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OREGON PUSH IN POLITICS

Officeholders Disobeying the President

The federal brigade in Oregon must have received a dispensation from Washington allowing them to ignore the President's order prohibiting officers of the government from taking part in political campaigns.

Now it is different. The Oregonian can see no wrong now in what, in its eyes two years ago, was a political crime. For a surety the president's order "don't go," so far as the following federal officers are concerned:

- Zoeth Houder, U. S. marshal. Isaac Patterson, collector of customs. John Hall, U. S. attorney. A. A. Roberts, deputy U. S. marshal. James Wilson, deputy U. S. marshal. Charles Burkhardt, assistant postmaster. John Minto, deputy internal revenue collector.

These federal officials are making themselves offensive partisans. They are putting in the time belonging to the government working politics. President Roosevelt's order is that no federal official shall participate in political campaigns.

One United States marshal in Indiana, who thought himself bigger than the president, was dismissed from the service for disobeying this order. If the president means what he says, he has the opportunity of firing a whole bunch of officials here in Oregon on the same grounds.

Following is a copy of a letter written by W. W. Myers and sent to the Oregonian, to publish, with a stamp to return if not used. Two weeks passed by and Mr. Meyer heard nothing of the letter, and now asks The Journal to publish it. The letter follows:

From an illustrative point of view the May Everybody's is particularly good. Besides the superb series of great mountain pictures, which are quite the best ever published, and the rare waterfalls, there are drawings by Penrhyn Staulaws, Frederic Remington, L. W. Zeigler, Orson Lowell and F. Richardson.

In the International Monthly Capt. Alfred T. Mahan, of the United States navy, discusses the "Motives to Imperial Federation,"—a strong article which will prove of very real interest to all Americans, as well as to the English, whom it more directly concerns.
