LOCAL CHINESE WILL KEEP THEIR QUEUES

The recent order issued by the Chinese Reform Association that all members shall divest themselves of their queues will not be heeded in Salem, according to the statements of members of the association.

Hop Lee, the laundryman, says that there are only four or five members in this city, out of about 200 Chinese residents, and the order will not cut much figure.

When interviewed by a Journal reporter this morning Hong, the bland and smiling purveyor of noodles to unsophisticated "foreign devils" who wander into Chinatown, said that he had heard that a paper had "talked" something about the Chinese cutting off their queues, but that he had not heard anything definite. When asked if he would cut off his, he said that he would if the other Chinamen did, but if they didn't he wouldn't dare to, and when asked why not, he said: "Me cut off queue other Chinamen no cut off queue, other Chinamen get heap mad, talk sassy, like Melican girl." In speaking of going back to China after cutting off the queue, Hong volunteered the information that the natives would talk "heap sassy" and "make bad talk" to the queueless one. Hong says that he has lived in the United States 27 years, and that he does not expect to go back to China. He says "Chinamen like Melica; he like, catch lots of money."

And he also says that the climate in China is too hot for him. In his own characteristic way, "hottee like hellee, alle time no get cold at all. Here I wear un one coat-one vest, two shirts, then sometime mebbe I get cold. China too d-d hottee." When the reporter started to leave he was met and nearly scared to death by a large and ferocious looking bull dog, but which, on command of his master, slunk under the stove. This incident seemed to amuse the loquacious Hong greatly, and, thinking to make the reporter forget his woes, he made a joke at his own expense. He said: "Hong no need worry about queue, bymby he no have one, anyway," and raising his cap he showed a head that will in all probability be minus the hair sometime in the near future. He said: "Hong he getting heap old. Him 47 now, bymby him be 50; heap old man." And consolation was in vain, for he could not be persuaded that 50 was not an age terrible to ponder upon.

Crop Was Short.

T. A. Livesley and John J. Roberts, doing business under the firm name of Livesley & Co., have filed a suit against Martha A. Marston for the sum of \$531.46. The complaint states that the defendant sold plaintiff 10,000 pounds of hops at 20 cents, and that prior to the sale she sold Herman Klaber & Co. 10,000 pounds, to be raised on her yard at Woodburn, and that prior to either sale she gave a chattel mortgage to the London & San Francisco bank for \$2500, and that the yard did not raise but 17,133 pounds, and that Livesley & Klaber, with the consent of the defendant, paid the mortgage, and Klaber received 10,000 pounds for \$1426.60, and Livesley & Co. received 17,133 pounds for \$1158 paid, but as they paid \$800 at the time of the sale, they claim that they have overpaid \$531.46, and she promised to repay the amount, but as she has not done so a suit and attachment has been filed.
