Condemned by the Special Committee

TILMAN FIGHTS FOR PENSIONS

Will Not Permit a Pension Bill to Pass the Senate in Future

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—The report of the special committee which investigated the hazing subject at West Point was submitted to the House together with a bill making stringent regulations against hazing, fighting and all brutal practices. The report while moderate in tone is nevertheless a stinging arraignment of the many alleged brutal practices enumerated.

In the senate Tillman made some very forceful remarks concerning the house in not taking action upon the bill providing pensions for Mexican war veterans who had resided in South California during the civil war.

The bill had been passed by the senate but the House invalid pension committee was delaying final action upon it. Tillman said there was such sectional animosity in the house committee that members refused to permit action upon the bill for the benefit of those Mexican veterans.

"Is the war over, or is it not?" demanded Tillman with vehemence.

"I swear by the Almighty God that I will not let another pension bill pass the Senate until these old men get justice."

It is expected the President will on Monday next re-nominate all officers connected with the naval victory off Santiago, whose nominations for advance rank failed of action in the Senate months ago. The new nominations will be identical in character with those formerly sent to the Senate.

Sampon is advanced to the rank after Rear Admiral Howell, who is next below Admiral Dewey. Schley is advanced to the rank next below Sampson.

First Act of King Edward's Reign

KITCHENER TO BE SUPERCEDED

And Will Become Commander in Chief of Forces in India

New York, Feb. 9.—A dispatch to the World from London says:

"An important development in the direction of peace in South Africa is believed to be impending.

"General Sir Evelyn Wood is going out in a special capacity, probably as commissioner, which will enable him to treat with the Boer Generals.

His appointment will be virtually superseding of Lord Kitchener, who is expected, will soon be relieved and become commander-in-chief in India.

THE RIELEY HERTZ AFFAIR

Crisis Precipitated By One Mr. Rosenstein

Who Broke Into His Own Store And Demanded His Rights

A lively affair is reported as taking place at the Rieley-Hertz clothing establishment Friday afternoon. For some time the partners have been near the point of dissolution and a crisis was brought about by the arrival of the senior partner Samuel Rosenstein from Portland, where he resides. Soon after reaching the city he was called to the telephone by an attorney who asked him to call at his office. He did so and the attorney questioned him as to his relations with his partners, and asked if there had been any serious trouble between them. Rosenstein said there had not, and was then told to look out for trouble in the immediate future, but would say nothing further in regard to the matter. Rosenstein then returned to the store, but found the front door locked. Supposing it had been necessary for his partners to step out and lock the door, he went to the rear door, which was also locked. On looking through a window he saw Mr. Rieley and his clerk making quite a commotion inside by moving goods around. He called to them to open the door, and they immediately got out of sight. Unable to understand such conduct, he broke the door open, whereupon Mr. Rieley ran out the front door. The clerk either knew nothing about the matter or would not talk about it, so he sent for a policeman and leaving him in charge of the store, he went, accompanied by the clerk, to have a warrant sworn out for Rieley's arrest. Upon arriving at Judge Judah's office that official declined to issue a warrant in a civil action.

Mr. Rosenstein was seen this morning and stated that he has \$5000 invested in the business, while Messrs. Rieley and Hertz have only \$2000. He is dissatisfied with the management and wants to take his share of the goods to Sacramento, where he has a store. He also has an interest in a large business at Baltimore. Mr. Rosenstein declares that he is a reputable gentleman, an honest man and a capitalist, whose reputation and money are at stake. He also says that the real cause of the trouble is the fact that he is a Jew and his partners are Gentiles, and accuses the latter of aerial navigation at too high an altitude to meet his approval.

Attorneys have been consulted all around, and the stock is to be divided forthwith upon invoice. The other partners were seen but declined to make a statement.

AMERICAN TREASURY HAS THE CASH

Civil Law Code Being Completed for The Philippine Islands

New York, Feb. 9.—A dispatch to the Herald from Peking says:

The family of Lu Sen, Minister of foreign affairs who was executed by the Empress Dowager because he would not sanction the anti-foreign movement, have lodged a complaint with the international governments at Peking, charging Bishop Favier with looting their house of money and valuables to the aggregate of a million taels.

