Who Are Always Just Going to Build Motor Lines and \$100,000.

Witty Article on "Booming Railroads" from the Pen of Editor Oliver of the Lakeview Register.

"Why don't you boom the railroad?" we are often asked.

"Boom it, how?" we inquire.

"Why, talk about it!" is the reply.

Now, what is to be accomplished by filling up the columns of the paper every week about a railroad? Will that build it? Will it cause those who are building it to finish it any sooner? Will it hurry them or affect them in any way?

Men who build railroads do not build them because people want them, or because towns need them, or because newspapers boom them. They take a map of the country before them, and study the resources of a given section where there is no railroad. If upon full investigation they become convinced that it will pay to build a road through any particular section, they have a survey made, begin to survey the right-of-way, and then grade and lay the track. They make their own calculations, take their time and use their own judgment. What the people along the line say or think they do not take into consideration, and it only amuses them to see a "one gallow" newspaper tearing its shirt off over the matter, if they happen to see it at all. Nine times out of ten they don't see it, and do not even know it is published.

Moneyed men are always on the look out, and if there is an opening for a railroad in any part of the country they are quick to see it. In fact, see it long before the people living in a section see it, because they make such things a study, and know an opening for a railroad when they see it. And when there is an opening discovered, they are quick to make the start and secure the right of way, for there is great competition, over building new railroads into paying localities.

Admitting that a railroad would be beneficial here; that the prices of real estate would advance; that supplies would be cheaper; that communication with the outside world would be easier; that teamsters would do better; that stage owners and stage drivers would be benefited; that common laborers would not meet with competition from the outside; that there would be just as much work for herdsmen and riders; that trucks would not come in; that money would be just as plentiful; admitting—everything, what is the use of publishing a lot of "roar" every week that does not interest a single subscriber or benefit the paper, or any one else, or have any more effect in building the railroad than does a fee dog baying the moon.

It is true that a paper in "booming" a railroad might stir up some rancher and cause him to spoil a good tract of land by giving a right of way through it, which would be a good thing for the company building the road when they get ready to use it, but it would not benefit any local citizen.

If any news that should be of interest to the public arises concerning the railroad we will gladly publish it, but we are not here to split our goods, or strain our spinal column when there is nothing to accomplish and no benefit to be derived for our citizens.
