### PUSHING REVENUE BILLS

Another Large List of Petitions Received Today for Tax Bills

Another large list of petitions received today for the revenue bill framed by the Farmers' and Shippers' congress. In spite of the organized fight by Portland interests put up against this bill, and the fact that not a dollar was used to get signatures, the showing is remarkable. Thousands of citizens have voluntarily signed these petitions, and they come from every county. About one-third of the names are cut out by the county clerks, who refuse to certify names unless registered two years ago.

The false statement was published from Salem that this bill would have cost the state \$6000 to print. If that had been a fact, how quickly interested parties could have raised the money to get the signatures. But the committee in charge of the same would not permit a dollar to be raised or contributed from any source. They wanted this one bill to go before the people on merit alone, as money was being used to get signatures to all the other bills. 
