THANKSGIVING DAY

Observation by the Salem Public Schools This Afternoon.

The Churches Will Hold Union Services at the First Baptist—Business Houses Close.

The schools of the city will have a couple of days of vacation, closing to-night until Monday morning.

They have accordingly honored the day by appropriate observances this afternoon.

Public exercises were held in the central hall at the East school, and a short program of recitations, essays, and vocal and instrumental music by the pupils was carried out.

At the Lincoln school a more elaborate program of the same kind had been arranged, including the reading of President McKinley's Thanksgiving proclamation and that of Governor Geer, and some more intricate exercises by the pupils.

At the other schools no public exercises were given. In each room, however, the teacher gave a short talk, explaining the meaning of the celebration of a day of thanksgiving.

Donations having been solicited from the school children, for the benefit of the children's aid society, there was a contribution received at each school this morning.

At the churches. There will be union services at the First Baptist church, where an appropriate program will be carried out.

The annual Thanksgiving Day sermon will be preached by the Rev. J. J. Evans of the First Christian church, and the pastors of the other city churches will take part in the exercises.

By way of an appropriate expression of Thanksgiving, contributions for the Salem hospital are solicited, and it is expected that a goodly contribution will be brought to the church. The hospital is a worthy institution and is doing a good work. While it is conducted on the lines of a business enterprise, yet it does a great deal of charitable work, and should be encouraged and sustained.

Rev. Ronald McKillop of the First Baptist church thus urges a general observance of the day.

"It is pleasing to God that thanks should be given him, as a nation, for his abundant goodness. It is at the call of the president of our nation that this service is observed. Loyal law abiding American citizens will therefore respond when possible."

On Thanksgiving night there will be a social meeting at the Baptist church at which every member is expected, also all friends of the church are earnestly invited. A special program has been prepared in which Mrs. Francesco Seely and others will take part. It is predicted that this will be the happiest meeting in the history of the church.

No formal agreement has been made but it is understood that the business houses of the city will close Thanksgiving day at ten a. m. Mayor Bishop will lead off in this respect. Many will follow his example and nearly all will close at noon.

Mask Ball Tomorrow. The much talked of mask carnival which is to take place at the opera house tomorrow evening, will be a grand success. Many masks will be seen, introducing some of the very latest novelties.

All maskers are requested to enter the opera house by the Court street entrance, where they will be assigned dressing and waiting rooms. The grand march is to commence promptly at 8:30. The committee have purchased two prizes for the best pair of "Cake Walkers." Many other prizes are to be offered. After your turkey dinner, enjoy yourselves in the evening by attending the "Mask Ball."
