## TODAY'S NEWS SUMMARIZED.

Queen of Sweden and Norway is very ill. Cornerstone of Crematory laid at Portland. Archbishop Martinelli will be made Cardinal. Germans still sending out expeditions from Pekin. Emperor William has sailed from England for home. Transport McPherson ashore near Matanzas, Cuba, will be total loss. Alliance discovered between revolutionists of Venezuela and Columbia. The Colorado Springs, coal strike has been settled and all mines open today with full force of men.

Piet Dewet, Chairman of Boer Peace Commission appeals to his brother, Christian, to surrender.

Senate passed bill appropriating \$50,000 for preparation of site and erection of statue for Major General George McClellan.

At conference of powers and Chinese plenipotentiaries indictment of twelve boxer leaders was read. Death penalty demanded.

The Duke and Duchess of Manchester, Lord Lambert and Eugene Zimmerman, father of the Duchess leave San Francisco for the east.

Federal Salt Company has obtained control of the Carmen Island works on the Gulf of California and now controls the output of this coast.

Banker Charles A. Hinckley, who disappeared in 1884, has been arrested at Roseland on the charge of stealing \$97,000 from the West side bank, New York.

A violent earthquake threw the steamer Guatemala partly out of the water and caused the vessel to tremble from stem to stern for at least a minute, off the coast of Ecuador on her last trip.

The Cuban constitutional convention will refuse positively to add a clause to the constitution expressing gratitude to the United States, but will adopt an independent resolution, thanking the United States senators.

## BATAVIAN DUTCH ATTACK CHINESE

### General Dewet Attacked the British Forces on the Railroad

LONDON, Feb. 6.—General Kitchener reports: "Smith-Dorrien has occupied Lake Charisse.

"French is driving back the enemy to Amsterdam.

"Dewet's force is still north of Thabanehu. His men engaged a train of transport wagons at Pompey's Siding this morning."

AMSTERDAM, Feb. 6.—Advices from Batavia, Island of Java, says that an expedition sent against Samalanga, Island of Sumatra, has captured the Chinese fortress of Batorilik. The Dutch loss was six killed and 40 wounded. The Chinese lost 70.

BAKU, Russian Transcaucasia, Feb. 6.—Fire broke out yesterday in the magazines of the Caspian & Black Sea Company, which contained six million pounds of petroleum. The conflagration resulted in great loss of life and widespread damage.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 6.—The steamer Australia which arrived today has on board the captain and twenty-eight of the crew of the British ship Pyrene, which took fire November 10th while enroute from Tacoma to Leith.

## BOXER LEADERS

### Indicted at Session of the Powers

## NAMES OF THE EMINENT CULPRITS

### Whose Heads Will be Demanded For Stirring up the Massacres

PEKIN, Feb. 6.—As had been arranged at the meeting of the ministers and Chinese plenipotentiaries yesterday, the entire proceedings were oral, no writings being presented to the Chinese. A formal indictment against the twelve culprits whose punishment was demanded however, was read, though Kang Yi and Li Ping Heng are dead. The names of the twelve are:

Prince Chuang, commander-in-chief of the Boxers who had a large share in the responsibility for the promises of the rewards of fifty taels for the capture of foreigners and their death. For protecting prince Tuan, the principal instigator of the trouble, he was appointed president of the Tzung Li Yamen after giving advice to the Chinese government. He was responsible for the edicts against foreigners between January 20 and August 16, was mainly responsible for the massacres in the provinces, especially in Shan Si, ordered the troops to attack the legations in opposition to the advice of high mandarins who were looking to a cessation of hostilities; secured the execution of members of the Tzung Li Yamen, favorable to foreigners and was the recognized author of the ultimatum of June 19 ordering the diplomatic corps to leave Pekin in twenty-four hours and ordered before the expiration of this delay firing upon all foreigners in the streets of the capital and was practically the author of the assassination of Baron von Ketteler, the German minister.

Duke Lan, vice president of the police department, who was accessory to the giving of orders for the capture of foreigners and was the first to open the gates of the city to the boxers.

Ying Nien, who was criminal accomplice of Prince Chuang and Duke Lan in their machinations.

Kang Yi one of the investigators and counselors of the boxers who always protected them and was most hostile to any understanding looking to the re-establishment of peaceful relations with the foreigners who was sent at the commencement of June to meet the boxers and endeavor to deter them from entering the city, but who on the contrary, encouraged them to follow the work of destruction and who signed with Prince Tuan and Ying Nien their principal notices and prepared the plan for the expulsion and annihilation of foreigners in the provinces of the Empire.

Chao Su Kiam, a member of the Grand Council and also Minister of Justice, who was one of the leaders against the foreigners and mainly responsible for the execution of the officials killed during the siege for having tried to stop

## BILLION DOLLARS

### Steel Combination Has Been Formed

## CARNEGIE WILL NOT COMPETE

### Trust Formed of Most Gigantic Propositions Yet Known

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—J. P. Morgan and Robert Bacon declined, today, to discuss or to make any statement whatever concerning reports that J. P. Morgan and Co have purchased the Carnegie steel properties.

