AMERICANS IN BATTLE

Colonel Wint Leads Them Against the Enemy.

THE SITUATION AT AMOY IS CAUSING GREAT ALARM

No Powers Have Declared War--Chinese Still Hope to Retake Pekin--Word is Received From Conger.

Washington, Aug. 27.--The condition of affairs at Amoy is attracting the greatest share of attention at the State department. The United States consul at that point has become alarmed at the rioting; and at the landing of a considerable force of Japanese marines and sailors.

The United States has not invited any government to participate in a conference with the purpose of arranging for the future of China, nor has it received any such invitation from other governments. There is a manifest desire on the part of the European Governments to get some expression from the United States as to its wishes before committing themselves.

MESSAGE FROM MINISTER CONGER

Washington, Aug. 27.--A message has been received from Minister Conger. It was forwarded from Taku under today's date, but the Pekin date is unknown.

The conger message is as follows: "No important developments since last dispatch. Military trying to restore order. No representative of the Chinese government encountered yet. Several ministers of the Tsung Li Yamen are reported to be in the city, and are expected to appear soon.

AMERICANS FIGHT A LARGE FORCE

Washington, Aug. 27.--The following from Chaffee is received at the war department: "Taku, Aug. 27.--Colonel Wint on the 19th reports that he engaged a large force of the enemy seven miles from the city and dispersed them, killing about 100. The Americans lost five wounded."

Wint is Lieutenant-Colonel of the sixth cavalry. The fight probably occurred near Tien Tsin, as the Sixth cavalry was there at the time mentioned.

NO POWERS HAVE DECLARED WAR

London, Aug. 27.--There is absolutely no truth in the rumor that Germany, Russia and Japan had declared war on China. Inquiries made at St. Petersburg, Berlin and Tokio show the report rejected at those capitals "as unworthy of notice."

Chinese Want to Retake Pekin. A dispatch from Tokio says General Yamaguchi reports that the Chinese have not abandoned the hope of retaking Pekin and that 9,000 men with 15 guns are advancing toward Pekin from Shan Tung.

OCCUPIED BY RUSSIAN TROOPS

St. Petersburg, Aug. 27.--General Grodekoff, Commander of the Amur Government, reports, under date of August 24, that Kam Ni and Tcha Tchan have been occupied by the Russians. The Chinese sent an emissary to General Rennekamp proposing a suspension of hostilities, but the Russian General replied that he was unable to cease hostilities.

Franks of Explosions.

Gunpowder explosions have one remarkable feature. The bodies of persons killed in such an accident are always found without clothing, but frequently one foot will have the shoe on. NAVAL FLAGS FLY AT CHICAGO

Chicago, Aug. 27.--This was the day of the Grand Army encampment set aside for the men of the navy, and from morning until evening the ensigns of the sea were given precedence over the battle flags of the men who fought on land.

ARE UNITED FOR ADLAI STEVENSON

Chicago, Aug. 27.--The national committee of the Populist party gathered in this city today for the purpose of naming a vice-presidential candidate.

The ante-conference talk seemed to point to the selection of Adlai Stevenson, although Marion Butler, the chairman of the committee, spent much time in explaining why it was unwise, according to his view, to ratify the second place nomination of the Democratic convention.

Will Rebuild. The Evangelical Lutheran congregation, whose new church was burned to the ground with all its contents last Friday night, has commenced gathering their resources to rebuild.

The congregation is small and the loss is a heavy blow. The building was insured in the McMinnville company for \$1,000, but the unrecouped loss will be at least \$500.

A subscription paper is being circulated to help raise funds for a new building, and is meeting with a kindly reception from the business men of the city. It is a most worthy cause and those able to do so can make no better use of their money than by helping toward the new church.

New Suit. In Dept. No. 1 of the Circuit Court, Mark S. Skiff, administrator of the estate of F. McCully, deceased, has commenced suit against Milton Brown and Hattie Brown, his wife, for collection of a promissory note for \$100, with interest from Oct. 19, 1895, and \$35 attorney fees.

