WILDMAN CONFERRING WITH MAC ARTHUR

Two Detached Parties of Americans in the Philippines are Scattered by Warlike Bands of Native Forces

By Associated Press to the Journal. NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—A special to the World from Hong Kong says: Americans and their extensive interest in the far south of China are imperiled by a rebellion in the Kwang Tung province. Wildman, Consul General at Hong Kong, has gone to Manila to confer over the critical situation with General MacArthur.

MANILA, via Hong Kong.—A detachment of 26 men of the twenty-fourth regiment near San Jose, Luzon, were set upon by 200 rebels and overpowered and scattered. Seven Americans reached San Jose but it is probable the remainder were captured. The enemy surprised the party of scouts of the forty-third infantry three miles from Takloban, Leyte island, killing three Americans at the first volley. The native police of Takloban had conspired to surprise the Americans.

That Date Embraced. STREET CAR COLLISION

On Line Between Seattle and Renton

UNFORTUNATE NUMBER OF THIRTEEN INJURED

There Was a Heavy Fog and the Cars Came Together While Running at Full Speed. The Days' Fire Record

By Associated Press to the Journal. SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 16.—A street car collision occurred this morning on the line between Seattle and Renton. Thirteen people on the passenger car and one man on the freight car were more or less seriously injured.

A heavy fog enveloped the valley and the cars came together with appalling force. The injured are: Major W. V. Rinehart, severely bruised. Leander Miller, right arm wrenched. Alfred Almqvist, motorman, bruised not serious. R. J. Rhodes, conductor, cut and bruised. F. Abrahams, Dunlap, injured internally, serious. Mrs. C. Wilson, internal injuries, serious. S. C. Espy, Sunnyside, badly cut. H. W. Scott, bruised. Mabel Ward, badly bruised. George Baskett, cut about body, leg dislocated. Merton Groat, conductor, serious internal injuries. Thomas Chambers, serious internal injuries. Milton Roy, hands cut. David Simpson, of O'Brien, face badly cut.

New York, Oct. 16.—Fire in the port of Limon, Costa Rica, Saturday destroyed the entire business section of the city and caused a property loss of \$2,000,000.

SULLIVAN, Ind., Oct. 16.—Fire destroyed the Burton Brothers building, opera house and several mercantile concerns. Loss \$100,000.

OMAHA, Wis., Oct. 16.—Fire today in the lumber district destroyed 13,000,000 feet of lumber and other property. Loss \$300,000.

RENEWED ATTACKS

English Admit the Boer War Not Ended

ACTIVITY DELAYS ROBERTS' DEPARTRE

Rumors of Attacks on the Railway North of Standerton—General Buller Recalled

By Associated Press to the Journal. LONDON, Oct. 16.—Commenting upon the activity of the Boers and the statement from Cape Town that Lord Roberts has postponed his home-coming, the Standard says:

"There are certain indications pointing to the conclusion that unexpected difficulties have arisen which Lord Roberts deems grave enough to delay his return for some time to come. The facts suggest that it is impossible yet to denude South Africa of any substantial portion of the large army now engaged in dominating a sullen and recalcitrant people."

The editorial finally calls for the severest measures against irreconcilable Boers, "prompt and ruthless punishment for every insurgent burgher caught in delicto."

Buller Recalled. Lord Roberts, in an army order announcing the return of General Buller to England, thanks Sir Redvers for his gallant service while he was Commander-in-Chief of the British forces in South Africa, and for the ability with which he carried out the operations while serving under Lord Roberts, which, the order declares, "resulted in the collapse of the Boers in Eastern Transvaal."

Work for Him in England. General Buller's impending return from South Africa is understood to be due to a rather unexpected call upon his services in reorganizing the army service corps, says the London correspondent of Tribune. His experience in South Africa of the many defects of the existing organizations has led to the authorities asking him to put the system under which the corps conducts its work on a proper footing.

It is now the general belief that to General Kitchener, who is a favorite of Lord Salisbury, will be given the task of maintaining order in the Transvaal and Orange River Colony.

