DIPLOMATS GREATLY EXCITED

Over Reminiscences of the Spanish War

European Claims to our Friendship.

Current Events at the Capitol.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Diplomatic circles here have not been so stirred up for years as they now are over complications arising from the various declarations in Europe as to the attitude of the different governments toward the United States when this country was about to engage in war with Spain. At this time it is well to state that no official notice will be taken of the matter by the state department. Just now it is England's turn to speak.

The publication in Germany of a note alleged to have been addressed by Ambassador Pauncefote to the diplomatic corps here came as a great surprise. Pauncefote declined to discuss the matter. When the proper time comes it is expected here that the records will be produced and the entire question set at rest.

Mitchell Speaks

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Senator Mitchell, of Oregon, addressed the Senate today on the Philippines tariff bill. He held that under existing conditions it is neither right, expedient, or necessary, to apply to our insular possessions the same rule that we apply to foreign countries touching upon Cuba. Mitchell said that the United States was not in duty bound to enter into any treaties or commercial regulations with Cuba that may in any manner effect adversely any American interest.

Denounces Cable Company.

Congressman Corliss, of Michigan, who is the author of the bill providing for the laying of a cable from San Francisco to Manila, made his initial presentation of the case to the House today. Corliss is bitterly opposed to the laying of the cable by private concerns. He denounced the methods of the Commercial Cable Company, in attempting to get over almost of Congress and to secure from the President a permission which he is not authorized to grant, to lay the cable, and because in the face of his refusal they have prepared to lay and operate the cable without the consent of the Government of the United States.

YOUNG TEDDY IS SAFE

Great Improvement is Noticed

Barring Accidents Recovery is Sure.

The President and Wife much Elated.

GRONOV, Feb. 13.—The final crisis in the illness of young Roosevelt has been met and passed, and barring the unexpected, he will live. The disease has been checked in the right lung and the left was almost completely cleared during the night. The boy slept well all night and Secretary Cortelyou announced at eight-thirty this morning that the patient was doing nicely. The President and his wife are in high spirits this morning, as they feel the critical point of their son's illness is passed. The doctors were able to say this morning that the patient is on the most certain road to recovery. The President took a short walk around the school grounds this morning.

All Danger Past

This afternoon it was announced that the President would leave for Washington at 4:40 today. Later the President visited the correspondent's headquarters and confirmed this. Alice Roosevelt will arrive here tomorrow. During his talk with the correspondents the President thanked them for the bouquet of flowers they had sent Mrs. Roosevelt and also for the consideration they have shown during the crisis. He afterwards shook hands with each of them. He announced the rapid convalescence of his son and stated that Mrs. Roosevelt and Miss Alice would take young Teddy to the White House as soon as possible.

NORA FULLER BURIED

No Clue Found as to Her Slayer.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 13.—The funeral of Nora Fuller, whose nude body was found in a house at 2311 Sutter Street and whose fate has thrown the whole city into great excitement was held this afternoon, from the California St. Methodist Church. Rev. A. C. Bane, pastor, officiating. There are no developments whatever toward the solution of the mystery although every nerve is being strained by the police to discover the man Bennett, who is suspected of being her murderer.

ST LOUIS BRIBER DYING


Scandal to be Aired on Monday.

BRITAIN WANTS FRIENDS

Germany and America Were Invited.

To Join the Anglo-Japanese Alliance.

BERLIN, Feb. 13.—It is semi-officially announced that Germany and the United States were informed of the Anglo-Japanese alliance and were invited to join in the future. It is said that the East-Asian alliance between Germany, Russia and France has ceased and is not to be resuscitated.

FIERCE KENTUCKY BATTLE

Between Officers and Mountaineers.

MIDDLETOWN, Ky., Feb. 12.—Six men are dead and as many more are dying as the result of a battle between officers from Middletown and mountaineers. The battle, which was one of the most desperate in the history of mountain warfare, occurred between 4 and 6 o'clock this evening at Lee Turner's Quarter House saloon, 3 1/4 miles from Middletown.

Last month some mules and other goods of Turner's were levied on in payment of a debt, and a few nights ago, it is alleged, he, with others went to Virginia, where the property had been taken, secured what was formerly his and returned to the Quarter House. Today Deputy Sheriff Wat Thompson summoned a posse of ten or fifteen men for the purpose of arresting Turner at his saloon, The Louisville and Nashville railroad refused to convey the officers to the saloon and they walked through the mountains. Turner had heard that an attempt would be made to arrest him, and he and his fifteen men gave the officers a warm reception. The saloon was well situated for an attack like this. It was built of logs and was surrounded by a 30-foot fence, in which loopholes had been cut so that inmates could shoot at outsiders.

Turner's surrender was demanded. His reply was a round of shots. Charley Cecil, of Middletown, was riding a pony in plain view of the Turner men. Some one raised a window of the log house and shot Cecil, who fell dead. Instantly the man at the window fell back, pierced by half a dozen bullets. Then the firing began in earnest. The officers scattered, and hiding behind trees, poured a galling fire into the mountain fortress. In the fight, John Doyle, a railroad man, was shot in the hand. The town men gathered closer around Turner's place, undaunted by the shots which whizzed around them.

As soon as Cecil was killed his companions determined to burn Turner's rendezvous, and in the midst of the battle a man applied a torch to an exposed side of the building. Soon the building was in flames. Several of the mountaineers came to the window and were immediately shot down. The members of the posse surrounding the barricade, were determined to let none escape. Lee Turner and several of his friends, however, in some manner escaped, and he is now at Mingo mines, eight miles from Middletown. Several of his men perished in the flames.

Feb. 13.—All is quiet today at the scene of Wednesday's battle near the quarter house. John Doble, one of the officers wounded died today, making six known deaths. A mountaineer brings a report of three bodies being found this morning, a mile from the quarter house. In addition to this, bones have been found in the ruins of "General" Turner's saloon and it is believed that several perished in the flames that destroyed the structure.

DANIELS WON'T TALK

Roosevelt's Rough Rider Sanguine.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Feb. 13.—Ben Daniels, the recently appointed United States marshal for Arizona arrived here this morning. He refuses to discuss his alleged Wyoming prison record but says he has written Roosevelt explaining everything and is sanguine of the outcome.

NATIONAL MILLING TRUST

Has been Formed in Chicago.

Seven Hundred Millions Involved.

CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—The organization of all the millers of the United States under one general head was effected here today. Twenty thousand milling concerns are included in the organization, representing a capital of seven hundred million dollars.

The central headquarters will be located at Chicago or Minneapolis and there will probably be branches in New York, St. Louis, and Cincinnati.

The purpose of the organization are said to be the securing of concessions and legislation of benefit to millers. It is denied an advance of prices is contemplated, although such a step is not unlikely.
