HOP CIRCULAR.

Issued by President Mattie L. Jones, of the Association.

M. L. Jones, president of the Oregon Hop Growers Association, has issued the following circular:

"For some time past it has been apparent that in order for the hop growers to have any influence on the market they would have to get together. As a result of repeated earnest effort the Hop Growers' Association has been organized. This is the combination that furnishes the key to the situation; let the growers stand by the association as a unit and better prices for the present crop can be assured. The bankers are aiding us, the press is for us, and the business people are with us, and our losses would mean serious reverses to them. We should be for ourselves.

"The Oregon Hop Growers' Association is a large factor in upholding the market, and should be the sole factor in disposing of the Oregon crop, therefore do not allow a single bale to be marketed through any other source. We can take care of our interests only by standing together; there should be a hearty co-operation on the part of all the hop growers in the state.

"To regulate certain pressing evils it may be necessary for us to seek state legislation and we may be found knocking at the doors of congress. As a united and strong organization we will certainly be heard. Hop, instead of quassa chips and chemicals in the manufacture of beer, would mean hundreds of thousands of dollars to the Oregon hop growers, and better health to the consumers of brewers' products. We can by more careful effort in the future improve the quality of hops and if necessary control the supply by reducing the acreage. We can fully accomplish the desired results only by working in harmony.

"Write to the secretary without delay, telling him the number of shares of stock you wish to subscribe for. Turn your hops into the Association as your selling agent. Write to the undersigned for blanks or apply to our local representative. Write to the undersigned informing him of the number of bales and the quality of hops you have, and your minimum selling price.

"There will be an important meeting of the board of directors at Salem, December 8, 1899. The hop growers throughout the state are invited to be present. If you can not all come, let each section send representatives. In union there strength, and the present conditions require a supreme effort."
