Hon. H. W. Corbett's Appeal for a Special Session.

Portland, Oct. 29, 1902.

Ed. Journal: You are well aware that I am as anxious to see the needed legislation passed at the call session, and eliminate the matters from the regular session that should be acted upon, on their merits.

I CANNOT BUT SEE THAT THE REGULAR SESSION WILL BE DRAWN INTO A MUDDLE THAT MIGHT MAKE IT DISCREDITABLE, AND POSSIBLY THE BLAME MIGHT BE LAID ON THOSE WHO TAKE AN ACTIVE PART.

The Lewis and Clark directors thought it unwise for them to press this matter and incur the enmity of the press and the people, and possibly fail at the same time to secure the appropriation. We regard it as an eminently proper thing that the recognition of the one hundredth anniversary of Lewis and Clark's expedition to this country should be appropriately celebrated,

and no one has been asked to give his support to the matter believing that it was one of state pride, in which all citizens would be equally interested.

I understand our Taxpayers' League, of which I am a member, still asks the Governor for an extra session, AND I HOPE IT MAY BE CALLED, AND THESE QUESTIONS DISPOSED OF, AND WE WILL TAKE THE CHANCES OF AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE LEWIS AND CLARK CENTENNIAL.

If it fails, let the responsibility fall upon the legislators, where it would belong. It would simply demonstrate that there is little patriotism, and much less public spirit, in the state of Oregon than I or the public had supposed.
