## RESUME SUNSET LIMITED.

Southern Pacific's Famous Flyer Starts From San Francisco December 15.  
The Sunset Limited, the Southern Pacific's famous train of the Sunset route, will commence its service for the winter season on Friday, December 15. The schedule for this year is considered rather superior to any previous season, affording as it will opportunity for favorable view of points of interest along the line, and making agreeable connections at New Orleans with limited trains of other lines to and from the important centers of the east.  
The train will leave San Francisco at 5 p. m. on Tuesdays and Fridays, passing Los Angeles about 7 o'clock the following morning, thus giving a daylight view of the orange belt of Southern California.  
Its connections at El Paso with through cars of the Texas & Pacific for St. Louis, will place California passengers in that city in 10 to 12 hours ahead of all other lines. The trip from Houston to New Orleans, through the interesting plantations and bayous of Southern Louisiana, will also be by daylight, and the arrival in the Gulf City, just in time to connect with the fast trains for Washington, New York, Cincinnati, Chicago and other points.  
The Sunset Limited equipment and service is up to its well-known high standard. It is worthy of remark that the distance of 3000 miles from San Francisco to New York, is traversed by the Sunset Limited in 114 hours, only 12 hours longer than by the fastest trains through Chicago, a distance of 3,000 miles. The Sunset is an ideal winter route, the traveler not being subjected to any of the discomforts incident to inclement weather conditions of the more Northern routes.

## SEWER GAS.

The Disagreeable Odors at the City Hall Being Traced Up.  
Chairman Burrows of the committee on Health and Police, of the city council, is making a thorough investigation of the sewer gas question at the city hall.  
Careful examination Wednesday failed to disclose any fault with the main sewer system or any chance for the gas to escape therefrom, but a bad condition was found in the closet in the fire department which may account for the trouble on the second floor.  
It will be necessary to follow up the ventilating shaft and see whether it is continuous to an open-air outlet or whether it is simply run into an open space between the walls or floors of the building. It will be remembered that several little flaws of that kind have been unearthed in the ventilating system of the building since it was constructed under the spoils system of municipal government, which was overthrown a year ago.  
The practicability of connecting the city hall sewer to the O. S. P. sewer on Center street is also being looked into though the impression is that the fall is the wrong way.
