HEAVY RAINS IN SOUTH AFRICA

Will Be Sure to Delay all Movements for a Time.

BOER PRISONERS ARE DYING ON BRITISH TRANSPORTS

Typhoid Carries off a Hundred Victims--Botha Denies That Boer Women Were Wounded in the Tugela Trenches

By Associated Press to the Journal. LONDON, March 27.—Reconnaissance of slight importance continue to be the only feature of the war in South Africa. Lord Roberts wires as follows: "Bloemfontein Captain Stone Stanley of the 19th lancers, was slightly wounded in an advance on outposts north of Modder river March 25."

Boer reports from Natal show that no new developments of any importance have occurred there up to March 23d. General Botha denies the report that some Transvaal women were wounded in the Tugela trenches. Michael Davitt arrived at Lorenzo Marques March 24th.

A Ladysmith special says: "Boer patriots endeavored to trap a party of the 13th huzzars March 25th at Waschbank, and several Boers were wounded."

Advices from Cape Town say that rains are general throughout South Africa. This will still more militate against any immediate British advance.

Sickness among the Boer prisoners on the transports is increasing and typhoid alone claims 100 victims.

seals, the peace envoys from the Federal forces, are due at Naples in a few days. After visiting two or three European capitals, they will go to New York, via Antwerp. It is understood at The Hague that they are invested with large powers, and are prepared to agree to anything looking toward intervention.

The Times prints a statement from Cape town to the effect that the Boers, after deducting heavy losses, are probably unable now to put more than 30,000 men on the fighting line.

Spencer Wilkinson, in the Morning Post today, warns the public against blinding themselves to the magnitude of the task which has yet to be performed in South Africa. He then refers to the fact that an immense distance has to be traversed, and points out that only the smaller portion of the Free State has yet been touched by the British advance.

DELAGOA BAY AWARD REPORT.

LONDON, March 27.—It is learned that Portugal is quite prepared to meet the Delagoa Bay award without borrowing money. Current reports that Great Britain intends lending the Portuguese government money in exchange for privileges at Delagoa Bay and Beira are declared to be incorrect.

Berke, March 28.—In semi-official circles it is asserted with reference to the Delagoa Bay arbitration, that there is no foundation for the statement that the question of increasing the sum granted for conceded territory is under consideration. On the contrary, the total amount of indemnity to be paid by Portugal was fixed, some time ago, and the court of arbitration—as cabled yesterday—is now concerned solely with the division of the award among those interested.

SALISBURY DENIES REPORT

By Associated Press to the Journal. LONDON, March 27.—The report published in the United States that Salisbury has apologized for opening the American consular mail in South Africa is untrue. Nothing whatever has passed between the two governments on the matter, and the British premier has taken no action to investigate the allegations of the former consul Macrum, nor has he been requested to do so.

CORRESPONDENCE PRESENTED

Report that Uncle Sam Has Bought the Danish West Indies--Negro Lynched in Maryland.

FRANKFURT, March 27.—At the trial of Secretary of State Powers, Governor Brown announced that no testimony would be introduced for the defense. He also tendered the pardon issued to Powers by Governor Taylor as a bar to further prosecution, and asked that the defendant be dismissed. Col. Campbell said the commonwealth denied Taylor's right to issue a pardon. Brown then moved that the prisoner be dismissed on the evidence. The motion was overruled and Powers was held to the grand jury without bail.

H. E. Yontsey, a Republican, Auditor Sweeney's private secretary, was arrested today as the man whom Golden mentioned in his testimony as the man to whom John Powers gave the key to the office of Caleb Powers.

THE CHINESE OPEN DOOR.

WASHINGTON, March 27.—Secretary Hay today submitted to congress the correspondence with the government and other nations respecting the maintenance of an "open door" in China. The correspondence extended over a period from September last to the 20th inst. The last date making a successful completion of the undertaking. The nations addressed on the subject were Great Britain, France, Germany, Russia, Italy and Japan.

DOINGS IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Consideration of the Alaskan civil code law bill was resumed, the pending question being an amendment as to mining claims held by Laplanders in the Cape Nome district.

The army bill was laid aside temporarily and the Puerto Rican bill taken up. Stewart addressed the senate in opposition to the tariff.

WASHINGTON, March 27.—The house resumed the consideration of the army appropriation bill. Pierce read Senator Hanna's denunciation of the story that the Puerto Rican tariff bill was framed for the purpose of raising a Republican campaign fund, and challenged an investigation of the charges. Steele engaged Pierce, and there was a sharp exchange of courtesies.

THE TROUBLES IN COUER D'ALENE

WASHINGTON, March 27.—Governor Steunenberg continued his testimony in the Couer d'Alene investigation today.

The governor stated that he knew nothing of the selection of an alleged convict as chief of the state deputies, or of alleged decorations by this deputy.

Lents, on cross-examination, brought out that the governor had visited Oscar d'Alene during the political canvass and held public meetings. In 1896 he received the bulk of the votes of Shoshone county, and in 1898 he lost this vote.

Lents asked if the governor had changed his mind as to the character of the men of this district after the loss of this vote. The governor replied that it was his impression that these men began to change about January 1897, soon after he received their vote.

DANISH ANTILLES BOUGHT BY US

LONDON, March 27.—A dispatch from Paris says: The sale of the Danish Antilles to the United States has practically been completed.

IS DENIED A NEW TRIAL

PORTLAND, March 27.—Judge George today denied a motion for a new trial in the case of Frank McDaniel convicted of the murder of Claire Fitch. Thirty days are allowed his attorney to file a bill of exceptions.

BIG SHIPYARD MOVEMENTS

SAN FRANCISCO, March 27.—The Call says the owners of the Risdon Iron Works have secured control of the Pacific Rolling Mill. It is stated that a dry dock capable of receiving the largest vessel afloat will be built.

FOR PATROL OF BEHRING SEA

NEW YORK, March 27.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Arrangements are being perfected by the treasury department for the establishment and maintenance of a Behring sea patrol. The patrol will be made by five cutters, the Bear, Mauney, Perry, McCulloch and Rush.

FAILING BANK CASHIER ARRESTED.

ROTLAND, March 27.—The Merchant's National Bank closed its doors today, and Cashier Muzzey is under arrest, charged with the misappropriation of funds. It is announced that the shortage of Cashier Muzzey amounts to \$18,000. The cashier was arrested at Albany, New York.
