DISASTER MUCH WORSE

Than Reported From Island of St Vincent

The Dead Will Reach Sixteen Hundred

Details Are Found Too Harrowing to Describe

London, May 14.—Secretary Chamberlain last night received the following telegram from the governor of the Windward Islands, regarding the conditions on the island of St. Vincent. "The dispatch was dated St. Vincent, and says: 'Arrived yesterday, and found the state of affairs much worse than given in the reports forwarded by the administration. The country on the east coast of Robin Rock and Georgetown was apparently struck and devastated in a manner similar to that of St. Pierre. The fear is that practically all living things were killed.

Americans in Paris Subscribe. Paris, May 14.—Many American firms and individual Americans are subscribing to the Martinique fund, which amounts to 100,000 francs.

In the Hands of a Mob. Washington, May 14.—The secretary of state has received a dispatch from the American minister in Haiti, as follows: "The Chambers have been closed by a mob. Much firing ensued, and one deputy was mortally wounded, and the populace attacked the palace and arsenal last night. Several were killed and wounded.

United Mine Workers To Decide Important Movement to Coal Industry.

Hazleton, Pa., May 14.—The convention of the United Mineworkers, to consider the proposition to make the present strike in the anthracite district permanent, began work today. President Mitchell, in addressing the delegates, said: "You are going to decide a most important movement in the coal industry, and, perhaps, the most important labor movement of the world."

Portland Wins League Game. Portland, May 14.—The opening league game between Portland and Helena was won by Portland; score 8 to 2. The visitors played badly.

Mills Soon to Operate. Oregon City, May 14.—While the woolen mill strike is practically ended, the final conference between the committee of the employees and President Jacobs was not held today. There is no hitch in the negotiations, however, and the mills will be in operation in a few days.

SEVEN VESSELS LOST

During the Horror At St Pierre

Three of the Number Are American

Information Given by Secretary of Martinique

Paris, May 14.—The secretary of France telegraphed from Fort de France today and ascertained positively the names of the ships lost in the St. Pierre disaster. Seven is the number, one French, two Italian, one English and three American. The French vessel Tamara, Italian vessels Nord America and Saracino and Teresa Loria, the English cable ship Grappler and the American vessels Roraima, Arama and Ananore.

Vesuvius Is Heard From. Paris, May 14.—A Naples dispatch says: Vesuvius shows signs of activity. Lava is flowing from the crater on the Pompeii side, while hot cinders are thrown up at intervals.

The Sea Is Receding. Chicago, May 14.—A dispatch from San Juan, Porto Rico, says: Advice from the south side of the island are to the effect that heavy clouds of smoke obscure the horizon, and the sea suddenly receded more than 100 feet this morning. The atmosphere became exceedingly oppressive.

American Ships Report. Washington, May 14.—The navy department today received three dispatches regarding the situation at Martinique, one from Lieut. McCord, the cruiser Cincinnati, dated Fort de France, says: The villages surrounding St. Pierre are uninhabitable. The island is covered with ashes to within five miles of Fort de France. A second dispatch from Commander McLean, of the cruiser Cincinnati, dated Fort de France, this morning, says: "Arrived at St. Pierre this morning; assisting government of Martinique. News of disaster at St. Vincent; have sent Panama; will follow if necessary." The

third dispatch, from the Brooklyn navy yard, reads: "Cruiser Buffalo ready to sail for Martinique on two hours' notice." Consul Ayme, at Martinique, in answer to inquiry of Secretary Hay of yesterday, as to whether fresh water was needed in Martinique, said no.

Porto Rico Volcano Active. Ponce, May 14.—Mount Lone continues to rumble and smoke, but fears of an eruption have passed. A band of watchers has been organized, and constant watch is being kept in order to give the alarm in case of symptoms of an eruption.

Boer Leaders Are Banned. Pretoria, May 14.—Thirty more Boer leaders have been permanently banished from South Africa.

Bill for New Soldiers' Home. Washington, May 14.—Senator Turner, of Washington, today introduced in the Senate a bill for the establishment of a branch of the soldiers' home at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, on the old Fort Sherman reservation.

St. Lucia, May 14.—A conflagration was seen last night in the direction of Fort du France.

INCREASED WHEAT EXPORTS

From This Coast to South African Ports.

Portland, May 14.—Oregon and Washington wheat exporters are jubilant over the failure of the Australian crop, for it means a big increase of wheat exports from these states to the African ports. The fleet cleared so far this season carried 1,500,000 bushels. The British ship Decatur is the seventeenth ship from the Northwest for South Africa. It is chartered by the Portland Flouring Mills Company, to load at Tacoma.

CHEAP SUGAR FLOOD

Threatened If Tariff Reduced to Cuba.

Washington, May 14.—Hinsdale testified before the senate committee on relations with Cuba today, and said if the Cuban reciprocity bill, as passed by the senate, became a law, he believed refining and the beet sugar industry would have to be abandoned, because the Germans would flood the United States with cheap sugar.

To Crater Lake in a Balloon. Grants Pass, May 14.—A balloonist here is arranging for an aerial flight, with the intention of descending on Crater Lake, 85 miles east of here.

Awards Made by the Charleston Fair

Our State Receives First Consideration

And Receives Gold Medal for Grains and Grasses.

Charleston, S. C., May 14.—The jury on awards outdid itself in awarding honors to Oregon. Altogether the prizes consisted of 14 gold medals, five silver medals, 17 bronze medals and 82 honorable mentions. Among those receiving gold medals are: the state of Oregon for grains, grasses and forage plants, hops, wool, mohair and vegetables; Oregon Agricultural College, grains and grasses; American Linseed Company, Portland, oil and meal; J. B. Brown, Corvallis, fax; W. B. Glafse, Portland, creamery butter; J. H. Kaiser, potatoes; Lamberson Sons & Co., seeds; Oregon Woman's Flax Fibre Association, fax and its products; Pacific Pine Needle Co., Grants Pass, pine needle fibre and products; A. J. Bawtle, Corvallis, teasels; Southern Pacific Company, Portland, grains and grasses.

Jury Disagree in Diamond Robbery. Portland, May 14.—The jury disagreed in the case against Charles Savage and wife for robbing the Portland Hotel of \$10,000 worth of diamonds. A new trial was ordered.
