## Growing Western Oregon

and with abundance of the best quality of coal for manufacturing, the Coos country is destined to be a great factory region. Wooden wares of all kinds for office fixtures, house furnishings and fruit packages will be here produced from the raw material under the most favorable conditions. These lines open constantly enlarging fields of demand. The brick and tile industry is sure to be pushed here on a large scale. It is now confined to various points on the Coquille river.

### Fisheries are Enormous.

The moment one reaches tide water on the Umpqua, and in fact as soon as one strikes the river at Elkton, you realize that you are in a fishing country. The canneries on the lower river are run by Walter Reed. Over on Coos Bay and the Coquille the canneries are gold mines. King of them all is the old King Fisher of the Rogue river, who has two skimmings from the richest pan of milk set by Dame Nature each year of all the streams that flow into the richest stocked salt water coast in the world. The runs of salmon are heavier in these south-western streams than anywhere on the face of the earth. A well conducted cannery clears from \$25,000 to \$50,000 in a season. Horne has knocked out as high as \$100,000 a year clear profit in one of his double runs in a single year. The salmon supply seems to be increasing each year.

### The Rose City.

For years Roseburg has been called the Rose City of Oregon, although Portland has recently stolen the floral cognomen, as she will appropriate everything else beautiful and desirable in Oregon that she can lay hands to. I met a Major Rose at Myrtle Point who is a son of the founder of the metropolis of Douglas county and he is still a non-compromising bed rock Democrat.

Besides holding an annual rose show in the spring Roseburg holds a chrysanthemum show in the fall and the exhibition the past week surpassed anything in this line ever seen in Oregon. Blooms as fine as the choicest hothouse product are grown in the open gardens by the ladies of Roseburg. Frosts hold off in the fall to permit maturing the largest and choicest varieties. Sin-

gle blooms eight and ten inches across are not uncommon, and the people are very generous with them. Visitors leave the city with armfuls on stems two to three feet long. Mrs. Wallace Elder at the Soldiers' Home has a collection that would surprise even a florist. The colors are perfect and the blooms are enormous. It is one of the greatest pleasures of the old veterans to attend these flowers.

### The Soldiers' Home.

Besides showing substantial growth in fine residences, manufactures and business houses, Roseburg is the seat of an important state institution, the Oregon Soldiers' Home. From 20 to 30 inmates when he took it the number of old soldiers of the Union, Mexican and Indian armies care for here has

risen to 150. In spite of the ravages of old age, wounds and disease, they are happy and contented. The little city of white monuments at one end of the forty acres is rapidly overtaking the living enrollment. A remarkable fact is shown by the commandant's report. The average lease of life of the Mexican war veterans surpasses that of the Union soldiers and that of the Indian war veterans surpasses that of the men who fought under General Taylor. W. W. Elder deserve credit for a high-class management of an institution that is not easily managed. They have doubled the capacity of the institution without extra expense and with no deficits. Improvements the past year have been limited on account of appropriations for that purpose being held by the referendum. Miss May Tillson of Salem presides over the hospital and this, like the barracks and the administration building are kept in excellent order. All of the land has been put under cultivation that can be spared—about 25 acres and all the fruit, vegetables and much of the cow and horse food is produced. All the soldiers but those in the hospital work during the year but their service is voluntary. A few men are under pay. Mr. and Mrs. Elder exercise a firm and yet kindly control over their charges, many of whom are in their second childhood. About thirty are decrepid, but a large number are active and will live to a good old age. There is not one case of drunkenness where there were ten formerly. The cottages for the wives of inmates are soon to be occupied, one old soldier living with his wife in one of them and caring for the rest of the buildings. Mr. and Mrs. Elder have given such good satisfaction that if left to a vote of the old vets, or to the people of Roseburg, both strongly Republicans, they never would be removed by any administration. Their management has been the crowning achievement of Governor Chamberlain's term as Chief Executive, and is not easily improved upon from a business standpoint. Walter Lincoln Toome, after our visit and thorough inspection, that gentleman frankly stated that he did not see how any Republican could find fault with the Soldiers' Home under W. W. Elder. The fact is they do not—they can not. Who is most to blame, Mr. or Mrs. Elder, is hard to decide. I am free to confess if I were an old soldier or a young one I would give part of the credit to their charming daughter Grace. This reminds me of a story. A young man asked his father whether men or women were most often boss in the affairs of families. His father advised him to take a team of horses and lead the wagon with chickens and drive across the country. Who he stopped at a house he should ask the man who ruled the roost, and if he said his wife did to give him a chicken. If he said he was boss give him a horse. When the young fellow had travelled nearly across the state and had given away nearly all the poultry and still had his team, he at last met a man who claimed to be boss. So he told him to take his choice of the two horses. The farmer selected a bay mare and the young man started to unhitch the animal. The farmer's wife came out and took in the situation. She called her husband to one side and after a short consultation he said: "If you've no objection I'll take the other horse." "No you don't," said the young fellow, "you'll take a chicken."

I think if he had struck the Soldiers' Home he would have found Commandant Elder and Mrs. Elder so equally dividing the reins of authority he would have given them the team and would have stayed and had a chicken dinner.
