## WILL FIGHT FOR SALARY REFORM

PORTLAND, April 23.—George E. Chamberlain, Democratic and Citizens' nominee for governor, in his first public address, said he will take the lead this week in Baker county. He will make the fight entirely on state issues, and make a special fight for reform in taxation, and abolition of all grafts, and to place every state official on a salary basis, as is provided in the Republican and Democratic platforms. He will make a positive fight for a better state government, and especially to cut the seven mill tax levy straight in two in the middle. He will spend no time in Multnomah county, but will personally canvass every county in the state, and make from two to ten speeches a day. Mr. Chamberlain will know there is a campaign on before he has got very far along in the fight.

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## FUNSTON CALLED DOWN

### By President Roosevelt in a Letter

WASHINGTON, April 23.—General Funston has been officially reprimanded by the president for saying in a recent speech that Senator Hoar was "afflicted with an overheated conscience." The Kansas was also ordered to cease from any further public discussion of the Philippine question. The following letter of reprimand was made public by the war department this morning: "I am directed by the president of the United States to instruct you that he wishes you to cease from further discussing of the situation in the Philippines, and also to express his regret that you should make a senator of the United States the object of public criticism. Signed: Wm. Craig Sanger, acting secretary of war."

## BOOMLETS FOR BAKER CITY

## NEEDS AN ELEVATOR

Architect D. E. Neer, of Portland, was in Salem Tuesday to inspect the new lawatories just constructed in the state capitol. With the exception of supplying a few minor fixtures the work is completed. Mr. Neer says that from a sanitary standpoint the lavatories at the capitol will be the best in the state of Oregon, and the equal of any on the coast. The total cost of the lavatories on the three floors of the building will be about \$5000. The state house now lacks only an electric elevator to complete an equipment of modern conveniences. The elevator is now propelled by water power, and runs so slowly that the oldest inhabitant can walk up the stairs faster than he can ride.

## TRAIN WRECK NEAR CHENEY.

Several Fatalities and Many Others Injured.

SPOKANE, Wash., April 23.—A passenger train on the Central Washington branch of the Northern Pacific was wrecked near Cheney, 16 miles west of here this morning, due to a defective guard rail. The baggage express and two passenger coaches left the track. The last two turned over and were badly smashed. Neil Bowie, a 6-year-old son of John Bowie, of Heardon, Wash., was killed, and his mother, or perhaps fatally injured. C. J. Kellogg was hurt internally, and may die. The express messenger and three passengers were badly hurt, and twenty others more or less injured.

## CHICAGO STREET CARS

### May be Tied Up in a Strike

CHICAGO, April 23.—A tie-up of all the lines of the Chicago City Railway Company is threatened as a result of the firm demanding recognition of their union. The teamsters and power house engineers informed the company this morning that they would strike if the firm's demands were not granted. The company has about three days' supply of coal on hand. The teamsters' union hauls practically all the coal used in the city.
