day evening, and got our supplies for Sunday, then we drove to Mr. Vanderpool's, who is the city's mayor, and here went into camp, and put our horses in his stable.

Prineville could be properly called "The Walled City," for on the south-east, and west of the town are the great walls of rim rock, which extend perfectly straight up as though they had been built.

Leaving Prineville we went down the Crooked river to Lone Pine which is 13 miles from Prineville, and camped for dinner. Here we left the valley and got back again on the sage, and juniper flats, where not an inhabitant can be found.

After noon we drove to Bridge station on the Deschutes river, watered our horses, and drove on to within four miles of Sisters, where we camped for the night, getting in late on account of tired horses, and rough roads.

Next morning we drove on to Fish lake, getting there at noon. They had been having a heavy rain here since Saturday, so the roads were very muddy.

At Fish lake we met Dr. Ransom of Turner. His wife and Miss May Rutherford were at Soda Springs. Frank Libby, his son, and brother Wist, of Jefferson, Ovid Pick, E. J. Farnham, Ford, and John Gentry, of Marion, had all camped there, and had been catching lots of fish, and had had their share of deer, and Dr. Ransom was in the bunch.

Leaving Fish lake we met Dr. Mark Skiff going in. We drove to Snow creek and camped for dinner. After noon we drove three, and one-half miles above Lower Soda Springs, and camped with S. W. Paterson getting in late, but got a very substantial supper which we thoroughly enjoyed.

The next day we drove to old man Shay's place, one mile above Foster and camped for dinner, then we went on to Foster, and Sweet Home, where we crossed over the Santiam bridge, and took the short cut for Selo. Came in four miles east, then went up the Jordan valley to Jordan postoffice, and then across the hills to Lyons, then up in Fox valley to show the fine farm of Sam Mills to one of our party who has been looking for a place all along our trip, and came back home to buy.

From Fox valley we went to Stayton for dinner, then on to Aumsville and from there over the hills for home, arriving in the city August 31st having covered in our travel 1200 miles by team, and having seen a good portion of southwestern Oregon, northwestern California, and all that portion of eastern Oregon described in this letter, and also the Willamette valley, taking in Marion, Polk, Linn, part of Benton, and Lane, Clackamas, and Yamhill counties, the garden of Oregon, or the Eden of Paradise.