Electric Motor. The Yokohama Tea store at 243 Commercial has added a new electric motor to be used in running the coffee and spice mill. The new motor is one-half horse power and it is the only motor of this kind on the coast.

TO LYNCH A WOMAN

An Illinois Mob After a Woman Doctor.

TWO MEN KILLED THREE WOUNDED

The Result of Interfering With a Lying-in Hospital Managed by Madam Wright at Gilman Illinois.

ARE UNITED FOR ADLAI STEVENSON

GILMAN, Ill., Aug. 27.--Two men killed, three wounded, two perhaps fatally, one woman wounded and her residence burned, are the results of an all-night battle between a mob and Mrs. C. W. Wright.

The dead are: John Myers, Michael Ryan. Fatally wounded: Lawrence Ryan, George Willoughby, Mrs. Dr. Wright. Seriously wounded: Peter Lauer.

Mrs. Dr. Wright has been conducting a lying-in hospital on the outskirts of Gilman. The trouble was precipitated by an investigation of a coroner's jury into the death of Bessie Salter, who died in the hospital on Friday night. A warrant was sworn out for Mrs. Wright's arrest.

Constable Nielstead and a posse went to the house to serve the warrant. They were met by a volley from the house, which was returned with the above result. Madam Wright was brought to the city hall and a strong guard was placed over her. A crowd soon assembled and threats of lynching were uttered. The officers finally restored order, but further trouble is feared.

P. O. S. Of A. Convention.

LEBANON, Pa., Aug. 27.--The State convention of the Patriotic Order Sons of America is in session here today. The convention will be spread over a period of five days. Today is being devoted to the reception of the officers, delegates and members of the State camps.

Mauled His Mistress. F. B. Strong, a despicable character who has been lying around town for some time, was arrested early this morning on complaint of his mistress Ruth Strong (no relation), one of the "boarders" in Mrs. McGinnis' resort on Peppermint flat, who charged him with assault and battery.

He was brought before City Recorder Judah this afternoon, plead guilty and was fined \$15 and costs. Failing to liquidate, he was committed to the county jail, but on arriving at the court house he paid his fine to the sheriff and was released.

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THE BOERS RETREATED

United British Army Fight Them Sunday.

THEIR STAND IS DETERMINED

And they have a Large Number of Guns. Gen. Olivier Reported Captured By Bruce-Hamilton Near Winburg.

ARE UNITED FOR ADLAI STEVENSON

LONDON, Aug. 27.--The following is sent by Lord Roberts: Belfast, (Sunday). "We engaged the enemy the greater part of the day. Littleton's division and two brigades of cavalry, under Buller and French, with two brigades of cavalry, drove the enemy to Lekeniv. As soon as French reached Lekeniv, Pole-Carew advanced from Belfast in his support. The Boers are making a determined stand. They have a large number of guns."

General Olivier is Captured. The following is from Lord Roberts: "The Boers have been beaten back by Bruce-Hamilton at Winburg. General Olivier is reported captured."

SAFE ROBBERS AT MEDFORD

Medford, Or., Aug. 27.--The general merchandise store of Roames Bros., Gold Hill, Or., was broken into about 4 o'clock Sunday morning and robbed of \$410. The safe was drilled and blown open, evidently by professionals. Valuable papers belonging to the Postoffice, which was in the same building, were destroyed. There is no clew to the robbers.

Got Her Money. The money to pay off the judgment of Jennie Smitson vs. the Southern Pacific Company was received by the attorneys for the plaintiff, H. W. Tompkinson and A. C. Woodcock, recently by Wells, Fargo & Co.'s express, and the same has been cancelled on the records of the court house. The total amount received was \$12,324.30. Of this, \$10,000 was the original verdict of the jury, and the \$2,324.30 was interest and costs. Thus ends one of the leading damage cases ever tried in the Lane county circuit court.
