Editorial Review.
 The formation of political alignments within the Republican party are not being discussed by the Push organs, great or small. They are all mum, and do not propose to let the people know what is going on. The Push organ is either edited by an office-holder, by a candidate for office, or it is controlled by one of these two classes. Hence it must keep still. Not one of them dare tell what it learns, save come out for or against Senator McBride, or can really say, "my soul is my own if I've got one, and I don't know as I have." This is the humiliating attitude of the alleged molders of opinion in the Republican party. They don't know but what McBride will win again. Then they want to be in a position to receive crumbs from his hands. This paper does not blame Mr. McBride for getting the office if he can. If he gets it we propose he shall get it openly and above-board, not by stealth and indirection, not by professing to be for one man as a cover to secure it for himself. As senator, even if he is defeated he will try to dictate terms to the senator who takes the place. If he cannot do that Mr. McBride has the prestige and skill to get a fat office for himself for life. So he needs no sympathy.

The people are tired of personal politics in Oregon. If the legislature is Republican or anti-Republican, its members should not be owned or mortgaged in advance in the interest of any candidate. The bold attempt to select a McBride slate in Marion county should be defeated.

Collector Patterson, after looking over the ground carefully, it is reported has decided that he cannot again round up the Push elements successfully in Marion county for himself or anyone else. He is conferring and casting about for a suitable man to unload that task upon and prepare to go in with the winning crowd. This is sagacious, because Patterson, who is really the best character of the whole rotten-apple combination, realizes that he is not as popular with the strong Republican elements as he once was. He no longer enjoys the political confidence of the Simon-Corbett faction. His support of Lord for senator was only a makeshift to land McBride. His support of the Mitchell-Tongue-

Ellis coalition has been sincere and unaffected and he has got his reward. His support of the slippery elements of Mitchell Republicanism that were turned out of the last state convention was genuine he cannot get away from those associations long enough to get a new hold.

The man he has picked upon to round up the forlorn hopes of the Push in this county is said to be the holdover Senator N. H. Looney of Jefferson. Looney made a careful record in the last legislature. He is a gentleman of good inclinations, and is generally impelled by sound motives of public policy.

He possesses a good deal of courage and freed from obnoxious machine control, is in every respect one of the better class of Republicans. Whether Senator Looney will accept the difficult task of heading the local machine is not known, but such is the general order of the day, and as a good soldier he is expected to obey.

The People do not yet fully appreciate the advantage of having public offices filled by men who are not nominated by a machine. Mayor Jones of Toledo recent non-partisan candidate for Governor of Ohio, puts it thus clearly:

"I was a non-partisan candidate because I believe the party system, or the system of government by party, has had its day. I am not railing against parties; I am simply for a better thing—government by the people through the system of direct nomination and direct legislation, doing away with the machine, the primary, the caucus, delegate and convention; the machine by which all results are usually settled before the convention meets. I was a candidate because 50,000 Ohio free men asked me to be. My candidacy was announced a week before the Democratic convention assembled, and once announced, nothing but death could have taken me out of it.

"No enterprise that I have ever engaged in has ever given me the satisfaction that this non-partisan campaign brings me thus far. It is such a joy and delight to be free, to see that there is a scientific solution to the awful muddle of our political situation. Certainly I will never be a candidate for any office that can be conferred by any convention or caucus or clique; it must be by free petition of the free voters of the political division that I am in.

"My conception of freedom is so broad that I recognize your right and the right of every other man to believe in parties and machines and to cling to them, just as some people cling to the spinning wheel, the hand loom, the sickle and the flail for a time after improved machinery for doing the work had been discovered. I am not against

The reason why Patterson and Bingham secretly bought stock in THE JOURNAL was not because this paper referred to them as homes unexploited their political management. They relish that sort of advertising. It makes them great in the eyes of the smaller fry who are fed from the spoils of politics. Even accusing them of doubtful practices in connection with ballot-box and election returns puts a feather in the caps of men who reap the benefit of such frauds. All these things they could stand, but not to constantly reveal that their zeal for Republicanism had no higher source than personal graft. They must buy stock and bring suit for a receivership that would give them control of the policy of this paper; they ask for an order to get possession of its books and then do not want to know their contents; they charge that the CAPITAL JOURNAL corporation is being wrecked because it cannot be allowed as to their operations in public affairs. This may appear personal and tiresome to the general public, but the people must learn that a public newspaper performs a function in securing good government as sacred and important as that of the public officials themselves. Every state capital needs such a paper. We only regret that we have not been able to print a larger and better paper and show up all the details of the state and national government as well as of the city of Salem. That will have to be done before the people can get at the root of abuses, and reduce their public and political burdens to a point that approximates less of robbery and more of justice.

HER SERVICE TO THE BOERS
 What England Has Done for the Transvaal, and Its Grievance.
 Fought by Review.

At last it is well to have driven Boer diplomats allied with Continental intrigues, Irish malcontents, and the whole crew of noisy conspirators against the British crown, into the open. And here we might say, that, although England neither needs nor looks for European sympathy in these South African matters, which concern her alone as the sovereign and paramount power, she might, anyhow, have expected to see a spark of Boer gratitude even on historical grounds.
