A GENERAL REBELLION

Seems to Be the Order of the Day in the Chinese Empire.

DETACHMENT OF GERMAN SOLDIERS SLAUGHTER A BATCH OF BOXERS

Minister Conger Has Instructions to Go Ahead and Recognize the Chinese Envoys—Other Powers Have Given Same Orders.

It is understood representatives at Peking of other powers have similar instructions, but, whether they have or not, Conger is not to be restrained.

ROOSEVELT ROLLING

Along With a Big Day's Work Ahead.

THE VICTIM OF A BAD EGG

But He Keeps His Temper and Puts a Pleasant Construction on the Matter—Bryan Meetings Continue Large.

By Associated Press to the Journal. UTICA, N. Y.—The Roosevelt train pulled out today at 8:20 o'clock. The itinerary of the day includes speeches at Watertown, Oswego and Auburn. Governor Roosevelt laughing over the egg firing episode last night. "As only one egg was fired, I am inclined to believe it was the work of some mischievous boy. I am sure the egg was not intended for me."

IN DELAWARE AND MARYLAND

WASHINGTON, Del., Oct. 25.—The first of Mr. Bryan's meetings in this city was held in a big tent, and, while the big meeting began much earlier, Mr. Bryan did not appear before 9 o'clock. He had a long and busy day, and found it necessary to have a long rest after his arrival in this city. The tent was crowded to suffocation and there were far more people on the outside of the tent and its immediate vicinity than there was on the inside of the canvas. The great crowd yelled itself hoarse when Mr. Bryan entered, and some time was required to secure quiet. Mr. Bryan took cognizance of a series of questions propounded to him by John P. Nields, of this city.

On the fifth question, relative to paying the obligations of this government gold or silver, if elected president, he said: "I want the Republicans who want this question answered to first find out what the law requires, and then I want them to know that, if elected president, I will enforce that law just as I will enforce the law against the trusts, and put striped clothes on big thieves as well as little thieves. If you ask to construe a point in law, I reply that I shall not construe a law until it becomes my duty to enforce it."

Chinese Pulse Feeling. The Chinese physicians, it is well known, have long had the credit of paying very particular attention to the pulse. They even pretend to derive a much more intimate and accurate knowledge of the state of the sick from that source than European practitioners lay any claim to.

The patient is directed to be laid in bed, with his arm resting on a small cushion. The physician must be seated, and both parties are enjoined to remain calm, silent and collected. The fingers are next to be applied in due succession, one after another, in order to judge of the compressibility of the artery.

The Chinese do not infer solely from the rapidity of the pulsations. Their mode is to compare the number of pulsations of the artery with the intervals of the expiration of the patient. The number of pulsations of a man in moderate health they consider in relation to the time of a natural inspiration and expiration. Four beats of the pulse during this period they consider as indicating perfect health. If it exceeds five pulsations, it is considered as too quick; if under that number, as too slow respecting good health. It is required to reckon 20 pulsations in order to form a correct indication. Their chief divisions of the pulse are four, the superficial, the profound, the quick and the slow. These they consider as having relation to the four temperaments, the choleric, the sanguine, the phlegmatic and the melancholy—health.

change the 16-to-1 ratio, and Mr. McKinley is now counting silver dollars at the ratio of 16 to 1, without waiting for the aid or consent of any nation on earth. Until the Republican party proposes to change the ratio, I object to their decreasing the ratio. When they propose to change it we will discuss it with them."

Mr. Bryan had an excellent audience at Dover, where he spoke for about three-quarters of an hour. The crowd's appreciation was manifested by frequent outbursts of applause. Mr. Bryan again addressed himself to the farmers of his audience, and among other things said to them: "Why should a farmer in Delaware vote to allow corporations to water their stock, when no farmer can inflate the value of his farm? I have no seen the statistics of Delaware, but I have seen the statistics of other states showing that agricultural land will sell for less today than it would sell for 10, 15 or 20 years ago."

You cannot inflate the value of your farm, and yet you allow a corporation to issue watered stock, sometimes as much as 10 times as much water as there is money invested, and then you allow it to combine and monopolize a market and plunder the people to pay dividends on money never invested in the corporations."

Discussing the Philippine question, Mr. Bryan referred to the flag of the United States, saying: "Do you Republicans want people to bow before the flag? I want people to turn their faces toward it and thank God that there is one flag on which there is no blood."

The Republican doctrine is the doctrine behind which the monarchies of the Old World have hidden when they wanted to plunder people under the pretense of protecting them. Ours is different protectorate. When the Republicans get through arguing those five questions, I will have some more for them. The trouble is that the Republican party is not attempting to meet the issues of this campaign."

After concluding his meeting at the tent, Mr. Bryan was driven to the Grand Opera-House, where he made his last speech of the night to an audience composed largely of ladies, some of whom had held their seats for three or four hours.

In his speech at Preston, Md., Mr. Bryan, in response to the inquiry, "How about 16 to 1?" said: "If you want to know about 16 to 1, I will tell you. Sixteen to one was the paramount issue in 1896, but the Republicans have done so many new things since then that we are kept busy on the new things. But if a Republican disputes the 16 to 1 doctrine you tell him that we have a Republican president, a Republican senate and a Republican house, and they have never attempted to

protect the Filipino without a great deal of trouble. We have protected the Republic of Central and South America for 75 years, and we have had no authority in those South American Republics; we have never governed them, but we have protected them from outside interference. It has never cost anything, but it has been valuable to them."