The family state that the stolen property is now in the possession of Herbert L. Squires, secretary of the American Legation.

There will be no jury trials, but Commissioner Wright, who is preparing the criminal code, is arranging it so that a judge or justice will summon advisors in criminal trials at his discretion.

Kruger Weaker. New York, Feb. 9.—In a dispatch from The Hague, the London correspondent of the Tribune says:

While Mr. Kruger has gone to Utrecht for treatment by an eminent specialist for his eyes, his general health is not good and he is showing increasing signs of feebleness.

His heart action, as physicians attending here have admitted is weak and gives evidence that he cannot live long. His popularity in Holland cannot be doubted. He is ranked with the famous heroes of Dutch history.

Large blocks of Transvaal Railway stocks are held by investors here but these interests do not account for the pro-Boer feeling.

There has been a marked subsidence of the anti-German prejudice knowing to this anti-English feeling and the Prince Consort, if he identifies himself with Dutch interests, may become in time as popular as Prince Albert was in England.

Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 9.—Peter Woolf was today knocked down by a highwayman as he was leaving the bank and a watch containing \$8000 was wrested from his hand. The money was recovered by the policeman who captured the thief.

CHINESE FAMINE

Many Children Starving and Dying.

CROP FAILURES CAUSE DISTRESS

The Empress' Army is Being Quartered on the People.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 9.—Rev. Athanasius, of the order of Friars, a minister who is here from Sian Fuh, China, confirms the cable accounts of famine in Shen Shi, and Sian Si, spreading over a part of Ho Nan to the South. He says the distress is daily increasing. For two years the crops have failed and when he left Shen Si province, which has a population of sixteen million the people had taken to eating mulberry leaves, elm bark, cotton seed and roots of all kinds. The children were starving and dying, parents were abandoning them and the missionaries were collecting them into parish houses and engaging old women to feed them.

Father Athanasius will travel through the United States and Europe collecting money which will be sent on to Sian Hai and from there telegraphed to the banking houses of Sian Fuh, from which the resident missionaries will draw it to open the granaries for the starving multitudes until the rain comes. Part of the distress was caused by the advance guard of the Dowager Empress, numbering forty thousand men levying on the people for food.

Father Athanasius has just received a telegram announcing the death in Sian Fuh of Bishop Pagnucci and Coadjutor Bishop Colletti. The latter was only consecrated last year and was but 37 years of age. Bishop Pagnucci was sixty eight years old. His episcopate in China was longer than that of any prelate there, having extended for 33 years.

For this we have the dear wish to propagate the idea of peace. We do not wish an egotistical grouping of politicians but we desire a union of all Filipinos who honestly wish for peace and are disposed to work for it.

"Our aspirations appear clear and are practically enunciated in our platform, and we will endeavor to sustain it as Filipinos who have for our happiness and, consequently, for our country, the greatest liberty and for the future the absolute appreciation of the American constitution with all the rights that are enjoyed by each city of the great Republican federation.

"For this, we call ourselves federal, because, under American sovereignty, the most just and unanimous aspiration of the Filipinos will be to form a part of the federation and be constituted a sovereign, free state in the same form as exists in the United States.

"Consequently, with these principles to guide us, it is not required to determine elements nor friends, only to all our brothers, to all Filipinos we open our arms so as to be victorious now that peace will be established.

Manila, Feb. 9.—The recently formed federal party, whose platform was promulgated on December 23 has issued the following announcement:

"It will be two years that this instruction has gone on in the islands and every day that passes convinced the Filipinos that the time for peace has arrived and every one knows the beautiful words of the celebrated statesman: 'No war is good, no peace is bad.' The Filipinos, in a common body, in a decided and firm movement, have proposed by all possible means to have peace, and to work for the early establishment of a civil government that will be conducive to an era of liberty, order and tranquility.

"The Philippine people are more interested than any one in the world in their own happiness, and the people, wishing to get peace, in the most appropriate way, may organize the constitution of our country by industry, agriculture, and commerce by which they may enter into the true area of liberty and prosperity, to which, certainly we shall soon come.

The cutter made entire circuit of Vancouver Island and discovered evidence that leaves no doubt that the Andra is lost.
