AGAIN VICTORIOUS.

The Capital City Football Team Making a Record.

If They Continue to Build Up Their Team Work Few Can Stand Before Them.

Salem footballists and their friends are wearing their colors proudly over Saturday's game with Forest Grove. Pacific University simply could not stand up before their well-directed plays and rushes. It is a splendid preparation for the game with Corvallis next Saturday. The Farmers have been cooks-of-the-walk among the intercollegiate teams, but will have to play ball if they come to Salem.

HOW IT WAS PLAYED.
The game was called at 3, Bailey, of Hillsboro, and Wand, of Albany, referees. Salem won the toss and gave Forest Grove the ball, kicking it off to Salem's five-yard line. Bishop advanced it to the 20-yard line when he was downed. Salem steadily advanced by short end runs and plunges on tackle to a touch down—taking the ball through by steady careful playing—the team falling into the work in a creditable manner. First touch down by Bishop. The ball was brought and Bishop kicked a difficult and very pretty goal. Score 6 to 0.

The Puritans again kicked off to Salem's 15-yard line. Holt received it and advanced 15 yards before being downed. By repeating their previous good work, and short dashes outside of the line, and by direct masses on that position, the Methodist advanced about 20 yards. The Puritans made a stand and held them for downs. They tried end runs, and backs on tackle, but failed and lost the ball on downs. Salem advanced a few yards and was forced to kick. The Puritans made their first effective play, when their left-half got to within 15 yards of the goal. By plunges they got within five yards, but were held for downs. Salem kicked to center. Here the Puritans repeated their former brilliant play. Salem took the ball again, advancing 10 yards and was forced to kick. Bradley advanced it 20 yards, when time was called for the first half.

In the second half the Forest Groves weakened and the Salem proved much stronger. The Puritans could not meet the Salem defenses, and the Methodist by brilliant plays of Sandberg, Olinger and Bishop, advanced the ball for three touch-downs in rapid succession.

Bishop successfully kicked all goals and the score stood 24 to 0. All through the game Salem steadily improved a team work. Sandberg at end played a brilliant and dashing game. Salem people showed their appreciation as never before and turned out a splendid and enthusiastic crowd. Coach Oliver is maintaining his reputation for cool intelligent work, and if the home team is well sustained manager Van Winkle may be able to bear off the pennant for Salem for the first time in the history of foot ball.

MAGERS HANGS

The Supreme Court So Decided Today.

THE LOWER COURTS SUSTAINED.

Something About this Celebrated Case.

The Murder of Raymond Sink Is Avenged at Last.

Salem Sentinel Extra.
Raymond Sink was murdered near Salem, September 13th, 1898, and his body was found floating in the river, just below the big bridge, at Salem. Suspicion pointed to W. G. Magers as the murderer and he was placed under arrest and tried in December, at Dallas, for the murder.

RESENTED TO HANG.
The jury returned a verdict of murder in the first degree and Magers was sentenced to be hanged.

NEW TRIAL GRANTED.
An appeal was taken to the supreme court, where a decision was rendered in Magers' favor and the cause remanded back for a new trial. The ground upon which the new trial was granted was, in the main, relative to the refusal of Judge Burnett to declare to the jury the hour that the sun set, on the date of the homicide. The court held that it was the duty of the court, when so requested, to instruct at what time the sun set, on the day of the homicide.

HIS SECOND SENTENCE.
Upon the retrial of the case, in May, 1899, a verdict of murder in the first degree was again rendered and the accused was for a second time sentenced to forfeit his life.

AGAIN AN APPEAL.
In this second appeal to the supreme court, the defense relied, for one thing, for a reversal of the lower court, upon the admission of the testimony of the state, given through a stenographer's notes. The defense argued that the trial court erred in admitting the testimony of D. McLaughlin, chief of police, of Portland, who refreshed his memory from the extended stenographic notes of another person.

Defendant's counsel cited that the trial court erred in admitting testimony respecting the conduct of Magers in company with the two girls at Portland, after the murder, holding that the object of this testimony was to create prejudice against Magers. Objection to Judge Burnett's instructions to the jury was point four, in the defendant's prayer for a reversal.

The fifth point related to the neglect of the court to admonish the jury as to the legal effect of the defendant's silence, he not having taken the witness stand in his own behalf. This circumstance, Magers' counsel contended, should not be taken against him.

The sixth claim related to one of the trial jurors (Mitt-hell) who, according to the record, was not without prejudice. Evidence was introduced proving that Mitchell, prior to the trial, had said that he "believed Magers was guilty and needed hanging."

Affidavits were produced showing that new evidence had been secured upon which the lower court should have granted a new trial. These affidavits related to the theft of a boat from John Savage, about the time of the murder and its finding a few days later, covered with blood stains.

Magers' counsel contended that had the testimony of the Savages been known, it is reasonable to suppose that a different conclusion would have been reached by the jury.

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A BUILDING BOOM

Extensive Improvements to Be Made On Hotel Willamette.

Building Notes—Pohle & Bishop and Larsen's New Building Now Going Up.

Salem is enjoying a handsome accession of new buildings and some extensive improvements are announced.

Arrangements were completed today for elaborate improvements—almost a reconstruction of Hotel Willamette. At the suggestion of Manager Conner, Mr. Bush will make a number of important changes. The interior of the entire hotel, or a great portion of it, will be altered so as to form a great many suites of rooms, and many rooms will be enlarged. About fifty sets of furniture will be taken out and replaced with new. New carpets and new parlor sets, with artistic and comfortable easy chairs and couches are going in. Such changes will be made as are required to make it an up-to-date house for the public. The lower floor will be remodelled and large chandeliers put in costing about \$100 each. The bar will be moved in to the front room where the telegraph office was. An entirely new feature will be a large billiard room with four or six new tables costing about \$15.00.

This will be elegantly furnished and will be one of the finest billiard parlors in the state. This will be put in by Mr. Conner.

An agreement has been made by which Mr. Conner releases the entire property, except the express office. He also leases the block in the rear where improvements will be made. When all these changes are completed, and they will be made at once, the hotel all through with its modern steam heating plant, will be the best equipped in the state. No other house in the state has steam radiators in every room as the Willamette has.

The two years of Mr. Conner's management have by hard work and close attention to business, won for it a large trade and it is constantly increasing. The house today accommodates fully ninety percent of the travelling public. Mr. and Mrs. Conner, and Miss Conner are born hotel people and give the house and the wants of its guests their undivided personal attention.

OTHER BUILDING NOTES.
The stone foundation for the new building at the north east corner of Liberty and Ferry streets is up to a level with the street on the west side, and if the weather permits, will soon be completed.

Pohle & Bishop and P. J. Larsen are building here to accommodate their growing business in blacksmithing and carriage making.

The building will have a depth of 60 feet and a frontage on Ferry street of 95 feet. Of this Pohle & Bishop will have 48 feet, and Larsen 47 feet.

The building will have a 9 foot basement, first story 14 feet and second story 12 feet. The gentlemen interested are considering the matter and may conclude to put up a brick building throughout. In any case a brick division wall will be put in.

This improvement will transform an unsightly corner into a good business property.