The South African mining companies have been bitterly disappointed by the delay in ending the military campaign. They sent their engineers and agents in Cape Town when Pretoria was occupied and there they remained in idleness month after month. A dozen engineers, representing the largest mining interests, have been allowed to go to Johannesburg and report on the condition of the plants; pumping operations have not been resumed and miners and natives cannot be employed until the railways are prepared to carry coal and supplies on a large scale.

FROM AN OLD-LINE REPUBLICAN STATESMAN

Independence and a Territorial Form of Government for the Filipinos --- A Progressive Kind of Program Outlined For Their Development and Self-Government

Writing to a gentleman in this city under date of October 13, 1900, Hon. H. W. Corbett, of Portland further discusses what he considers would be a just and equitable policy toward the Filipinos. He says: "Believing as I do, in the development of these islands, FOR THEIR OWN BEST INTERESTS AS WELL AS FOR the benefit of AMERICAN INTERESTS, I earnestly advocate their retention and development and THE ESTABLISHMENT OF AMERICAN INSTITUTIONS and a liberal and wise policy of AMERICAN INDEPENDENCE, and the inauguration of a REPUBLICAN REPRESENTATIVE FORM OF GOVERNMENT, as soon as the population can be educated to that point. IN THE MEANTIME, they should be permitted TO SELECT A SUITABLE REPRESENTATIVE from their own people, TO ADVOCATE THEIR INTEREST AT WASHINGTON, THE SAME AS ANY OTHER OF OUR POSSESSIONS UNDER A TERRITORIAL FORM OF GOVERNMENT, the national government appointing a governor and the judges of the courts, until such time as they are capable of choosing their own governor and judicial officers."

"Of course you are aware that I believe in these islands as a valuable possession for the future development of that country, and I THINK THEY ARE A PEOPLE, when once they realize the fostering care of our government, and when they are once educated, WHO WOULD BECOME A VALUABLE ACQUISITION TO OUR NATION, and their products will be of incalculable value to this country, in exchange for the products of our home climate."

"From what I have learned of the Philippine Archipelago, the products of the country are of inestimable value and capable of being developed to a very great degree. The interior of the upland of the country, when settled by an energetic class of people, will be developed and the rich products of that region will prove to be of very great value to this country. I think the civilizing influences of America upon the people will be very marked in the future years, in contrast with that of the Spanish policy heretofore pursued. Under the Spanish rule they have been kept in ignorance, consequently they have failed to develop the best qualities that they are capable of, when rightly directed."

"When this country becomes more settled AND THEY REALIZE OUR HUMANE INSTITUTIONS and examples set by enterprising young men of America, with energy and perseverance, they will develop into A COMMUNITY CAPABLE OF DIRECTING THEIR OWN AFFAIRS TO A GREAT EXTENT, from which will spring capable men of their own to represent their interests in the councils of the nation. My impressions are that A CENTRAL GOVERNMENT ESTABLISHED ON THE ISLAND OF LUZON, WITH REPRESENTATIVES FROM THE VARIOUS ISLANDS, where their mutual interests can be discussed and developed, and then with a universal system of common school education, which they are now deprived of, will bring about such a wonderful change in these islands as to make them a valuable acquisition to this nation and the internal resources will develop a wealth, to a greater degree than we can possibly now anticipate."

THE EDIBLE MUSHROOMS

The Court House Square Producing Some Lovely Specimens.

To eat or not to eat is always a question with mushrooms that better be decided correctly and scientifically before eating. The brown mushroom with fawn-colored gills is the "Animata formosa." It has been coming up profusely on the court house square. We are indebted for the scientific name to C. H. Hall, who has one of the latest illustrated encyclopedias on the subject and has found this variety described. It is an edible variety, very rich in flavor, and very tender, but should be eaten before the gills turn black, as they do about 24 hours after it comes up. To a mushroom crank it tastes like a fine eastern oyster.

Another mushroom that has come up on the courthouse square, a creamy-colored variety that does not open out its gills, but remains closed like an umbrella. Inside it is pure white and of fine flavor when fried in butter. This looks like the shaggy-coated, and is flocked up like a Japanese Chrysanthemum. Dr. Hall will please look up its latin name as it is fine eating.
