DEAR BOUGHT VICTORY

The Casualties of the British are Appallingly Large

French War Ministers to Allow No Officers to Go Abroad -- Probably Many French, German and Austrian Officers Fighting -- Reported Capture By the Boers of a Whole Regiment of British Lancers

A Dear Victory. By Associated Press to the Journal. LONDON, Nov. 28.—The list of casualties in the battle of Graspan proves that the British success was heavily bought. Losses are total of 198 as the cost of Methuen's second battle.

While the latest news is fairly of a reassuring character from the British point of view, much of it is assumed to be true on insufficient evidence. Stories of the rapid retirement of the Boers in Natal must be received with caution. The fact appears to be that the British sharpshooters are expected at any time on the southern frontier. It is said the French cabinet has instructed the minister of war to refuse all officers leave to go abroad.

NO ENGLISH FREE PRESS.

Telegraph Tells How Anti-Jingoist Newspapers Are Being Suppressed.

New York, Nov. 28.—A dispatch to the World from London says: H. W. Massingham's resignation of the editorship of the Daily Chronicle is a striking example of the extent to which jingo influences dominate the liberal party. The World correspondent has authority for stating that Mr. Massingham was requested by the proprietors of the Chronicle to suspend all further criticism of the South African policy of the government while the war continues, but as Mr. Massingham had taken a strong anti-jingo line, he refused to stultify himself by acceding to this extraordinary request, and resigned.

Through this receding of the Chronicle, the only influential London daily which has opposed jingoism disappears. It is believed that its proprietors were impelled to this change of front by ministerial and other influences, actuated by the extreme gravity of the South African situation, and the imperative necessity for suppressing all criticism of the war and the exposure of its apparently inevitable result by independent newspapers.

It is rumored that similar steps have

been taken to silence the Evening Echo, which followed the Chronicle's lines.

NINTH LANCERS MISSING.

A Fear That They Have Been Captured by Boers.

LONDON, Nov. 28, 4:30 a. m.—A fresh interruption in the East African cable service at this interesting moment has caused a cessation of war news. As yet the war office has not yet received Lord Methuen's detailed list of casualties nor is any information at hand regarding the whereabouts of the Ninth lancers, who were sent in pursuit of the Boers from Graspan. The Daily Mail says that a private telegram announcing that the lancers are still scouting ahead of Methuen's advancing column, but as he announced yesterday that he was giving his men a day's rest, this is hardly possible.

Indeed, the greatest anxiety is felt, and more especially in view of the fact that a Berlin journal, the Deutsche Warte, which regularly prints Boer communications, announced yesterday, before it could have been ascertained from British sources, that the naval brigade lost 100 men at Graspan, and that the Ninth lancers were captured.

It is understood that the government has decided to proceed immediately with the mobilization and embarkation of a division of 10,000 men under a well-known lieutenant-general.

General Hildward's achievement at Beacon hill is beginning to be realized as one of the best things the campaign has yet shown, as it has relieved the tension of the situation in Natal, and has brought the relief of Ladysmith, within measurable distance. General Buller appears to be confident of Lord Methuen's ability, and is devoting all his energy to Ladysmith.

An attempt will be made presumably to reach Colenso in time to cut off the retreat of the Boers from Weenan over Tugela river. It is feared, however, that the enemy will get there first and destroy the bridge. At Frere bridge, the British found two massive spans

Of four-hundred and ten horses and mules carried, fifty-five were literally pounded to death against the sides of the stalls and the remainder are badly bruised.

MANILA, Nov. 28.—The transport Manuessa, with three companies of the Thirty-first infantry has arrived. She narrowly escaped disaster. The steamer was unseaworthy, undermanned and short of provisions. The engines broke down and she rolled for three days in a typhoon.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Will Be Quite Long and Will Probably Not Be Delivered Monday.

Cuban Uprising Predicted for Thanksgiving Day -- May Not Be Realized -- Col. Bell Gets a Medal For Bravery -- Edw. and Reform Republicans Preparing For Their Campaigns

The Message.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—The President's annual message is practically completed. The message is unusually long, on account of the numerous and important topics it discusses. It is not certain that the message will be sent to congress next Monday.

As the death of the vice-president makes it certain that the senate will adjourn immediately out of respect to his memory, it is likely the message will be withheld until Tuesday.

Cuba All Right.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Nothing is known in official circles to warrant the published predictions that an uprising on a large scale is set for Thanksgiving day in Cuba, directed against Americans. All advices from official sources to the war department show that generally the conditions in Cuba are satisfactory.

Col. Bell Honored.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—The President has directed a congressional medal of honor to be presented to Col. Franklin Bell, of the Thirty-sixth infantry, for his most distinguished gallantry in action near Vera Cruz, Mexico.

Silver Republicans.

CHICAGO, Nov. 28.—The executive committee of the national silver Republican party will hold a meeting this afternoon to discuss plans for the next presidential campaign. Congressman Charles A. Towne, chairman, says the silver Republicans have an organization in 31 states.

Reform Republicans.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—United States Senator Chandler, Ex-Governor Bushnell and others today issued an address to the Republicans of New Hampshire, inviting their co-operation in opposing the railroad power in that state and supporting industrial combines, advocating improved election laws and other reforms.

Anderson in the Tails.

The charge against Joseph Anderson, of shooting John Maurer's dog was dismissed by Justice of the Peace Johnson this morning, as the state failed to show malice on the part of defendant against the owner of the dog, which was necessary to establish criminal intent. A charge of insanity was soon afterwards filed in the county clerk's office against Anderson, but this had not been disposed of when the JOURNAL went to press.
