SUMMARY OF FAIR RACING

Saturday afternoon, the closing day of the state fair races, the attendance was not so large as Friday, although the grandstand was filled to its capacity, and the east side of the track was lined with a fairly large crowd of fans.

Trotting, 2:19 class, \$800—(Unfinished from Friday)—3 in 5—Henry Gray, first; Monierat, second; Zombronut, third; Patsy Rice, fourth. Time 2:14 1/2.

2:09 trot, \$1000, 3 in 5—John Caldwell, first; Athasham, second; R. Ambush, distanced in second heat. Time, 2:11.

2:14 trot, consolation, \$1000—(Non-winners in \$5000 Lewis and Clark Stake)—Della Derby, first; Vallejo Girl, second; Lady W., third; Easter Bells, fourth. Time, 2:11 1/2.

Running, mile handicap, \$100—Yank, first; Melar, second; The Counselor, third. Time, 1:42 1/2.

Running, half mile \$100—Cazaav, first; St. Salvana, second; May Pink, third. Time, :49 3/4.

The unfinished 2:19 trot from Friday, in which Henry Gray, Monierat, Zombronut and Patsy Rice were the main participants, was won by Henry Gray. The gray horse carried away this purse just by a neck, as Zombronut, notwithstanding a costly break at the first quarter, which lost his second place to fourth position at that post, worked like clock work, and in the stretch he crawled up to Henry Gray's heels and within a short distance of the wire, spurted up to his forequarters, where he finished. Henry Gray, first; Monierat, second; Zombronut, third and Patsy Rice, fourth. The time in this last heat was 2:14 1/2.

In the 2:09 trot, best three in five, John Caldwell was an easy winner of the \$1000 stake, with Athasham, second. R. Ambush, a horse which was expected to make a fine showman, and who was mostly the favorite among the fans, was entirely off his feet in this race, and was distanced in the second heat of the three out of five heats. The time made in this race was 2:11 flat.

The 2:14 trot in the consolation stake of \$1000 was won by Della Derby. The first heat was finished with Vallejo Girl in the lead, but the three remaining heats out were won by Della Derby straight, Vallejo Girl second, Lady W. third and Easter Bells fourth. Time for the fastest heat in the race was 2:11 1/2.

The best running race of the week resulted in the one mile handicap, purse of \$100. The eight horses in this event were let lose from the judges stand, and from this point around the whole course, it was a race hard to pick. Yank, the winner of the purse, was undoubtedly the best runner in the lot, but Melar, another speedy running horse, made the winner dust properly for the race and finished within just a few inches to the bad. The third horse was Counselor. Time 1:42 1/2.

College Maid, the guileless pacer, lost her course Saturday on the first quarter, and ran wide, which was the result of her slow time of 2:14 flat, but when the little racer again got her bearings, she lengthened out to her work and paced the remainder of the mile in good form. College Maid was crowned "Queen of the Oregon state fair," and a beautiful wreath of red geraniums was presented to her by Master Horace Fry. This intelligent horse afforded one of the greatest attractions ever presented at the state fair, and every man, woman and child greatly appreciated the opportunity of seeing her pace the long mile without a hand to guide her or in any way encourage her to do so.

In the 2:14 trot of last Thursday, a mistake was made by the writer in giving the moneys awarded for first, second, third and fourth winners in this race. Day Break first money, Bertha Mae second money, Nogi third money and Emily W., fourth money.