The Tribune says:

"The object of J. Pierpont Morgan and the interests allied with him in the dealing with Mr. Carnegie for the purchase of control of the Carnegie company, was the assurance of peace and enduring peace, in the vast steel industry of the United States and this ideal condition appears now to be virtually an accomplished fact.

It is not assured that the often-mentioned 'billion dollar steel combination' will follow upon the acquisition of the control of the Carnegie company, the probability rather being that the Carnegie company may continue to be operated as a separate organization, but in complete harmony with the other great steel corporations, the policy of which is shaped by the powerful interests which have now come into possession of the majority of its capital stock.

The Carnegie company has \$140,000,000 and \$100,000,000 bonds. The companies in which Mr. Morgan is interested are capitalized as follows:

Federal Steel Co. \$100,000,000 common stock and \$100,000,000 preferred; of this \$16,484,300 common and \$33,263,500 preferred stock are outstanding; American Steel and Wire Co. \$50,000,000 common and \$40,000,000 preferred stock, all outstanding. National Tube Co. \$41,000,000 each of common and preferred stock, all issued, and the American Bridge Co. \$35,000,000 each of common and preferred stock of which \$1,527,300 of each has been issued.

The Morgan Group includes the International Steel Company with \$32,000,000 in common stock and \$27,000,000 preferred all issued. The American Tinplate Company \$50,000,000 common and \$30,000,000 preferred, with \$28,000,000 common and \$18,175,000 preferred stock issued; the American Steel Hoop Company \$10,000,000 common and \$14,000,000 preferred stock, all issued, and the American Sheet Steel Company \$26,000,000 common and \$26,000,000 preferred stock with \$24,600,000 of each issued.

Among the companies outside of these two groups are the American Car and Foundry Company, \$30,000,000 common and \$30,000,000 preferred stock, all issued; the Pressed Steel Car Company, with \$12,500,000 each of common and preferred stock, all issued, and the Republic Iron and Steel Co. with \$30,000,000 common and \$25,000,000 preferred stock of which \$27,191,000 is common and \$20,336,900 preferred stock are outstanding.

## MASONIC SECRETS

### Montreal Ultra-Montanes Are Alarmed

## KING EDWARD OF ENGLAND

### Also the Late Queen Were Protectors of the A. F. & A. M.

MONTREAL, Feb. 6.—The great bugaboo of the Clerical or Ultra-Montane party in the Province of Quebec is Free Masonry, and as King Edward is the grand master of England there was some curiosity to see what the mouthpiece of Ultra-Montanism would say about him and his connection with the order. La Varite, however, is comparatively mild in the remarks, and quite disappointed those who expected a diatribe against the King. It quotes an article from a Quebec French paper giving the Queen's masonic history and proceeds:

"We know that the King of England is a mason of high grade and also that Queen Victoria was a protector of that sect, which is condemned by the church. But high in rank as King Edward VII may be, he is probably not an A. C. with what passes in the inner circles of Free Masonry. The true chiefs of the sect, who are not always the seeming chiefs, accord willing titles and places of honor to Kings and princes, but they guard the Masonic secrets for themselves. They wish to turn to their profit the prestige of royalty. Voltaire, notwithstanding that the King is not in the intimate secrets of masonry, it is none the less painful for his Christian subjects to see him engaged in such an organization."

## THE JAPS PLEASED

### At Uncle Sam's Larger Boundaries

## DIDN'T WANT SPAIN NEAR BY

### An Admiral Says They Are of Some Strategic Importance

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Steps taken by this government to complete its title to the Bashee and other islands to the North of Luzon, it is said were due to representations made by Japan. After the acquisition of Formosa from China, Japan found the question of jurisdiction a troublesome one, because of the Spanish claim to islands near Formosa and after negotiations the boundary line between the Japanese and Spanish possessions was fixed at 21 degrees 31 minutes just south of Formosa and to the north of the Bashee islands.

Secretary Hay in the treaty of the purchase of the Islands of Gaygayay and Sibuyan for \$100,000 induced the Spanish government to agree to relinquish them.

Japan desired the U. S. to acquire definite title to the islands north of the 20 degree of latitude rather than permit Spain to claim them for the purpose of selling them to Germany or some other power. Rear Admiral Bradford says the islands are strategically important and it is important that this government should acquire them.

## A FLYING START WANTED BY LIPTON

### In the Great Yacht Race for the American Cup.

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—A letter from Sir Thomas Lipton to the race committee of New York Yacht Club asking that the conditions of the coming match be modified to allow a flying start and also that three weeks time be allowed for preparation after the arrival here, instead of two weeks, as in the terms of the agreement. One member of the committee stated that he was opposed to the flying start as it would give the Shamrock an advantage. Regarding the additional time, it will be granted.

## REBELS OF TWO SOUTHERN REPUBLICS

### Believed to be Co-Operating for Their Joint Overthrow

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—A special from Washington says: It is believed that a close connection exists between the revolutionists in Venezuela and Colombia. The two nations have been hostile for some time and this unfriendliness has lately been approaching an open breach. Gen. Urbabie's last rebellion was crushed by the Colombian authorities. His present attempt to revive it is said to be due to the encouragement of President Castro's government while the rebellion against Castro is said to receive similar support from the Colombian government.
