

OFFICIAL IGNORANCE REVEALED

The London Times Roasts the Ordnance Department

Bombardment of Mafeking Continues -- Humorous Message Sent in a Five Pound Shell -- New Zealand Regiment Scores a Victory -- What General Buller Wants -- England at Last Decides to Send Cavalry to South Africa Now Mobilizing the Yeomanry -- Ten Thousand Mounted Infantry to Be Dispatched to the Seat of War -- Enthusiasm of Volunteers

By Associated Press to the Journal. PARIS, Dec. 20.--It is rumored here that the bank of Russia has advanced the bank of England eight million pounds.

Costly Ignorance. **By Associated Press to the Journal.** LONDON, Dec. 20.--Further accounts of the Tugela River battle emphasize the ignorance of the British intelligence department in regard to the disposition of the Boer forces. The British were not aware that the Boers were entrenched along a series of low-lying hills, immediately northward of the Colenso bridge, until a staggering fire compelled them to retreat when the attack seemed about to succeed. The Boers were also in greater numbers than was anticipated.

It becomes clear also that the British guns were lost in the attempt to get within effective range of the Boer artillery, showing that the latter out-ranged the British ordnance. The British war office comes in for scathing denunciation from the Times today, for not providing proper artillery. There was no news this morning to enlighten the general situation.

The British Advance. December 18, after shelling Jansfontein farm three miles eastward of the Boer position, the New Zealanders occupied the farm.

From Mafeking. **By Associated Press to the Journal.** LONDON, Dec. 20.--The last news from Mafeking is dated the sixth and says: Desultory bombardment continued and sharpshooters engage in smart duels mornings and evenings. The dispatch describes a novel method of sending messages adopted by some Boers. A five-pound shell was fired into the town and did not explode. It was opened and found to contain as letter as follows: "Dear Powell: Excuse iron messenger. No other means of communication. Please tell Mrs. -- her mother and family are all well. Don't drink all the whiskey. Leave some for us when we get in."

A Boer Rattmate. NEW YORK, Dec. 20.--Charles D. Pierce, consul in this city from the Orange Free State, was asked what he thought about the way things were going in South Africa. He said: "The British can send 1,800,000 troops down there instead of 180,000 if they want to, and still they won't get the upper hand for a year or two."

Pray As They Shoot. NEW YORK, Dec. 20.--A dispatch from Antwerp says: Two great prayer meetings were held tonight at Rotterdam by the Dutch pastors gathered from all Holland. The Transvaal hymn was sung and 60,000 florins collected for the Boer wounded.

Menelik's Attitude. NEW YORK, Dec. 20.--London papers display much anxiety over the attitude of Menelik, the emperor of Abyssinia, toward England. There is a dispute as to the boundary between Egypt and Abyssinia, and it is feared Menelik may consider the present an excellent time to make a demonstration against the British.

After Midnight News. LONDON, Dec. 20, 4:45 a. m.--The government has at last consented to mobilize a force which General Buller is credited with having demanded all along as essential to success in South Africa, namely, 10,000 mounted infantry.

This morning the war office issued an order to the effect that the government had decided to raise for South Africa a mounted infantry force, to be called, "Imperial Yeomanry," to be recruited from yeomanry, volunteers and civilians possessing the requisite qualifications. Enlistment will be for one year, or during the continuance of the war. The men must be between 20 and 25 years of age, and of equal physique to the ordinary cavalry soldier. Officers and men are to provide their own horses and to wear neutral tint cloth shooting jackets, not necessarily uniform, felt hats, breeches and gaiters. All must be good riders and marksmen.

The same order invites every volunteer regiment that is linked with regular battalion serving at the front to supply a full company, which will take the place of the mounted infantry of the regiment.

These arrangements are expected to result in a considerable force. The enrolled strength of the yeomanry forces, which originated in the troublesome periods of the French revolution, is now 10,431. Their services have never before been called for in war.

Raising of Volunteers. The lord mayor of London, Alfred Newton, is raising and equipping a force of 1000 volunteers among the city corps. The large city firms are contributing the necessary expense.

Colonel Sir Charles Howard Vincent, commandant of the Queen's Westminster volunteers has also offered to raise a regiment of 1000 picked men.

Ninety per cent of the members of the Honorable artillery company, of London have volunteered for service in South Africa.

Two-thirds of the Inns of Court volunteers, composed of barristers and solicitors, have likewise tendered their services.

The enthusiasm of volunteer enlistments continues, and promises to give the government ample material.
