FOUR ARE KILLED

May be work of enemies of graft fighters—Police investigate—Building front blown across street.

San Francisco, June 29.—There is little doubt that the explosion at Chenery & Dimond, which killed four people and probably fatally injured another early today was the work of dynamiters who twice blew up property belonging to James L. Gallagher, the former supervisor who turned state's evidence in the graft prosecution.

T. J. Gallagher has been acting as a body guard for his brother since the repeated threats have been made against his life. In the Ruef-Schmitz administration T. J. Gallagher was the head of the commissary department, a lucrative position and the feeling has been bitter against him for his stand with his brother in the prosecutions. It is understood that T. J. Gallagher also has received threats recently.

John Sweeney, the grocer, who conducted a grocery store adjoining the saloon conducted by Johnson, and was killed with his wife and daughter, appears to have been the victim of a plot of which he was not the object.

Dissemeyer, who lived in the same building, whose baby daughter was killed and wife fatally hurt, also has no connection with the Gallagher's further than that he leased the property to T. J. Gallagher.

Fred Sweeney, who was blown 50 feet through a window at the rear of the grocery, is expected to recover, though he is badly hurt.

San Francisco, June 29.—Four were killed and many injured by a dynamite explosion which destroyed a grocery store, with flats on the upper floors, and an adjoining saloon, building at Chenery and Dimond streets, in the Golden Gate park section of the city, at 2:15 this morning.

The dead: John Sweeney, grocer; Mrs. John Sweeney, his wife; Elba Sweeney, 9-year-old daughter; baby daughter of B. S. Dissemeyer, one year old. Among the badly injured are Mr. and Mrs. B. S. Dissemeyer. All live over the grocery store. The explosion was of such terrific force that it shattered the window glass in the whole vicinity.

The police believe that the explosion was the work of criminals and are investigating to learn whether the property belongs to Former Supervisor James Gallagher, who has been the object of several similar attacks, since he turned state's evidence in the graft prosecution.

The 25-year-old son of Sweeney was blown through a window and 50 feet into the air at the rear. He was severely injured. The fronts of the grocery building and the saloon both were blown clear across the street.

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When the incident was reported to boy king, he made known his resolution to pursue a conciliatory policy but the olders heads in the government were opposed to the calling of the royal troops, fearing that a general reign of terror was imminent.

### TERRIBLE FIGHT WITH AN INSANE WOMAN

San Francisco, June 29.—Matron Ellen Sweet of the detention ward of the Central Emergency hospital, is hovering between life and death today as the result of a fierce fight with Maud Torchio, an insane woman yesterday. The lunatic is a raving maniac today and it is thought that she may die.

The matron went into the crazy woman's cell in answer to a summons and locked the door behind her with no thought of danger. The crazy woman sprang upon the matron from the bed and pinned her to the floor with the first two blows. The crazy woman's fingers found their way to the throat of the matron and she was unable to call out. For a half hour the maniac tried to kill Miss Sweet and there was a terrific battle for life.

Dr. Reuben C. Hill and Stewards Emerson and Thomas broke into the cell just as the plucky matron sank to the floor unconscious and after a hard fight, succeeded in putting the Torchio woman in a straight jacket.

Miss Sweet was removed to her home and is in a critical condition.

### FRENCH PREMIER WINS GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP

Paris, June 29.—The Clemenceau cabinet is firmly seated until parliament re-assembles next October as a result of the premier's victory in his fight for government ownership of the railroads. The termination of this battle marks a new era for France.

After the purchase by the government of the Western Railroad, it is predicted that the Orleans lines will be bought. Clemenceau's object being to force all roads into the hands of the government.

Prince Phillip is accused by Editor Maximilian Harden of participating in the sensational escapades alleged to have been conducted by Kaiser Wilhelm's "Knights of the Round Table."

The sensation created by the trial of the prince is even greater than that which attended the arrest and trial of Count von Moltke, who, although one of the most prominent members of German nobility, is out-ranked by the prisoner at the dock today.

With the first gleam of dawn the morbidly curious began to assemble at the door of the criminal court building. By the time the case was called for trial thousands of persons had formed a mob of immense proportions in the yard. As Prince Phillip drove to the court room in a closed carriage a mighty cheer arose from the ranks of his admirers, in the midst of which a menacing hiss could be heard. Prince Phillip is not a favorite with the masses and but a word would have been needed to start a serious demonstration. Count Carolath has been commissioned by the kaiser to report the trial for him and news of the day's proceedings is eagerly awaited at the palace where the accused prince has been a favorite.

Upon the arrival of Prince Phillip a conference was held between the court and counsel and it was decided that the trial should be held behind closed doors. Immediately the court room was cleared of all spectators.

Prince Phillip, who, owing to his recent illness, was allowed to recline in a chair in the center of the court room, arose upon hearing the announcement that no women would be allowed to attend the trial and escorted his beautiful wife and two sons to their carriage. There were tears in the eyes of the princess when she parted from her husband.

A mass of testimony will be introduced by the prosecution. Eulenberg's defense will cover a period of several days and it is expected that the trial will last at least two weeks.

### WOMEN'S CLUB FIGHT OVER CONVENTION CITY

Boston, June 29.—The real big fight of the convention of the Federation of Women's clubs which is in session here, is expected tomorrow when the delegates will ballot for the next meeting place. San Francisco seems to have the best chance of getting the convention of 1909.

### MEXICAN REBELLION GROWING

El Paso, Tex., June 29.—Fifty soldiers and three officers left this morning on hurry orders to Camp Grande, 150 miles from here, and the scene of the first arrest of the present revolutionary outbreak.

At the preliminary hearing of the five refugees from Juarez, arrested in this city last week on complaint of the Mexican consul here, a continuance was ordered because no legal representative of the American government was at hand to prosecute the cases. All probably will be heard the last of this week.

The request of the Mexican consul here for additional United States marshals will be granted. Additional arrests will probably result.

A dispatch from Austin, Texas, states that many soldiers will shortly join in the revolution leaving the government helpless. Two hundred additional troops arrived in Juarez, just across the river from here, today Chihuahua.

### WHEN WIFE REFUSES TO RE-MARRY, SHOTS THREE
