California Judge Orders Oregon Land Sharks Sent Here for Trial

Los Angeles, Cal., July 13.—Federal Judge Wellborn this morning issued a final order for the removal of David Goodwin, A. H. Hedderly, Will Gould, Richard Hynes, Lee Meyers, George Stearns, Warren Gillelen and R. M. Kenney to the Oregon courts for trial on the charge of land frauds. The defendants immediately applied for a writ of habeas corpus before Judge Ross, and announced that they would fight going to Oregon through all the courts.

AFTER WASH HOUSES

Handlers of Spoiled Garments Indicted for Combination in Restraint of Trade

Cincinnati, O., July 13.—Thirty-nine laundry companies and their proprietors were indicted this afternoon on the charge of making a combination in restraint of trade. Eighteen of them were indicted as an organization formed in restraint of trade, the 18 being members of the laundry exchange. Defendants were arraigned and gave bonds for their appearance.

Planning Trades Schools for Painters.

Asbury Park, N. J., July 13.—The annual convention of the New Jersey State Association of Master Painters and Decorators opened here today at the Beach Auditorium with an unusually large attendance, representing every part of the state. Questions of much importance to the association and the trade in general will be discussed, and there will be addresses which promise to be highly interesting. One of the important matters to be brought up for consideration is the proposed law providing for the establishment of trade schools in the large cities of the state. The Master Painters and Decorators intend to work for this bill at the next legislature, provided the convention approves of the plan.

For a long time there has been a dearth of skilled labor in the painting trade in this country, most of the journeymen having been supplied from the ranks of the foreign population. It is felt that the trade schools would tend to foster the growth of native talent, and therefore give the American youth a chance to compete in a field which yields good returns.

Another question of importance to be considered is that of insurance rates. Some of the members deem it practicable and desirable to form a co-operative organization, for the purpose of enabling the master painters and decorators to carry on their own insurance. The retail grocers have had such an organization for several years and it proved a great success.

Carnegie and the Bethlehem Works Given a Slice to Keep Them in Good Appetite

Washington, July 13.—Bonaparte this afternoon stated that it had been represented to him that if the Carnegie and Bethlehem companies did not receive part of the contract they would be forced to close. Their claim appeared to the secretary to be substantiated, and he said he thought the best results would be attained, and it would secure the most expeditious delivery of material if he divided the contract amongst the three bidders.

The Minnesota Regatta.

St. Paul, Minn., July 13.—The annual regatta under the auspices of the Minnesota Boat Club of this city will take place on Lake Minnetonka this afternoon. Five clubs have entered crews for the principal events of the regatta, including Winstipeg, St. Paul, Duluth, Fort Williams and Port Arthur. The starting point will be about 200 yards off the Lafayette boat house and the boats will finish in front of the Tonka Bay Hotel. The regatta includes races for senior and junior eight and four-oared crews, making four races in all, in addition to the single and double sculling events. Some crack Western oarsmen will take part in the latter events.
