanent American Control of the Philippine Islands--Seattle Has Captured a San Francisco Steamship Line--Report of the Secretary of the Treasury.

Bell's Brigade Fight.
By Associated Press to the Journal.
MANILA, Nov. 3.--Yesterday Colonel Bell, with the Thirty-sixth regiment and a troop of Fourth cavalry cleared the country of all armed insurgents from Florida Blanco to a considerable distance beyond Porac, pursuing them into the mountains, capturing nine of their cavalry, several guns, considerable property, and killing, wounding and capturing a number of the enemy. The insurgent cavalry of that section is practically destroyed. Bell's casualties are one killed and two wounded.

Dewey on the War.
New York, Nov. 3.--A special to the Herald from Washington says:
With the submission of their preliminary report to the president, the members of the Philippine commission felt at liberty for the first time to partly discuss the subject of their investigation: "I wish you would say for me," said Admiral Dewey, "that I endorse every word of the commission's admirable report. There has not been a moment since the first gun was fired that the United States could have withdrawn from the islands, and the reasons set forth in the report, as to why permanent American control is essential, are, in my opinion, immovable. I believe the bottom has dropped out of the insurrection."

STORM ON THE GREAT LAKES
Sad Fate Of the Master of the Yacht Chiquita.

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.--The gale which has been raging for 48 hours still continues. The life savers at various points are kept busy watching for and aiding vessels in distress. Four vessels were reported as being in trouble at various points. A schooner rigged yacht, the Chiquita, with a dead man, supposed to be D. S. Way, the owner and captain, lashed to the rigging, came ashore three miles east of Miller's Station. It is believed all the crew and passengers perished.

1500 DEWEYS TO GATHER
In Family Reunion On The Day of Manila's Surrender.

TACOMA, Nov. 3.--A. M. Dewey, special agent of the government department of labor, announced here that all members of the Dewey family related to Admiral Dewey would hold a reunion in New York in January or February. He says the acceptances received indicate that 1500 Deweys will gather to meet the Admiral and his bride.

OMNIOUS SILENCE

Portends Further Disaster to the English Forces.

General Joubert Determined to Out off General White at Ladysmith--The Capital of Natal May Be in His Hands Already--Boers Waging an Aggressive Campaign--British Claim to Have the Best Artillery--But Their Situation Causes Deepest Alarm in London.

Joubert's Movements.
By Associated Press to the Journal.
New York, Nov. 3.--A dispatch to the World from London, says: Joubert's movement to cut off White at Ladysmith, from Colenso, is being carried out and it is probable that Pietermaritzburg, the capital of Natal, will soon fall into General Joubert's hands, before Buller and reinforcements can arrive. The South African situation is again causing the deepest alarm.

The Boer Losses.

LONDON, Nov. 3.--Belated dispatches from Ladysmith, regarding Monday's fight, estimate the Boer losses, at 65 killed and 200 wounded, mostly the victims of artillery shells, which have wrought such great havoc that it is said Joubert has written a letter to White, the British commander protesting against the use of Lyddite. A temporary armistice was declared Monday evening to allow the collection of the dead and wounded.

Wires Badly Cut.
While the wires to Ladysmith are cut the refusal of the war officials to believe that Ladysmith is completely invested, or that Colenso is captured, appears to be justified, as this morning it was asserted that the railroad is still open, though traffic is conducted with the greatest caution.

Rumors From Ladysmith.
What, however, was only a rumor yesterday evening, it is claimed may be a reality at any moment, as Joubert with a large and wonderfully mobile force is expected to detach several thousand men and make a dash at the railroad. It is even asserted that White has been compelled to fall back on Pietermaritzburg, leaving his wounded behind.

Probably such rumors have their origin in the recollection of the ominous silence which preceded the evacuation of Dundee. On the other hand, it is asserted the conditions have altered and the British guns seem to be more than equal to the artillery of the Boers, thus enhancing the difficulty of any assault on the British lines.

MILITIA ORDERED OUT
Extreme Measures Are Being Resorted to in Great Britain.

LONDON, Nov. 3.--An army order was issued this evening which orders the authorities to mobilize thirty-five battalions of militia at their respective headquarters on various dates after November 3.

BOMBARDMENT OF LADYSMITH
Boers Continue Their Attack Upon the Town.
LONDON, Nov. 3.--Special dispatches from Ladysmith, dated November 2, give further details regarding the bombardment. The Boers, having reoccupied their old positions, remounted big guns. Their firing was accurate, but

almost harmless. Some of the troops were slightly injured by splinters. Lieutenant F. C. Edgerston and his men from the Powerful did splendid work, and quickly silenced the Boer guns. According to another dispatch the naval brigade at Ladysmith has mounted four more guns from Durban.

The men acknowledge having suffered heavy losses in men and horses in the previous battle.

General Jan Kock, who was second in command of the Transvaal forces, and who was wounded in the battle of Eland's Laagto, died in the hospital, at Ladysmith, Monday night.

Little light is thrown on the actual situation by the news at hand today. The magnitude of Monday's fight, however, is more than ever evident. Virtually three actions were waged simultaneously; but it is obvious that the intention to roll back the Orange Free State troops was not achieved.

Messenger Treated Kindly.
The correspondent of the Daily News at Ladysmith, telegraphing Tuesday says: "Dr. Hornabrooke, while searching for the body of Lieutenant Clapham, on Umbulweni Hill, which was in possession of the enemy, met many Boers. On stating the object of his quest he was kindly received. The consensus of opinion among the Boers, he thinks, is that they are sick of fighting, and would like to throw up the sponge. They said their loss yesterday was heavy, and due chiefly to our artillery fire."

All was quiet at Bulwayo, in Rhodesia, according to dispatches received this morning up to October 27. There has been more or less skirmishing on the border.

The morning papers are divided in opinion whether General Stewart White's latest list of casualties includes the losses of Lieutenant Colonel Carleton's command before its surrender. The preponderance of opinion inclines that they are not included, since, if they were, General White would probably have mentioned the fact.

A report that a Boer force with guns from Koomati Poort is making its way through Zululand is held to indicate an intention to seize the railway between Colenso and Pietermaritzburg, if it has not already been seized. This, however, will soon be known, as armored trains are patrolling the line.

Can White Hold Out.
The real question now for the British public is, Can General White hold out another 10 days or two weeks until the army corps arrives? Less anxiety would be felt on this account were it not that every day seems to bring fresh lists of casualties, proving that much has been concealed as to the real state of affairs. At the best, the coming week must be a critical and anxious time.

The Times, commenting editorially on the fact that the news appears to arrive in Belgium from South Africa through some channel uncontrolled by British censorship, reminds the government that information valuable to the enemy can similarly leak from Europe to the Transvaal. It suggests that the government should fully exercise its right under existing condition, if any such channel has been for special reasons left open, and it appears to think there may be some truth in yesterday's Berlin and Paris stories. The Daily News suggests that those rumors are more likely intended for propagation at the Cape and to influence the Afrikaners.

Again it is asserted at Adershot that the mobilization of the Second army corps will begin November 10, and that the whole reserves of the transport branch of the army service corps will be called out.
